A surprisingly strong crew of Bangs Dragons will invade Buffalo Stadium Friday night to face the Cross Plains Buffaloes in the second 10-A encounter for both teams. Game time is scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

Bangs has the best overall record of any team in the 10-A league, five wins against a single loss. The Dragons, who were rated at the bottom of the heap in at least one pre-season poll, also share the lead in the 10-A

with De Leon and Santa Anna with one apiece. Bangs defeated a tough Early eleven last week 18-14.

Cross Plains owns a 3-3 season mark, and is 0-1 in conference play. Host De Leon defeated the Herd 32-27 in the league opener last week end.

In recent years Cross Plains has had little success in defeating the Dragons of Brown County. The two squads did not meet the past two years, but UIL realignment put Bangs back into 10-A for this and next year.

Cross Plains and Bangs have met two mutual opponents thus far this season. That is Rising Star and Gorman. Both times the Wildcats have bowed to the Class A foes, but Bangs posted a larger margin of victory in each case. The Dragons defeated Rising Star 22-0 while Cross Plains managed a narrow 22-21 decision.

The Dragons have no less than 20 lettermen back from an 0-9-1 season last year, but there was reported friction in the Dragon cave that season.

Top ball carrier in a shifty and speedy backfield is Dicky Templeton, 160 pound senior.

Cross Plains must win this contest to retain even the slightest chance at a conference title. Bangs, on the other hand, must also win to keep crown hopes bright.

Amendment Analyses: Numbers 9, 10, 11

Editor's Note: Here are brief analyses of proposed Amendments Numbers 9, 10 and 11 to the Texas Constitution which will be voted

on November 7. These are intended to be unbiased.

You will vote FOR or AGAINST:

Amendment No. 9, amending Article XVI, Sections 33 and 40, of the Texas Constitution to exempt directors of soil and water conservation districts from prohibitions against dual office-holding and dual compensation.

Proponents say that in many of the less populous areas of the state, a shortage of qualified persons renders positions as director of soil and water conservation districts difficult to fill and this change would free public employees to fill them.

They contend that established principles of common law would continue to prevent persons from holding two public positions if there should be a conflict of interest.

Opponents feel that existing constitutional prohibitions are intended to prevent concentration of public jobs in the hands of a few people and they believe this change would be a step toward concentration.

They also say that persons holding positions as directors of those districts and another public position might find their time too divided to permit efficient performance of duties.

Amendment No. 10 would amend Article XVII, Section I, of the Texas Constitution to revise provisions on the time of proposing amendments to the state constitution and the time and method of publishing no-

tice of proposed amendments.

Proponents believe this amendment would permit greater flexibility in the time at which amendments may be proposed in order that emergency situations may be met and publication of an explanatory statement, as required by the proposed amendment than it is possible to obtain from the text itself.

They say the reduction in length and number of times printed would offset charges for increases in total number of insertions and might even result in a reduction in total cost, and they feel that the length of time between the first publication and the election would permit an earlier election in cases of emergency.

Opponents say changes in the basic law should not be proposed in haste, a situation which would be possible should the consideration of proposed amendments be permitted at called sessions of the legislature as provided by this amendment.

They feel, too, that it is dangerous to commit to an individual authority to prepare the official statement of what an amendment does, and they feel that publication costs would possibly be higher.

Amendment No. 11, amending Article IV, Section 17, of the Texas Constitution and adding a new Section 24a to Article III to provide a salary of \$22,500 for the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the House of Representatives.

Proponents feel that the lead-

ership and ability demanded of the presiding officers of the two houses places those holding these positions on a level with other full-time state officials, thus their salaries should be commensurate with their responsibilities.

They point out that during legislative interims regular members of the legislature have time to return home to carry on private business, but this is not true of the presiding officers of each house, and these losses should be made up in increased salaries.

Opponents argue that the proposed amendment would authorize identical salaries for both the lieutenant governor and the speaker, although the lieutenant governor serves as a state official elected in a statewide race while the speaker is chosen by fellow members. They say that compensation should not be equal unless a change is made to make both responsible to the Texas electorate.

They point out that the proposal would establish the salary for these two officers at \$22,500, a sum which is \$18,000 more than the salary of other members of the legislature, making it disproportionate to the duties performed.

Some of you have requested a repeat of the information in an article we printed in 1971 on the care of polyester knits:

Buy your knits from a reputable dealer like Higginbothams, and inspect them carefully as you do anything you buy. Handtags and care instructions can tell you a lot about the fabric and its care, whether it be piece goods or a finished garment.

A manufacturer who maintains factory laundry equipment for testing reveals that continual use of enzymes has a bad effect on polyester knits.

More important than this is the temperature range the knits are subjected to. Too hot a

washing or drying temperature may damage and a quick shock from warm water to a cold dryer may wrinkle your doubleknits. Any other quick temperature change will do the same.

Warm is the word for polyester. Set water and drying temperatures at warm rather than hot. Do not use bleaches on polyester knits and never, never try pressing these garments with a hot iron.

Man Area Bond Purchasing Leader

Savings Bond purchases in the Cross Plains area during August totaled \$1,819,733, while during the same period of 1971, the total was \$1,300,000. Howard E. Callahan, chairman of the Cross Plains Area Bond Purchasing Committee, said the area's sales for the month of August were 63 per cent of the goal of \$3,000,000.

Buffaloes Drop District Play Opener To Bearcats 32-27

A fast-acted, high-scoring District 10-A opener found Cross Plains Buffaloes bested by De Leon Bearcats 32-27 at Bearcat Stadium last Friday night.

The seesaw scoring contest found Buffaloes lead in the contest from second quarter until the last minute of play.

Bison ground attack was again led by Fullback Rodney Renfro who averaged 4.6 yards per carry and a net of 88 yards.

Local scoring was shared by four Herdsmen, Renfro with 14 points, two touchdowns and a two-point extra effort; Quarterback Roger Crawford with six points, Back Rick Kirkham with six points and Back Rex Mayes with one one-point after touchdown conversion.

The loss gave the Herd a 3-3 standing thus far in the season, and an 0-1 district record.

De Leon began the scoring onslaught of the contest early in first quarter after a Bison punt attempt fumble was covered on the Buffalo 22-yard line. Three plays later Bearcat Quarterback Craig Smith went over for the TD from the two and after a buffeted two-point conversion, Bearcats led 6-0.

One minute into second quarter, Buff Linebacker Jackie

Thomas stole a Bearcat aerial at the 50 and ran it to De Leon 30, setting up Buff first score. First and 10 at the 30 saw Renfro blast out a 30-yard TD run on an end sweep. Mayes then added his extra point, and Buffaloes led 7-6.

Buffaloes found another score in second quadrant play when a Bearcat fumble was recovered on the Buffalo 35. The 65-yard scoring drive came to an end when Crawford sneaked over from the two for six points, ending first half scoring.

Early in third quarter, De Leon mounted a 91-yard scoring drive on the ground which netted six points, and seven first downs. Smith again scoring, but this time from the 27. Buffaloes still led though, 13-12.

Following the kickoff back to the Herd, two pass completions from Crawford to End Donny Dillard placed Buffaloes on the 38 of De Leon. Next play, a screen pass from Crawford to Renfro resulted in the TD. With 5:30 left in third quarter, Buffaloes led 19-13, but not for long.

Bearcats came back with a 60-yard drive to score from the two for six points and two more points on the conversion, and Herd found itself one minute

into the fourth quarter and one point down, 20-19.

Buffaloes came back quickly to score on a 70-yard pass-run play from Crawford to Kirkham, who outran two Bearcats to the end zone. Renfro then stretched the Buff lead to 27-20 on his two-point after try.

Too much time remained in the fourth quarter for that to be enough, though, and Bearcats took advantage of it. They scored on a pass interception and on an 11 play 73-yard drive which left the clock 40 seconds from gun time. The two six pointers gave the Bearcats a total of 32, and the Buffs, with no more time, had an inadequate 27.

Coach Don Lee said charts revealed Renfro, Thomas and Linebacker C. B. Hutchins as defensive leaders.
