The Mounties have defeated Cross Plains for the past two years, 6-0 in 1971, and if all goes according to patterns, it is the Buffs time to win. For the past several seasons each school has beaten the other two years in a row.

Ranger Squeaks By Herd 7-6 In Fourth 10-A Outing

Last thread of hope for any sharing of the District 10-A football crown was scissored last Friday night at Ranger as the Cross Plains Buffaloes were downed 7-6.

The loss gave the local eleven a 1-3 district mark and leaves the crown to some other district counterpart. Ranger left their stadium with a 3-1 record and a win that can, without prejudice, be claimed undeserving.

Buffaloes were on top of every statistic and controlled the game through its entirety until the final four minutes of play when a freakish Bulldog score turned the tables of fortune.

The Herd came into the game with the first showing of a complete attack, with a more rounded running attack and a helpful passing game. Quarterback Roger Crawford threw for seven completions out of 17 attempts with several dropped passes hampering a better average. Fullback Rodney Renfro turned in a good individual net of yards and was aided by surges from Halfbacks Jerry Fortune and Tony Winfrey.

Defensively the Buffs were on top of all offensive efforts of the Bulldogs excepting the one 80-yard mishap. Only 95 yards ground rushing were allowed Ranger and no passing yards in the effort. But the Bison offense just couldn't get their usual average of points.

Buffaloes score came midway in the second quarter from a drive beginning on the Bulldog 42. One first down pass completion from Crawford to End Donny Dillard and a 15-yard penalty against the Bulldogs made the drive jell. Score came on a fourth and goal situation from the two-yardline. Renfro belted through and with a five-yard

penalty on the try for extra points, the second try failed. Ranger never penetrated the Buffalo 20-yardline except on the one scoring run, while Buffaloes got several drives together to within the Bulldog 20, but just didn't produce.

One such drive preceded the Ranger tally. Buffaloes had reached the Bulldog 21 but fumbled and on the next play the Bulldog Quarterback David Graham tip-toed the long scamper coming out of the midst of many Buffs. Ranger kicking specialist Steve Childress booted the winning point and the Buffaloes were behind with 4:30 remaining in the final period.

First try of the Herd to come back to score was thwarted with aid of a 15-yard penalty which gave them a needed 25 yards for a first to keep the drive going. A pass play on fourth and 25 from Crawford to Dillard was only a couple of yards shy.

Their second opportunity came with only about a minute left on the scoreboard clock and several dropped passes signaled the end of the Bisons hopes.

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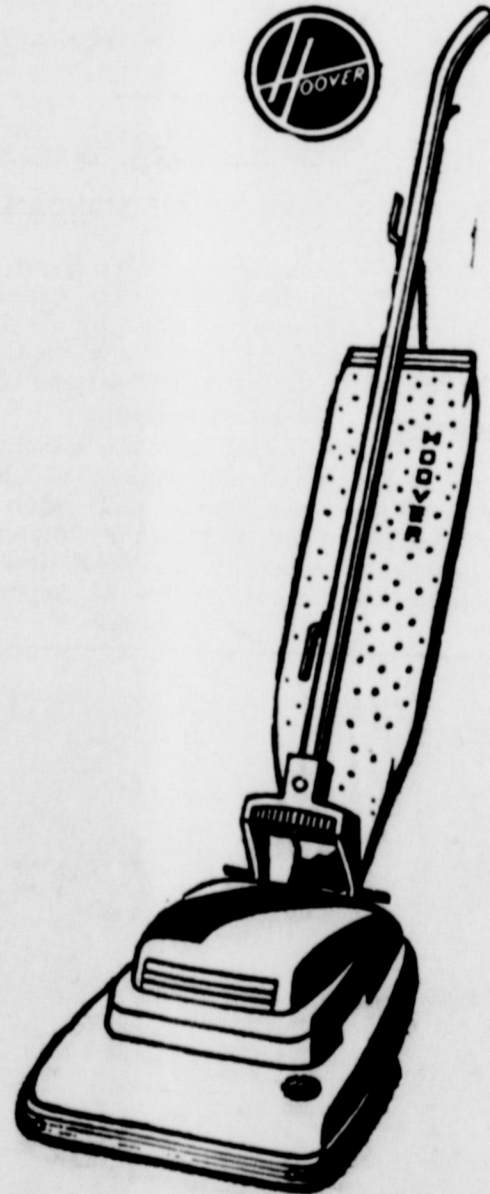

Election Summary

Callahan County gave President Richard M. Nixon a majority in general election Tuesday of last week.

He carried the county 2,203 votes to Senator George McGovern's 669. In Cross Plains Republican Nixon was favored 370 to 197.

Callahan voters also favored Republican Senator John Tower over challenger Democrat Barefoot Sanders by a 1,637 to 1,316 vote margin. Cross Plains voted in favor of the Democrat Sanders 303 to 295.

Democrat Dolph Briscoe, who narrowly won governor's job, was also given approval in Cross Plains and over the County. Callahanians gave Briscoe 1,894 votes to Republican Hank Grover's 1,002. Briscoe carried the Cross Plains box 410 to 173.

Total vote in the county was 3,071, and in Cross Plains 610 ballots were cast.

According to Mrs. W. F. Kilgore, local election judge, Howard Hicks of this city was elect-

ed Constable for this precinct, which assumes the same lines as Commissioner's Precinct 4. He was given 19 write-in ballots.

County-wide results on the 14 amendments to the Texas Constitution were reported as follows:

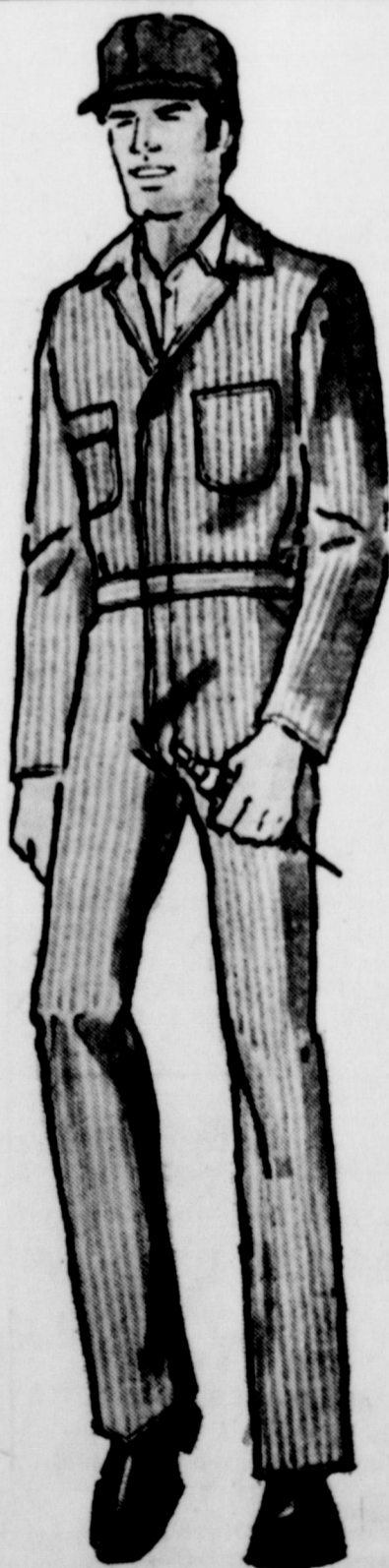
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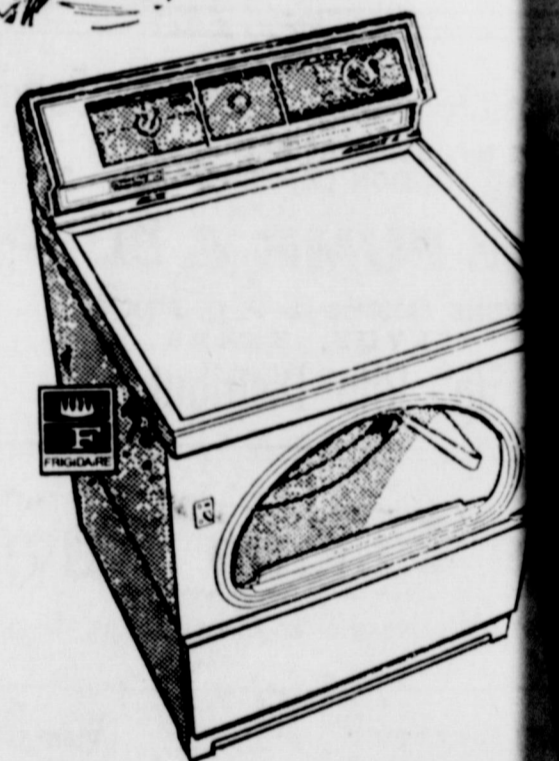

Pecan Growers Pass Self-Help Program

By an 80.8 per cent majority Texas pecan growers voted in a statewide referendum on October 23 to enter into self-help program for supporting research, education, insect and disease control and the market development of pecans.

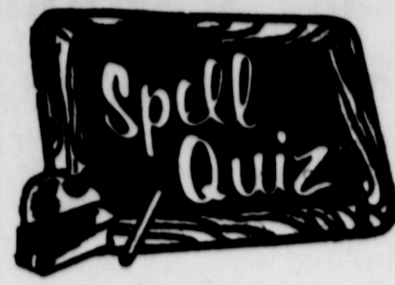
A board of 12 directors, the Texas Pecan Producers Board, elected at the same time set 25 cents per 100 pounds as the check-off which began on November 6, according to Dr. Benton Storey, associate professor with Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University, who is serving as executive director of the board.

Any sale or handling of Texas produced pecans in the state is now subject to the check-off which is to be made at the first point of sale and may be submitted to the TPPB at Box 202, College Station, by the first buyer.

First buyer may initiate a "Certificate of Compliance with the Pecan Check-off Law" to be passed along with the pecans.

If first buyer chooses not to send the assessment to the TPPB, he simply receives the value of the pecans less the one-fourth per pound check-off from the second buyer.
