Coleman Jury Indicts 5 Local Persons

A 35th District grand jury at Coleman indicted five Cross Plains persons in two separate cases last week.

Allen Clark and Darrell Walker of this city were indicted on a charge of rape stemming from an incident at Coleman last summer. The girl involved was reportedly a juvenile.

Gary Robertson, Donnie Pittman, Allen Clark, Darrell Walker and Mike Dyer, all of Cross Plains were also true billed on a charge of theft. That count grew out of extensive investigations by Coleman County Sheriff Corky Chapman and Cross Plains lawmen last summer when an assortment of charges were brought against Cross Plains and area residents for burglary and theft. Some cases dated as far as three years in arrears.

No trial date has been learned here.

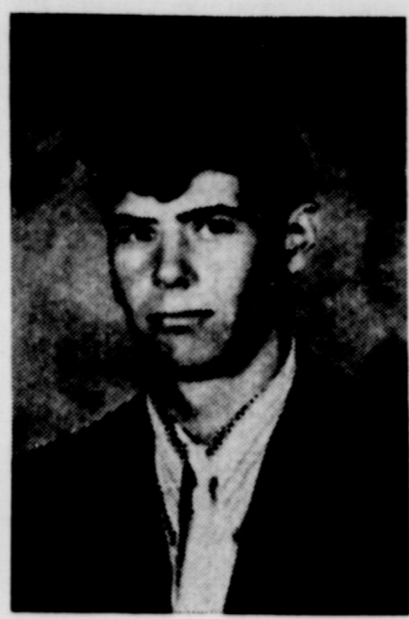
Three Cross Plains City Councilmen will also be elected in separate ballot on that day. There had been no filings any of the three places on Monday.

Quality Printing At Review

Alien Registration Data Confidential

Information furnished by an alien in making his annual address report to the government is confidential.

According to Mr. Albert G. Vaughan of the San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute. These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any Post Office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them.

The card should be returned to one of these offices or mailed directly to the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Parents or guardians of aliens under fourteen years of age submit reports for such children.

You once gave a recipe for a pumpkin bread in your column. I have misplaced my copy. Could you please print it again?

DEAR MRS. PAIRISH:
I printed that recipe at Halloween in 1971. Thanks for remembering!

PUMPKIN DESSERT BREAD:

- 3 cups flour
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 3 tsp. cinnamon
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups pumpkin, cooked and mashed or canned
- 4 beaten eggs
- 1 1/4 cups oil or melted shortening
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Place all the dry ingredients in a large mixing bowl, mix them well. With a spoon, make a deep well in the center. In this well add all the other ingredients; stir carefully, just enough to dampen all the dry ingredients. Pour the batter into two prepared loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

This bread is delicious served with spiced tea or coffee. Top it with whipped cream, sprinkle lightly with cinnamon and cap it off with a cherry for an extra treat for company.

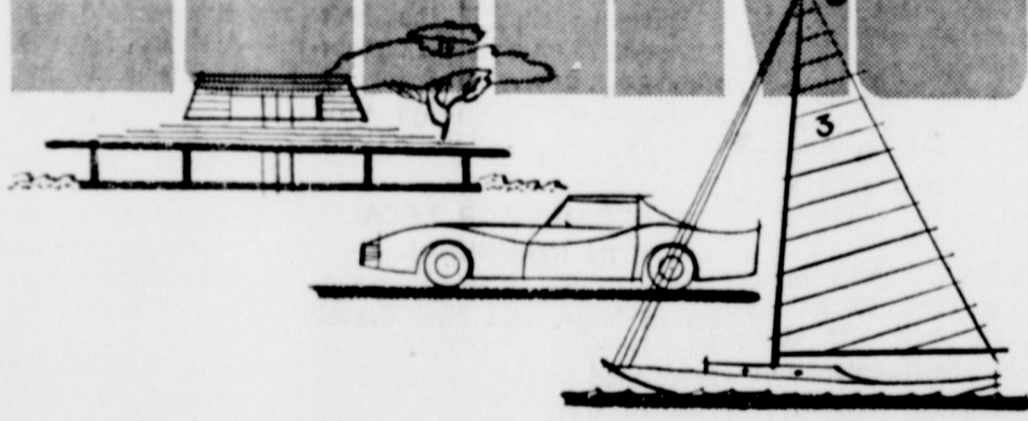

Recreation May Increase Income Of Landowners

Incomes of many local landowners are being increased due to outdoor recreation. Les Ethetton, of the local Soil Conservation Service, states the demand for recreation has never been greater. In Callahan County hunting and fishing still rank highest in popularity. Vast increases of the county's land are being leased out for hunting annually.

Ethetton states that people are seeking access to the outdoors for other reasons also. These include picnicking, hiking, boating, and swimming. People in the nearby cities are faced with the problem of finding a place to enjoy these different forms of outdoor recreation. Public facilities are becoming more and more crowded. People go to the country to escape the city crowds only to find crowded park areas. According to Ethetton, this is creating a demand for more private land to be developed

for recreation. Hunting leases have increased landowner's income in Callahan County substantially but many of these recreational developments could be improved or expanded. The Soil Conservation Service is available to assist landowners in determining the recreational potential of their lands. Ethetton states that recreational developments may be an income that landowners will not want to pass up and urges interested landowners to contact the Soil Conservation Service to develop sound recreational and wildlife plans for their farms and ranches.

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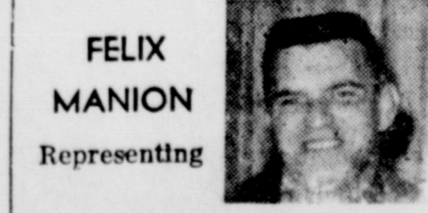

Recent Law Changes Affect SS Provisions

Note: (This is the first of a series of nine articles on the new law that was prepared by R. R. Jr. Social Security's manager at Abilene.)

Benefits payable to a widow or daughter of a deceased insured person may now be continued through the term of the annuity in which age 22 is reached.

Children receiving social security benefits may now be adopted by any one, relative or other person without having their benefits stopped.

Children living with and supported by a grandparent may now receive social security benefits on the grandparent's record, following retirement, disability, or death of the children's natural parent.

Wives, if marriage was annulled, may now be eligible for social security benefits if they were contributing support at the time of the annulment.

Survivors with military service will be given credit for that service.

social security credits of \$300 per calendar quarter, over and above the amounts on which social security taxes were deducted from their military pay. They must request such recomputation.

Farmers have had since 1955 an option of reporting, for social security credit, two-thirds of their gross income if such was more than their true net income. The current limit on such reporting is \$1600 for any one year. The amendments provide that all other self-employed persons may exercise the same sort of optional reporting (1) provided they had a net of \$400 or more in two of the three preceding years, and (2) the option is not less than the true net. Non-farmers may use this option in no more than 5 different years.

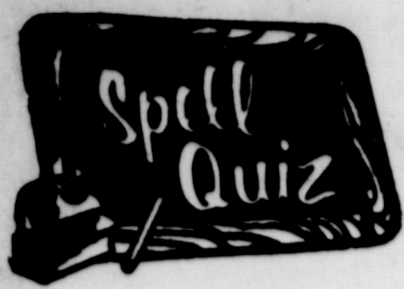
