200 Honor S. F. (Fos) Bond 100'th Birthday Friday

Approximately 200 persons gathered in Cross Plains and over the city to honor S. F. (Fos) Bond on his 100th birthday at the Cross Plains Cafeteria.

Bond, who has made his name in Cross Plains since 1884, is honored by many prominent and state officials. President Richard Nixon signed a typewritten letter of appreciation for his long life and service to the community. Telegrams of recognition came from Texas U.S. Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, Congressman Omar F. Baker, Robert M. Ball, social security commissioner, and the state department in Washington.

Texas officials who attended the celebration were Governor James H. Briscoe, Lt. Governor James H. Starnes, Attorney General Tommy Green and Land Commissioner George Armstrong. He also received letters and telegrams from long time friends who were unable to attend the celebration.

The Texas House of Representatives honored him with a resolution, and Woodmen of the World presented Bond with a certificate noting his 75 years as a member of the fraternity. Abilene Reporter-News, for which he has been a distributor here many years, gave him a certificate of appreciation, a framed picture and a gift.

One of the entire Cross Plains community he was honored with a plaque which read, "S. F. Bond, 'one of the greatest men ever to live' in the community of Cross Plains. He has given a giant birthday card designed by Bob Bond."

Bond also got a roll of 100 bills to end to end.

Mr. K. Brown of McCombs, long time friend of Bond, former local resident, featured speaker for the program. He reminisced about the good days and some of the bad days.

Miss Bond's daughter, Miss Mary Bond, was also honored at the celebration. She was presented with an engraved sterling pin. Her activities started for the celebration early Friday morning at the Cross Plains Buffalo Club. He marched to his home, where he lives with his daughter and played "Happy Birth-

day" for the community and his citizens in behalf of his daughter. A following note of appreciation given the Review and his daughter to express gratitude.

Wayne Ford Quits City Council Race

Wayne Ford, local school superintendent, announced Tuesday that he has withdrawn from the race for Cross Plains City Council.

His withdrawal leaves six persons seeking the three vacancies.

Ford stated Tuesday morning, "I have to put the school first." He added that when he filed only two candidates had announced for the three places, and it seemed that no one was going to take on the civic responsibility.

After his filing, four other aspirants announced.

All three incumbents are asking return to the council. They are Gerald Bowden, Oscar Koenig and Jimmielee Payne. Newcomers asking a seat on the directorate are Rolan Jones, Bob Roody and H. G. Wellmaker.

Holdover aldermen are Raymond DeBusk and T. T. Nichols. Mayor Doyle Burchfield also has another year on his present tenure.

City and school elections will be held April 7 in the City Hall.

The school balloting is not contested with the two incumbents, Tommie Harris and Dr. Carl J. Sohns, seeking reelection.

Absentee balloting in both votes is now in progress.

New Grade School To Open On April 2

If everything goes according to present schedules, students will occupy the new Cross Plains Elementary School building Monday, April 2.

That date has been set by local school officials, but hinges on no delays in work which still must be completed at the structure.

An open house and program is slated to be held Sunday,

April 1, for school district patrons. That event, too, depends on remaining work going without delay.

Superintendent Wayne Ford said Tuesday that remaining work on the building is mostly of the "finish-up" type. Electricians are still working, wiring and installing and checking the heating and cooling systems. Ford said that work

from the contractor indicated the work would take the rest of this week. It was also pointed out that other finish work also remains in most rooms of the new structure.

Actual construction, dirt work, began on the new building on June 14, 1972, and originally a completion date was set for December 1 of last year. Contract with Armstrong Construction Co. of Breckenridge called for completion date of February 10, 1973. Contract of \$213,523 was awarded to the Breckenridge firm.

Furniture for most of the rooms in the new building was being stacked in middle of the rooms first of the week, pending installation after all construction work has been completed.

Ford said, "It has been a long, long time, and we sincerely hope to have the building ready for occupancy by April 2."

Local elementary students have been meeting classes in spare rooms in the high school building and at the First Baptist Church here since the old building was destroyed by fire on January 19, 1972.

Band To San Antonio; Two Fund Drives Set

Buffalo Band of Cross Plains schools has launched a two-pronged fund raising drive to defray expenses which will be incurred by the aggregation on a trip to San Antonio.

The Buffalo Band has been invited to march in the "Battle of Flowers" parade in the Alamo City on April 27. The group, under direction of Carroll Rhodes, has accepted the invitation.

The Band Booster Club and members of the band are currently taking listings for a community birthdate calendar and selling tickets to the club's annual Spring Carnival.

Mrs. Charles Dillard has been named chairman of the drive, and she will be assisted by booster club personnel and band members.

The Spring Carnival is scheduled at the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Barn a mile north of Cross Plains on Saturday, March 31. Tickets for the event are being sold for \$1.25, which entitles the holder to a Kentucky Fried Chicken plate and admission to the event.

Serving will begin at 5 p.m. and continue until the food is gone.

In addition there will be diversions of bingo, dominoes, a cake walk, country store and other booths.

A king and queen will also be named at the carnival. Votes will be tabulated at one cent per ballot, and receipts are in local businesses.

Ex-Local Man Installing Gin Machinery In Africa

The machinery, purchased from the Murray-Piratiniga Machinery Corporation of Sao Paulo, Brazil, must be ready for use in about two months.

when the cotton harvest begins there.

Baird is owner of the Coleman Cotton, Inc. gin located on Highway 206 between Cross Plains and Coleman, near Echo. The gin, who operated a tractor business in Cross Plains in 1955-59, has a long background in the cotton ginning business. He helped his father, Charlie Baird, in the operation of a cotton gin at Dressy, where Donald was reared. His grandfather, R. H. Baird, built a gin in Coleman more than 70 years ago, after coming to Texas from Tennessee.

Donald Baird worked several years as service manager for the Lummus Cotton Gin Company, and he built several gins in Texas and New Mexico before building his gin near Coleman. He and his wife and son, Mark, age 10, operate his present business with some help. The other Baird children, John and Becky, are both married and have moved from home.

The former local man was recommended for the job in Africa by a man who knew of Baird's long association with ginning and who had seen results of his construction labors.

Deputy Remains Critical Canada Offers Letter

Callahan County Deputy Sheriff Luke Taylor of Clyde was reported in very critical condition at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene late Monday.

He was shot in the head on March 2 on property leased by Selan Canada, 50, of Route 1, Baird. The accused, father of nine children, five of whom are still at home, was charged with intent to murder, and has been released on \$5,000 bond.

Sheriff Grayson Miller has said that investigation into the shooting, which is still continuing, showed that Taylor was apparently on Canada's property on official duty answering a disturbance call.

Taylor has been in the Abilene hospital since being rushed there shortly after the incident, and has undergone surgery on the wounds.

The Review, as has other lo-

cal newspapers, received a letter from Mr. and Mrs. Canada. It is printed hereunder.

"We, Selan and Irma Canada of Baird, would like to make a public statement in regard to the recent tragic event in our community.

"Please reserve judgment until all the facts are known.

"The last six months we have for no legitimate reason been harassed, threatened, denied civil rights and been falsely accused.

"As God is our witness, contrary to rumors, during our sweet marriage neither of us have been involved romantically in any way with anyone else.

"We have God's love, our precious family and wonderful friends and relatives for which we are thankful.

"Remember man looks on the outward appearance, but God

HOME HINTS

AND FAMILY FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

Surface preparation is a critical factor in obtaining good painting results. 95% of all paint complaints would never occur if the surface had been properly prepared before painting. For the correct type of surface preparation, read the manufacturer's label. If a primer is recommended, use the one the manufacturer recommends. The primer and the paint should be perfectly matched, or an unhappy bond may develop and ruin your paint job.



The amount of surface preparation needed depends on the condition of the surface and of the previous coats of paint. A good washing or thorough brushing may be all that is needed. However, if the paint is partially peeling or flaking, the damaged areas should be sanded smooth before recoating. Remember to always prime bare wood before painting. Whether priming is necessary or not, we may need to wash the surface to be painted. Latex paints do not adhere well to dirty or chalky surfaces. Rub your hand over the area. If it comes up dirty, you will need to scrub the entire surface with a solution of water and detergent before proceeding. To be truly happy, don't take second best. Minimum Tillage New To County's Farmers

A new conservation practice is being offered to Callahan County farmers. It is minimum tillage, often called no-till or mulch tillage.

Minimum tillage really works while saving the farmer time and money. Minimum tillage is the practice of planting seed directly into a cover of residues from the previous crop. In one trip across the field, the farmer prepares the seedbed, plants the crop and applies the fertilizer. This operation and perhaps one cultivation is the only farming operation for the entire year. Farmers not familiar with minimum tillage farming ask, "What makes minimum tillage work?" The secret is an effective contact herbicide mixed with a residual herbicide to kill existing vegetation, so that the newly developing crop does not have to compete with weeds for nutrients and moisture.

Leaving a good soil cover will almost eliminate any wind and water erosion. Moisture is not worked out of the soil. Good covers can withstand sudden rainfall up to four inches without undue washing and conserve moisture by preventing

run off. According to Gary Gregory, Soil Conservationist at Baird, by eliminating 6 to 20 trips across the field as often required by conventional methods, the soil structure can be expected to improve through the use of minimum tillage. This results in reduced compaction and increased percolation of water into the soil where it is stored for future crop use. For additional information on minimum tillage, contact your local Soil Conservation Service.

March Bills Reflect Higher Telephone Rate

Local telephone subscribers noticed an increase in rates on Texas Telephone & Telegraph Co. March billings.

The increases, which came from 50 cents to \$2.00 per phone, became effective on February 16 according to notice from the phone company which serves Cross Plains, Clyde, Rising Star and Way, as well as other communities outside this immediate area.

Cross Plains City Council stayed the requested increases until the city on Dec. 5, 1972, with a unanimous vote of all members. The increase in rates was presented to the council on November 21, but no action was taken at that time.

New schedule of charges as listed by the local company follows: residence, one-party line in city \$7.00, up 50 cents; residence, two-party in city, \$8.25, up 50 cents; residence, four-party in city, \$15.00, up 50 cents; residence, four-party line rural, \$2.75, up \$2.00; residence, multi-party line rural, \$4.25, up 50 cents; business, one-party line in city, \$13.50, up 50 cents;

business, four-party line rural \$11.00, up \$2.00, and business, multi-party line rural, \$19.00, up \$2.00.

The telephone company stated that it was voluntarily complying with federal regulations of rate increases under a more strict schedule than is now required.

The local phone company issued the following statement concerning the rate increase: "Texas Telephone and Telegraph Company invested \$1.3 million in new and improved facilities during 1972. We have budgeted an extraordinary \$2 million for 1973. Higher telephone rates are necessary to cover the resulting increased cost such as interest, maintenance, depreciation, and taxes on this high investment.

"We are dedicated to the goal of providing you with the convenient and dependable telephone service which you deserve. In many areas, we have a long way to go before we reach this goal. The new rates will help us move in this direction more swiftly."

FHA Approves Eula Water System Loan

Congressman Omar Burleson has announced that the Farm- ers Home Administration has approved a loan of \$366,000 to the Eula Water Supply Corporation of Callahan County for development of a rural area water system.

It was noted in Cong. Burleson's notification of the approval that plans call for building a water distribution system and will provide modern central water service to 248 homes and other establishments in the Eula community and rural area south and west of Clyde.

The project, the congressman said, will end the dependence of many residents on water hauled or taken from unreliable wells. The Eula Rural System will obtain its water from the Clyde City system.

The loan will be repayable in 49 years at an interest rate of five per cent, and will be provided under Rural Water Facilities Program administered by FHA, a department of the Agriculture Rural Credit Service.

Capitol Report

By Rep. Lynn Nabers

Last week after three days of heated debate, the House of Representatives passed the State Ethics Bill. In the midst of strong debate approximately forty House members walked out of the House. Perhaps these members felt they were making a point, but in my estimation they were simply leaving their districts unrepresented. However, it is doubtful that the people in their districts will hear about this, as the only people who were informed were those members who watched them walk out.

Another bill which is soon to come up for House debate and is sure to be rather controversial is H B 116 which would provide a duty-free lunch period for public school teachers. According to the bill, there will be an allotment of \$100 per classroom teacher under the Foundation School Program to defray the cost. H. B. 116 would certainly be beneficial in lessening the work load of teachers, however, after a careful study of the fiscal report prepared by the Legislative Budget Board, there is an indication that should this legislation be enacted, it would cost the state taxpayers almost ten million dollars and local tax payers in school districts almost two million, five hundred thousand dollars next school year. Over the next five years this would be a cost of somewhere in the neighborhood of fifty million dollars of increased state spending and over twelve million dollars more from local taxes. In order to finance the duty-free lunch period, it would be necessary to increase taxes in school districts.

H.B. 106 was recently passed by the Senate. This piece of legislation by Rep. Charles Tupper of El Paso changes the present law to allow a right turn on a red signal after a stop. It allows local authorities to prohibit such turns by posting signs on the traffic control devices stating that such turns are prohibited. This bill was proposed with the idea that the flow of traffic may be further expedited by allowing a right turn on a red signal and the feeling that this should be made uniform in the state.

On March 13 House Concurrent Resolution 9 was filed and will become law. This resolution by Rep. Nick Nichols of Houston is a request for the Attorney General to file suit for federal funds for water pollution control. Another bill which has become law recently was the Airport Guard Bill by Rep. Lindon Williams. This bill will go into effect in 90 days and allows airports to hire security forces as a means of helping to guard against skyjacking. Security guards which are hired by airports may be armed and commissioned as peace officers if they qualify under staff standards.

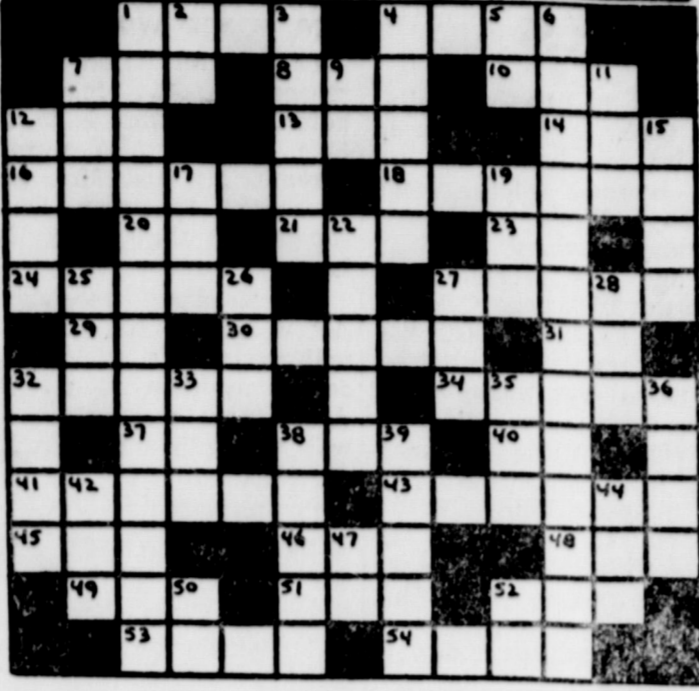

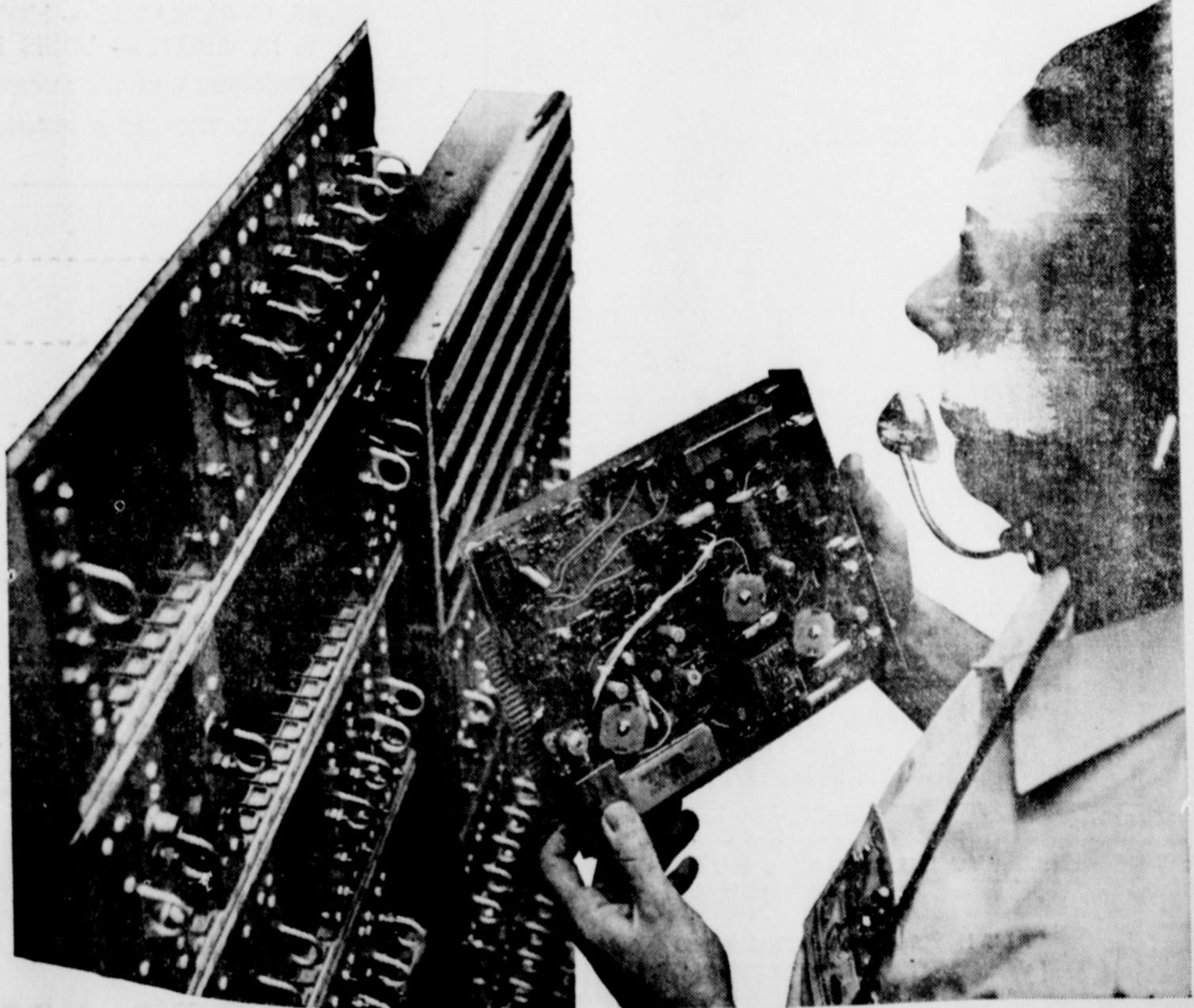
