SIXTY-FIFTH YEAR

Incumbents Returned In City, School Elections

City of Cross Plains and Cross Plains Independent School District voters returned five incumbents to places on the city council and board of trustees in balloting last Saturday.

In the city election, three candidates were re-elected in a

field of six, and in the school balloting both trustees were re-elected in uncontested race.

Jimmielee Payne was the top vote getter in the alderman's race. He polled 148 of the reported 198 total votes. Runner-up was Oscar Koenig who polled 135, and other candidate re-

lected was Gerald Bowden who received 112 votes.

Of the three incumbents the most serious challenge came from Bob Roady. He polled 72 votes. Other two newcomers to local politics who were seeking a councilman's seat were Roland Jones, who got 69 votes, and

H. G. Wellmaker, who polled 39.

No write-in votes were reported by Mrs. W. F. (Bill) Kilgore, election judge. She was assisted in the voting by Mrs. Zenovia Strickland and Mrs. Bea Jones.

In the school voting, also held at the City Hall, 243 votes were recorded, according to Alton E. Hornsby, judge.

Tommie Harris received 201 votes, and Dr. Carl J. Sohns got 191.

A write-in campaign for Mrs. Charlene Chesshir resulted in her name being written in on 20 ballots. There were no other write-ins.

F. A. Bouchette of Clyde was running unopposed for county school trustee at large. He polled 212 votes. Receiving one write-in each were Jack Scott, Bill Dillard, Lewis Fortune and J. L. Bonner.

Assisting Hornsby in the local and county trustee votes were Mrs. Forrest R. Walker, Mrs. Elvis B. Scott and Mrs. Jimmielee Payne.

City officers are elected for two-year terms. Holdover members of the council are Mayor Doyle Burchfield and Aldermen T. T. Nichols and Raymond DeBusk.

Members of the school board of trustees are named for three-year tenures. Holdover members of that directorate are Noah Johnson, Vernon Phillips, Lewis Fortune, R. D. (Dick) Koenig and Roy Neil Tatom.

IH 20 In Callahan Due \$4 Million In Projects

Four contracts totaling \$4,112,607.96 have been awarded to four contractors for work on Interstate 20 in Callahan County, according to the Texas Highway Commission.

All the contracted work will be under the supervision of District Highway Engineer J. C. Roberts of Abilene.

Collectively the work will take an estimated 425 working days, although it is thought that most of the projects will run concurrently.

The cold, wet weather caused extensive damage to IH 20 and other area highways, and forced most of this work to be done.

Austin Bridge Company of Dallas was awarded a contract for asphalt stabilized base and hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement on 5.7 miles of Interstate Highway 20 in Callahan County. Low bid was \$719,430.85.

The project extends from two miles east of Baird to 0.3 mile east of Mexia Creek. Wade Crawford of Abilene is the

Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 100 working days. Crawford is also in charge of the other three projects.

J. H. Strain & Sons, Inc., of Tye was awarded a contract for asphalt stabilized base and hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement on 9.4 miles of Interstate Highway 20. Low bid was \$1,298,611.32.

The project extends from one mile west of Clyde to two miles east of Baird.

It will take an estimated 125 working days.

Jagoe-Public Company of Denton was awarded a contract for asphalt stabilized base and hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement on 6.7 miles of IH 20. Low bid was \$803,681.61.

The project extends from the Taylor County line to one mile west of Clyde. It also will take an estimated 100 working days.

Dahlstrom Corporation of Dallas was awarded a contract for asphalt stabilized base and hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement on 8.9 miles of IH 20 in Callahan County. Low bid was \$1,190,884.18.

The project extends from 0.3 miles east of Mexia Creek to the Eastland County line and will take an estimated 100 working days.

Pioneer Construction Company, Inc. of Abilene was awarded a contract for hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement on a total of 13.5 miles of highway in Taylor, Callahan, Jones and Haskell Counties. Low bid was \$256,460.76.

C. M. Mitchell, Jr., of Abilene is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 100 working days.

Work slated in Callahan County is on Loop 425 which runs from IH 20 west of Baird to IH 20 east of Baird. It is a distance of 2.757 miles.

Drug, DWI Charges Net \$650 In Fines

A driving while under influence of drugs and two driving while intoxicated hearings held in Callahan County Court before Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr. cost three persons \$650 in fines and \$156 in court costs.

All three charged plead guilty to the charges in the hearings during the past two weeks. Eddie Emerson Lester was fined \$150 and given a 30-day jail sentence, probated for one year, on the drug charge.

Louie Burton was assessed a \$300 fine for DWI, and Silver Medina was handed a \$200 levy on the same charge. Both were given five days in jail.

No addresses were immediately available.

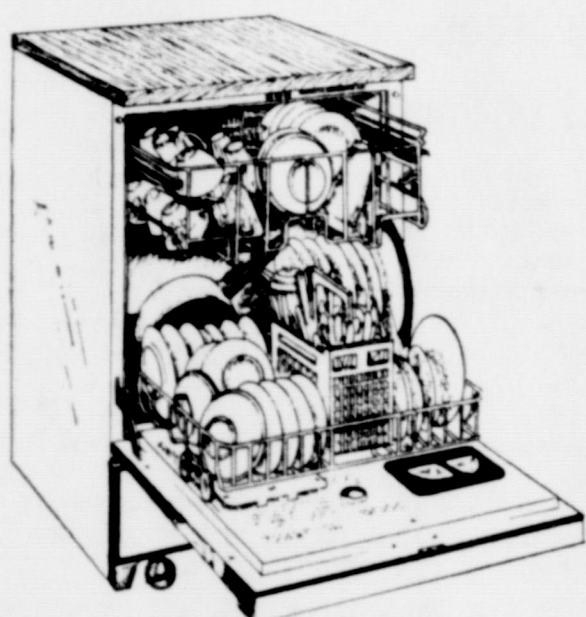

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Capitol Report

By Rep. Lynn Nabers

I have just introduced House Concurrent Resolution 126 requesting that the national administration end its impoundment of funds appropriated to the Farmers Home Administration for water and sewer system grants in rural areas. It is the current policy of President Nixon and his administration to impound certain federal appropriations authorized by the United States Congress. The Congress has appointed \$120,000,000 for grants for water and sewer systems. These funds are now frozen. The appropriated money is a major part of the campaign for revitalization of the rural areas of our country through rural economic growth and the improvement of rural sanitary and health conditions. The improvement of rural water systems is a must if rural areas are to continue to supply the food products to this nation. The curtailment of these funds imperils the success of this revitalization campaign, and I am hopeful that such a request made to the national administration will bring about some relief to the problem. The rural water development program has proven to be a way people can have improved living conditions and bring new life to the rural areas.

H.B. 611 by Rep. Hilary Doran, Jr. of Di Rio has received a favorable report from the Committee on State Affairs and will be considered by the House shortly. The author feels that the citizens of Texas should be able to express their opinion on the issue of Daylight Savings Time, and the bill provides for a referendum on the issue in November of 1974.

Two controversial bills which have recently passed the House are H.B. 143 by Newton and H.B. 177 by Charles Tupper. H.B. 143 calls for mandatory coverage for personal injury protection and certain disability and death benefits unless the insured named in the policy rejects the coverage in writing. H.B. 177 concerns 5 year license plates for automobiles. Although there is some question as to the validity of the statement, it is claimed that this bill if made into law will save the state \$10,000,000 in the first five years.

Subcommittee work on the Penal Code has been completed and the bill will be presented to the full Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence next week.

Mrs. Wayne Ford of Cross Plains is participating in a unique ambulance service program at Brownwood.

Brownwood Community Hospital has assumed ambulance service for that area, and are averaging five calls per day. Every run is handled by a driver and nurse, and all the hospital's licensed and registered nurses and drivers are training as emergency medical technicians.

Mrs. Ford is a member of the hospital's nursing staff.

Rising Star Sailor Helping Clear Mines

Navy Electrician's mate Fireman Apprentice Thomas W. Perkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Perkins of Route 1, Rising Star, is a crewmember of the minesweeper, USS Engage, a contingent unit of a special task force which is clearing mines from North Vietnamese harbor.

A 1969 graduate of Rising Star High School, he attended Cisco Junior College, and he joined the Navy in July 1971.

The minesweeping, called "Operation End Sweep," is being conducted by minesweeper ships and specially-equipped helicopters operating from ships on anchorage off Hai-phong harbor.

His ship is homeported at Guam.

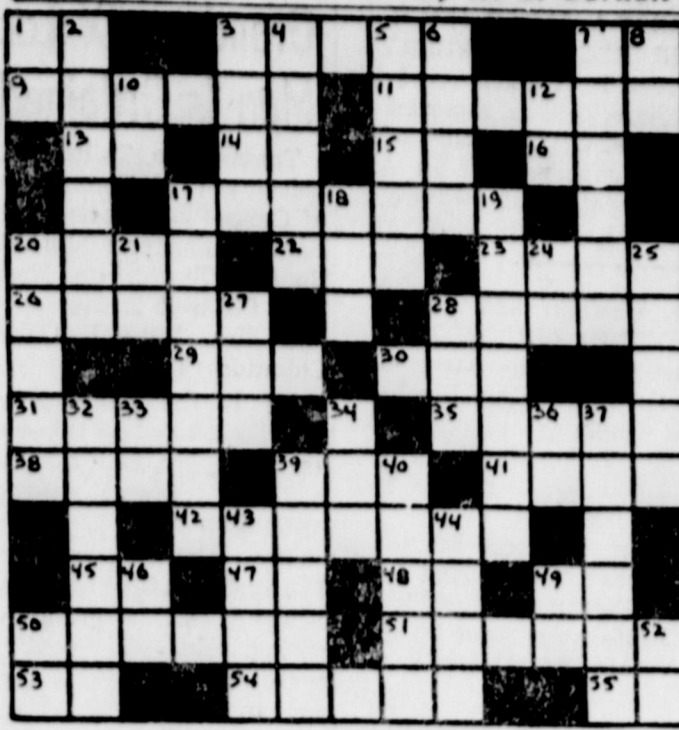

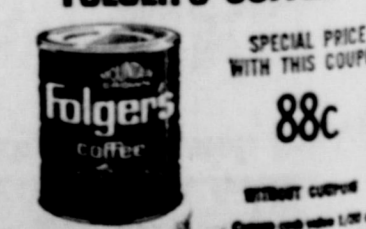
