\$500 Fine Tops 6 County DWI Cases

A \$500 fine was the highest levy in six driving while intoxicated cases heard by Callahan County Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr. the past week. In each hearing the accused entered a plea of guilty. Assessments totaled \$1,450 plus \$312 in court costs.

Conn C. Rider, no address, was fined \$500 and given 10 days in jail by Judge Dyer. It was his second misdemeanor DWI.

Four persons were assessed levies of \$200. Zalatio Rosales of Coleman paid a \$200 fine and was handed a three-day jail term. Three others who paid levies of \$200, Robert Douglas Allison of Dallas, James Ernest McCarroll of Grand Prairie and Jerry Wayne Conder of Clyde, all received 10 days in jail which was probated for one year.

Other case was against Chas. Willie Sweed of Lubbock who was fined \$150 and was given 10 days in jail probated for one year.

Brief Ice Storm Covers This Area

An unexpected ice storm virtually paralyzed Cross Plains and the surrounding area, as well as a large part of Central and North Texas, late Sunday through Tuesday morning.

A frigid norther blew into this area early Sunday morning,

dropping temperatures into the low 20 degree range. Late Sunday night some ice began to collect on vegetation and highways. Monday area residents awoke to a thin, but slippery layer of ice. Through Monday mornini conditions worsened as freezing rain,

drizzle and sleet fell over the area. As traffic increased and temperatures warmed slightly, most roads in this section were not so dangerous to travel through the afternoon and early evening. It was reported, however, that to the east and south of Cross Plains driving was extremely hazardous both Sunday night and Monday.

More freezing drizzle late Monday made the re-freezing highways and city streets extremely slick, and traffic was at a virtual standstill in this area Tuesday night and early Tuesday morning. A bright sun greeted area citizens Tuesday morning, and by 10 o'clock most of the ice had melted.

Classes were dismissed Monday and Tuesday at Cross Plains schools. Most other area schools also held no classes either day.

Although the ice formed on power and telephone lines, no major interruption of service had been learned of by the Review Tuesday just before noon.

Gas pressure was maintained by the municipal gas system here, and most of the discomfort from the ice was difficulty in traveling and general disagreeable conditions.

Baird Youth Dies

After Accidental Shot

Bill Windham, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Windham of Baird and a senior at Baird High School, died at 2 p.m. Monday at Callahan County Hospital following an accidental shooting on his parent's ranch 14 miles southeast of Baird about 1:30 p.m.

Justice of the Peace Garvin Jones of Baird ruled death by accidental shooting.

Funeral was to be held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at Baird First United Methodist Church with the pastor Rev. Delton Fisher, officiating. Burial was to be in Ross Cemetery at Baird.

Jones said that the shooting apparently happened while the youth was taking practice shots with a pistol. He was wounded in the lower right side and was rushed to the hospital in Baird.

Born in Baird in Jan. 14, 1955, he had lived in Baird all his life. He was active in school and had been chosen as an all-district football player last week.

Survivors are his parents; three brothers, Richard, Jr. (Tally) of Clyde, Dyer of Baird and Tom, a junior at Tarleton State College; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. A. E. Dyer, Sr. of Baird; three nieces and one nephew.

SCS Officials Tour Garrett Farm Here

Dyess Slates Low Flights Over Area

Low level training flights have been scheduled for the Cross Plains and surrounding areas by officers at Dyess Air Force Base at Abilene. In explanation, it was noted that the highest degree of proficiency possible is required to meet commitments of the U. S. Air Force.

Flights of C130 Hercules planes may be scheduled between hours of 8 a.m. and midnight Monday through Friday and less frequently on week ends. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the terrain, while night flights are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle.

All flights are made along specific routes. Minimum disturbances of farms, ranches and communities is a primary consideration in selecting the routes. Among the many routes over the Abilene area are those planned in this sector, just west of Cross Plains, just east of Rising Star and north of Coleman, coming near the Burkett community.

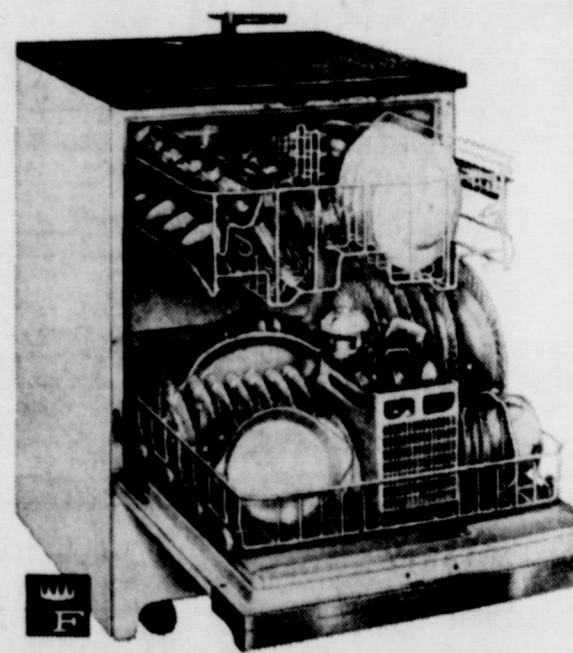
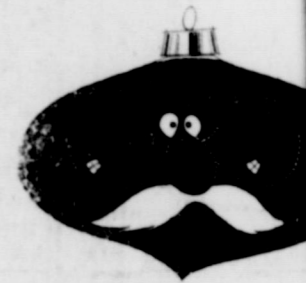

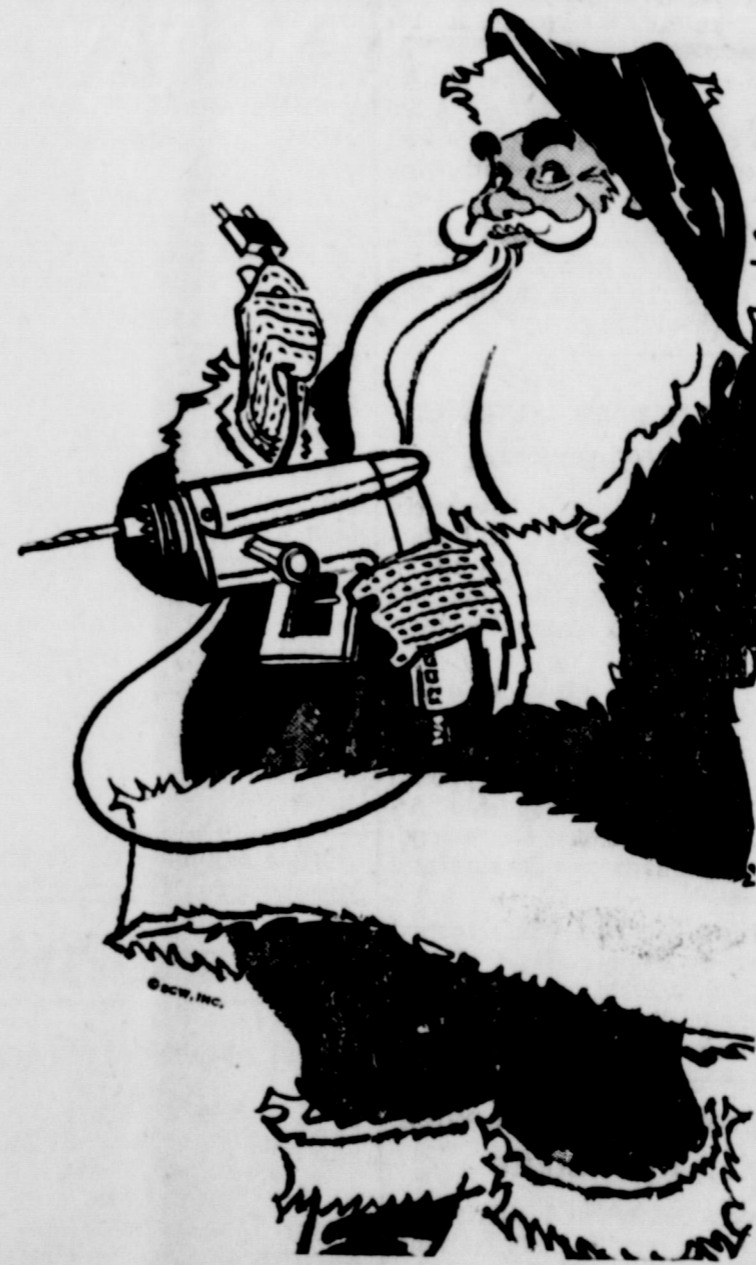

118 Barrel Oiler Hit At Brownwood

A Marble Falls oil discovery well has been completed eight miles northwest of Brownwood. Operator will apply for a new field designation.

It is The Grant Co. of Abilene No. 2 Joe Weedon, spotting 330 feet from the north and 1,250 feet from the east lines of J. Lewis Survey 43.

No. 2 Weedon had a daily potential of 118 barrels of 42 gravity oil. Flow was through an 18-64-inch choke with packer set on the casing and 132 pounds tubing pressure.

It is producing from perforations at 2,256-60 feet, treated with 1,000 gallons of 15 per cent acid. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 2,305 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 2,330 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1.644-1.

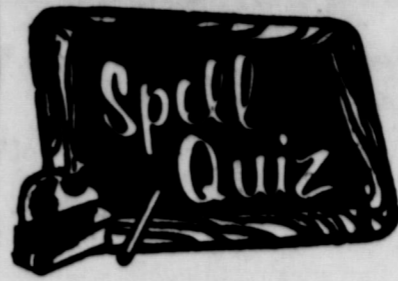
Location is 1,900 feet north of No. 1 Weedon, a Marble Falls gas well.

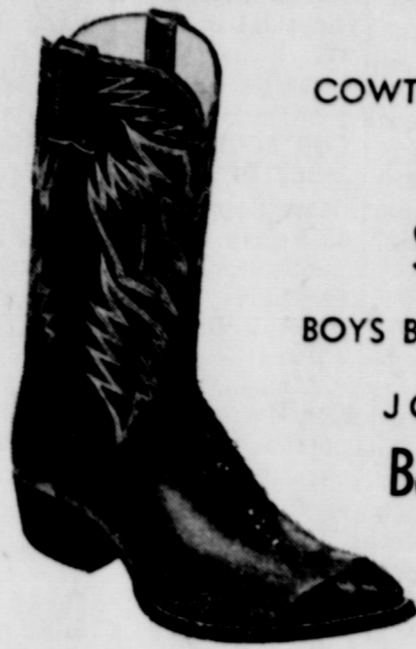

Young Men Must Still Register For Military

Colonel Melvin N. Gantz, the state director of the Selective Service for Texas, has again reminded young men of their obligation to register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday.

Gantz stressed that the requirement to register will continue in full effect whether the all-voluntary military force becomes a reality or not. Every native born and resident-alien young man is required to present himself for registration from 30 days before to 30 days after his 18th birthday. If, for any reason, a young man has failed to register he should do so immediately to escape the penalty of federal law.

Failure to register may result in a fine, imprisonment, or both, under provisions of the Military Selective Service Act.

Young men may register at the office of the local board near their home or place of residence, or may be registered by volunteer registrars who are located in most high schools or other similarly convenient locations. Registrars in the Cross Plains area are as follows: Wayne Ford, Cross Plains High School, Cross Plains, Texas; Mrs. Alma Stephenson, County School Superintendent's Office, Callahan County Courthouse, Baird, Texas; Mrs. Lavonne White, Rising Star City Hall, Rising Star, Texas.
