Research by the Texas Department of Agriculture in peanut diseases is only two years old. Field men at the department's De Leon laboratory conducted the questionaire survey in 1971 and 1972 and are testing various chemicals on selected acreage in De Leon.

The lab is also holding training sessions in identifying the diseases for department scientists from the East Texas area so that an intensive examination can be made on peanut diseases. These efforts should help peanut farmers throughout the state to learn to recognize the diseases and work with the control chemicals which are available.

Central Texas contributes over 22 per cent of the 478,-800,000 pounds produced in Texas annually. Callahan County produced 3,613,000 pounds in 1971, and when production figures are in for 1972, an increase is predicted. That yield could be higher with research and recognition of the problem, Commissioner White stated.

"The department will continue to support research and education programs. Great strides have been made in recent years by the seed industry, but much remains to be done in providing protection to the seedling peanuts after they are planted. It is time now to pay proper attention to the seedling and ground diseases of peanuts so that they, like leaf spot, can be brought under control," Commissioner White concluded.


