

These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, DEAR MRS. PAIRISH. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any Post Office or office of the membering! Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them.

The card should be returned o one of these offices or mailed directly to the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.




