98 Students Earn Honor Roll Places

Ninety-eight students at Cross Plains schools earned honor roll status for the fifth six-week period, according to a roster released Tuesday morning by school officials.

Arthur Boyle, elementary principal, listed 70 students in the first eight grades who won places on the elite list, and Scot Edington, high school principal, reported 28 classroom stars in the top four grades.

To be eligible for the honor roll, a student must maintain a general average of 90.

Grand Jury True Bills Canada For "Murder"

Selan Canada, 50, has been indicted by a 42nd District Court Grand Jury for the attempted murder in connection with the shooting of Callahan County Deputy Sheriff Luke Taylor. The incident happened on March 2.

Canada, who has been free from jail on \$5,000 bond since the shooting, will have a trial date set during regular arraignment proceedings this week, according to Judge Don Lane.

Three other felony indictments were returned Thursday by the grand jury.

Marshall S'blett and Danny Weeks were indicted for "malicious destruction of private property," in connection with a Jan. 6, incident in which several street lights and pickup campers were damaged by gunfire. Two expensive German Shepherd dogs were found shot to death at one of the shooting scenes, officers said.

Conn Rider was indicted for driving while intoxicated (DWI), second offense.

Information was presented to the grand jury by Criminal Dist. Atty. Ed Paynter and Asst. Dist. Atty. Billy John Edwards.

Shanks Sodomy Trial Re-Set For May 10

Trial of Callahan County Attorney James Paul Shanks on a charge of sodomy has been rescheduled for Thursday, May 19, in 167th District Court in Austin. The trial was originally set for Monday, but was postponed on the request of Shanks' attorney, Charles Burton of Austin.

Shanks, 40, and two other men were arrested by a park ranger in an Austin park on February 13 and charged with sodomy. Shanks has said that he was an innocent by-stander in the case.

The trial is reported to be before a judge only, without jury, and is reported that the state plans only one witness, the arresting park ranger.

Superintendent Wayne Ford also was re-hired through June 1974, as was Miss Betty Browning, kindergarten and federal programs coordinator.

Both local vocational instructors were re-hired. They are O. B. Edmondson, agriculture, and Mrs. Betty Odom, home economics.

Re-elected in the Title I and special services programs, pending approval of those programs, are two teacher aides, Mrs. Billie Clausen and Mrs. Wesley Ingram. Also re-named as half-time Title I aide and half-time special service instructor is Mrs. Pat Lee.

Possible Arson In School Fire Probed

Possibility of arson in the fire which destroyed the Cross Plains Elementary School in January 1972 is being investigated here by City Marshal Chuck Thomas.

Thomas took three suspects to Austin Tuesday of last week to undergo a polygraph test in connection with the possible arson. Results of the test, administered by Texas Department of Public Safety personnel, are not final at this time, according to the city marshal.

One other suspect, which had not been available, is scheduled to also undergo the polygraph test within 15 days.

Thomas said that each of the suspects had implied that the other suspects were possibly involved in the fire.

The marshal also stated that investigation into the matter is definitely being continued.

Dave Perkins, who has been doing carpenter work in and around Cross Plains since last summer, will open a custom wood products shop on West Eighth Street, across from Citizen's State Bank, in the near future.

The shop will produce a wide variety of novelty and gift items, and will make specialty furniture, gun racks and cases, storage chests, children's furniture, games, toys, puzzles, carved name or address plaques and a host of other wood items.

Perkins has considerable experience in repairing restoring and refinishing furniture and antiques, and will incorporate this service into the shop.

Advance orders for the products and services are already coming in and are being scheduled into the operations.

The shop is currently being refitted and tooling is on the way. If everything goes according to schedule, limited operations should begin early in May with full productions before the end of the month.

Business will be known as Plainsman Wood Products, and the official opening will be announced as soon as tooling and refitting is complete.

Future plans include the addition of an upholstery shop and the manufacture of upholstered furniture with specialization in custom one-of-a-kind pieces.

A marketing service is also planned to help sell the handicraft products made by senior citizens, shut-ins, handicapped and hobbyists.

He moved here from California with his family in 1972 after studying various factors and deciding that Cross Plains has the economic advantages, the geographic location, the transportation services and the potential for growth needed to support his planned activities.

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Ever 65? Not On Hospital Medicare? See Soc. Sec. Rep.

Starting July 1, people 65 and older who haven't been able to get Medicare hospital insurance may be eligible. They may apply for the protection according to R. R. Tuley, security district manager.

Previously, to get Medicare hospital insurance, you had to be over 65 and have a social security benefit eligibility, or be a "former SS credits." Tuley said that the new amendment allows 65 or over who are not eligible before may purchase Medicare hospital insurance protection. However, they must also sign up for the Medicare part of Medicare not already in that part. The new provision extends Medicare coverage to people 65 or over who have no work credit under social security and who are often unable to get comparable insurance through private companies.

The initial premium for hospital insurance will be \$33 a month plus \$6.30 a month for Medicare. The program will begin July 1, 1973. People who sign up before July 1, who are not otherwise eligible for hospital insurance, there is a 7-month period for both the hospital and medical insurance parts of Medicare. "You can apply during the 3 months before you're 65, or the 3 months after your birthday, or the 3 months after you're 65 to get coverage beginning with the month you become 65," Tuley added.

Starting in July, Medicare will also be extended to workers under 65 who have been getting monthly disability payments from social security or railroad retirement for 2 years or more—and to many people with chronic kidney disease.

The Abilene social security office is in the P. O. Bldg., 300 block of Pine St. The phone number is (915) 677-5262. The local post office has a schedule of SS representatives who visit throughout the district if a trip to Abilene is not convenient.

Capitol Report

By Rep. Lynn Nabers

There have been several bills introduced this session which should be of great concern to the people involved in the business or agriculture. This bill would remove the exemption from the limited sales, excise and use tax for machinery or equipment used exclusively or employed on farms or ranches in the production of food for human consumption, production of grass, the building or maintaining of roads and water facilities, feed for any form of animal life, or other agricultural products to be sold in the regular course of business. This forceful bill is now in the subcommittee of the Committee on Revenue and Taxation.

The Predator Animal Bill which deals with the control of predator animals by means of aircraft has been reported favorably out of the Committee on Environmental Affairs and will soon come to the House floor for consideration.

H. B. 1250 by Rep. Matt Garcia of San Antonio makes it illegal to hire any person who is not entitled to lawful residence in the United States. The violation of this law would constitute a misdemeanor with a fine of not less than \$200 or more than \$500. It is also stated in the bill that each alien hired would be a separate offense.

The House competitive car insurance bill by Rep. Don Cavness of Austin has been substituted by the governor's bill which gives the insurance board a stronger role than Cavness wanted. He informed the House Committee on Insurance that the board would be required to approve rates higher or lower than those set out in the bill. The committee members want to wait for several days before voting on the bill because the governor's substitute for Cavness' bill and they need more time to study. The substitute is strongly favored by State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christi. It is my finding that Texans get back as little as 45 cents for each of their insurance dollars in certain coverages. I believe that the present system may be a good one and that all that is needed is for the board to lower rates so the companies won't make such big profits.

The Senate version of the competitive rates bill was introduced by Sen. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas and Sen. H. J. "Doc" Blanchard of Lubbock. It has been set for hearing by the Senate Economic Development Committee on April 19.

Died Here Friday**

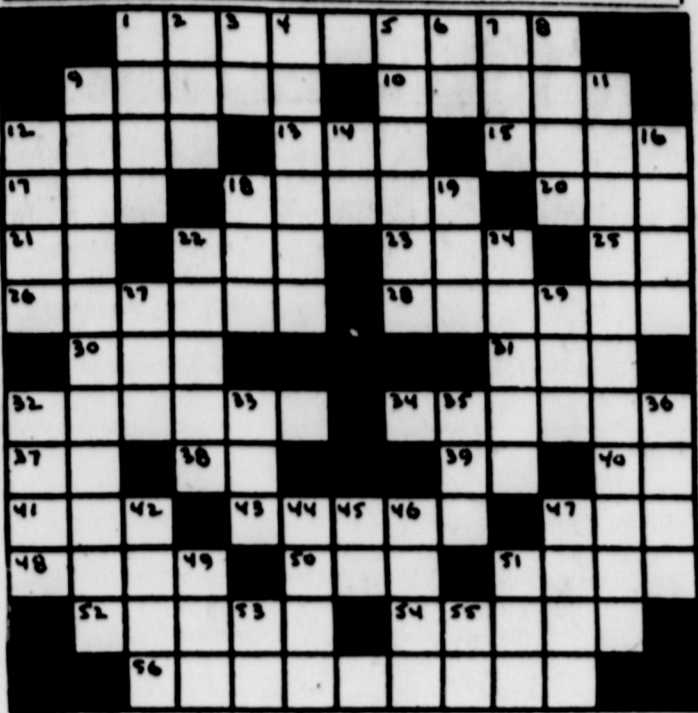

None of the five Buffaloes vying in the regional UIL meet at Stephenville last week, but the group did post better performances.

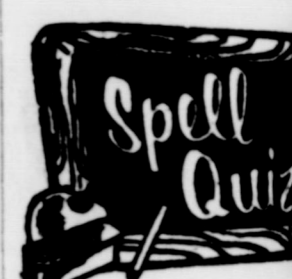
