Don't Block Streets, Local Firemen Ask

Members of the Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department have asked those persons who follow fire trucks to blazes to please not go to the immediate fire location.

It has been pointed out by local fire company officials that several times recently firemen and fire equipment have been slowed reaching the blaze because of traffic congested streets.

"In the past," said Alton E. Hornsby, fire chief, many persons have rendered invaluable help to the department at fires, and that assistance is highly regarded and appreciated." He added, however, that in recent weeks on several occasions fire equipment has had difficulty in reaching the fire because of heavy, slow traffic near the blaze.

"Persons should stay well away from the immediate area of the blaze," Hornsby pointed out, "so firemen may reach the scene and battle the blaze with as little interruption as possible."

Buffettes At Least 10-A Co-Champs

Buffettes, girls basketball team at Cross Plains High School have cinched at least a share of the District 10-A championship.

The team achieved that goal last week with two more victories without a loss in conference play. Tuesday of last

week the Buffettes ripped visiting Early 64-41, and on Friday at Bangs, Cross Plains trimmed the host sextet 65-40.

Buffettes were to travel to De Leon Tuesday for a bout with current second place unit. A victory then would give the Buffettes undisputed champion-

ship. Regular season will end next Friday in Buffalo Gymnasium when Ranger comes here if Buffettes win Tuesday. A game with Bangs has not been played, because of inclement weather when it was scheduled, and will not be played unless the outcome could change the outcome of the district race.

Buffaloes dropped to 8-11 on the season and 2-6 in 10-A competition last week by bowing to both Bangs and Early.

Cross Plains girls had two easy victories. Against Early, Buffettes rolled to a 35-9 halftime advantage and coasted to the 64-41 win. Terry Eding-Eding blistered the net for 49 points for Buffettes. Thirty-three of those points came on 34 free toss attempts. Margine Duncan hit 10 points and Paula Wright added 5. Miss Jacobson paced Early with 15 markers.

Buffettes lead by eight, 35-27, at intermission against Bangs Friday, but a strong second half lifted the local sextet to a final 65-40 triumph. Again Miss Edington scorched the nets for 40 points, 19 field goals and two of three charity throws. Miss Duncan bucketed 19 points and Miss Wright contributed 6. Miss Eason paced Bangs with 21 points.

Visiting Early Longhorns broke a 26-26 halftime deadlock in the second half and went on to rout the Herd 83-50. Rodney Renfro led local scoring with 21 points. Other Buffs tallying were Andy Walker 10, Donny Dillard 7, Rick Kirkham 6, and Lance Blackwell added 22.

A frigid Herd could not stay with an also cold Bangs Dragon team there Friday, and the locals bowed 44-26. Not a single Bison counted in double figures. Herd scoring follows: Dillard 6, Kirkham, Renfro and Golson 4 each, Randy Hunter, Phillips, Curtis Hines and Walker 2 each. Pete Ripley had 11 and Larry Lehman had 10 for the Dragons.

Cross Plains junior varsity defeated the Early B team 62-26. Jerry Lewis hooped 24 points and William Hines added 12 to pace the interning Herdsmen.

Baird Jury Gives Kime 7-Year Term

Larry Edward Kime, a 22-year-old airman stationed at Dyess AFB at Abilene, was given a seven-year prison term Monday by a 42nd District Court jury at Baird.

Kime had pleaded guilty to "robbery by assault" on a Clyde service station attendant last October 25. He had asked the seven-man, five-woman jury to give him a second chance by recommending probation.

The jury, which deliberated four hours, reported they were hopelessly deadlocked, apparently on question of probation, but after a supper break returned the verdict in only 10 minutes.

Formal sentencing has been set for February 3 by District Judge Don Lane.

Judge Lane had instructed the jurors to find Kime guilty and to assess his punishment at life in prison, or any number of years not less than five. A jury may not recommend probation of a term longer than 10 years, the judge added.

Criminal Dist. Atty. Ed Paynter, who prosecuted, had called Kime "a marauder in the night" and had argued that "a sentence of less than 45 years won't give him long enough behind bars to be rehabilitated. Probation would not be punishment at all."

Kime's attorney, Jess Holway of Abilene, argued that Kime's admission of his guilt and his tearful frankness with the jury showed that he is sorry with what he did and is worthy of a probated term.

It was reported that Kime and three blacks had participated in the crime on Warren Bailey of Clyde. The quartet were arrested shortly after the crime in east Abilene by Highway Patrolman Jack Shields of that city.

CAPITOL REPORT

Editor's Note: Following is a report of activities of the Texas Legislature as penned by Rep. Lynn Nabers of Brownwood. It will appear in columns of this newspaper periodically, as released by Nabers. He has entitled the column "Capitol Report."

"The Legislature shall meet every two years at such time as may be provided by law and at other times when convened by the Governor," so states Article 3, Section 5, of the Texas Constitution. Thus in the midst of talk of reform rules and ethics bills the Texas Legislature convened at high noon on the 9th day of January, 1973.

The first order of business as also provided by the Constitution, was to elect a Speaker of the House of Representatives. Price Daniel, Jr. was elected to serve in this office by his peers and was sworn in by his father, Price Daniel, Sr., Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas.

The House immediately plunged into the business at hand. Reform rules proposed by the new Speaker and adopted by the House were put into effect. Committee assignments were made and committees began work on legislation already introduced.

The atmosphere seems to carry a determination on the part of all Legislators, both the seasoned veterans and the freshmen members, to get on with the work we were sent here to do. Perhaps the memory of recent scandals that have rocked public confidence in State Officials has strengthened this determination.

From all early indications, legislation will be controversial, interesting and varied during the 63rd Session of the Legislature. There should be something to please or displease everyone. You can expect to see legislation dealing with automobile insurance, ethics, the Family Code, pollution, marijuana and other narcotics offenses, the death penalty, abortion and education to mention just a few.

Added to all this is the fact that once again we must come up with a worable Appropriations Bill, a task which in the

past has been the nucleus of controversy as well as the cause of special sessions.

As in the past, I will be writing this column on a regular basis in an effort to keep you informed of any legislation or issues of particular interest to our district. I have been assigned to serve as Vice-Chairman of the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee this session and will also serve on the Insurance Committee and the Committee on Revenue and Taxation. These committees will deal with legislation that is of concern to all, and I will keep you apprised of the workings of these committees as the session progresses.

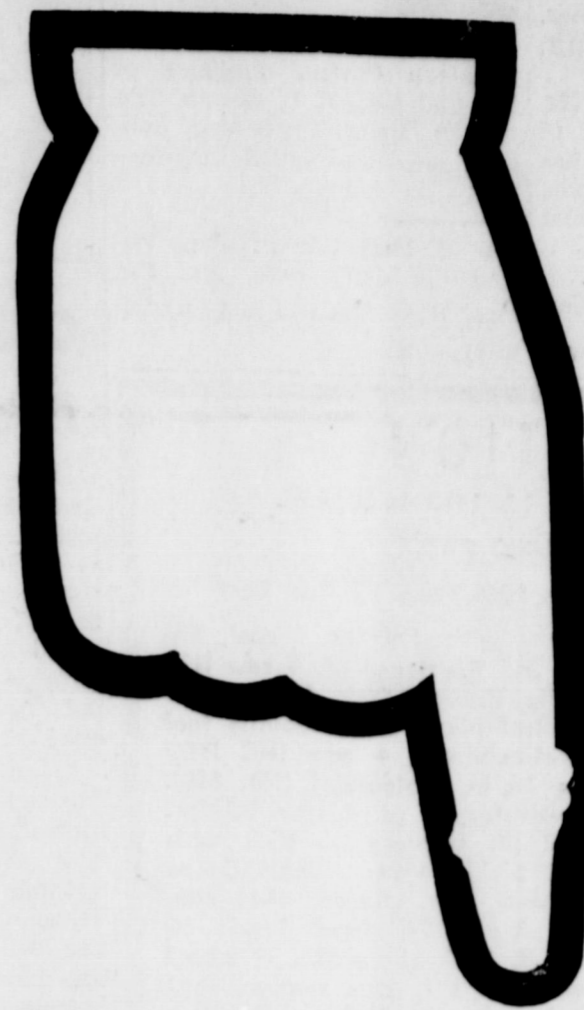

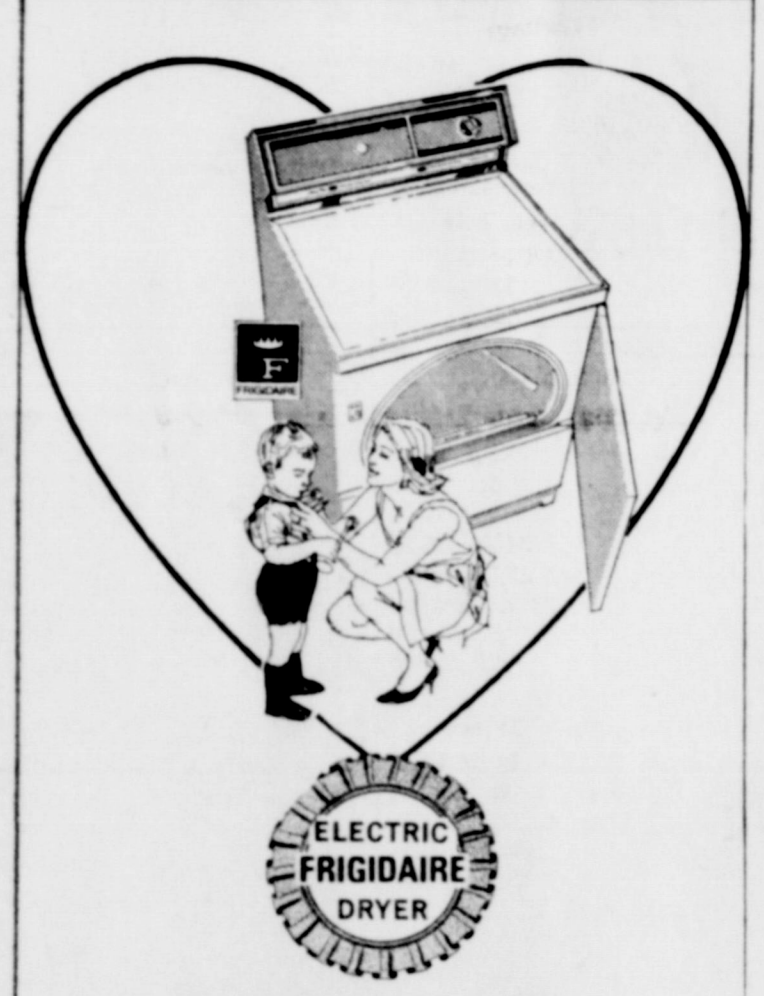

General Rains Fall Over This Sector

First general rains in many months fell over the Cross Plains area Wednesday night and Thursday. Amounts seemed to vary with from 1.20 to about two inches being reported in different sections of this locality.

In Cross Plains F. C. Newton, official weather observer, gauged 1.54 inches. That, combined with a previous 1.60 inches received earlier this year, brought the young 1973 total to 3.14 inches, far above normal for January, usually a dry month.

Some sleet and light snow was mixed with the rain which began falling late Wednesday evening and continued through most of Thursday. Snow was much more prevalent in areas west of Cross Plains than it was within the township. Although cold, icy conditions did not materialize as was feared.

The rain came on the heels of a snow which left ground soggy, but little stock water was realized from either the snow or the rain. Winter pastures and small grain crops benefitted greatly from the moisture.

Top rainfall reported to the Review was measured at Atwell where 1.90 inches was gauged by Alton Tatom. On the other hand, the Cottonwood area received just over an inch, about 1.20 inches. Cross Cut area received almost two inches with O. B. Byrd gauging 1.85 inches. About an inch and a half was estimated at both Pioneer and Rowden.

More Social Security Changes Are Told

Editor's Note: This is the fifth of a series of nine articles on the new laws that have been prepared by R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security's district manager at Abilene.

Citizens of Japanese ancestry are to be given non-contributory social security credits for the time they were interned while over age 18 by the Federal Government during World War II. The amount will be either the then-prevailing minimum wage or the individual's prior earnings, if larger.

Nondisabled widowers may be paid as early as age 60, as has been the case for widows. Widowers must have been dependent on their wives at the time the wife died.

Heretofore, an amount equal to 1 per cent of all disability benefits in a year could be spent for rehabilitation of the beneficiaries. The amount is being increased to one and one-fourth per cent for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1973, and to one and one-half per cent for following years. It might be mentioned that rehabilitation has been so successful that the costs of the service have been considerably less than the savings from termination of rehabilitated beneficiaries.

A child who is adopted by either a retiree or a disability beneficiary may be due social security benefits if: (1) the adoption was in a court of competent jurisdiction in the U. S.; (2) the child was living with and receiving at least one-half support from the beneficiary for at least one year before entitlement to retirement or disability benefits; and (3) the child was under 18 when he began to live with the adoption parent.

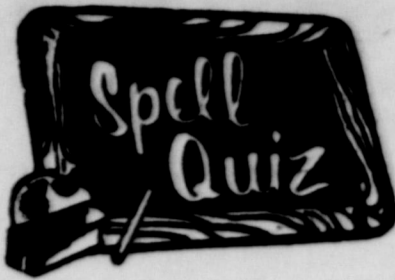
