SIXTY-FIFTH YEAR

Bufs Keep L. L. Lead But Absorb First Loss

Bufs retained the leadership of Cross Plains Little League, but were handed the first loss of the young season.

Beadels issued the challenge to the Bufs by clipping the leaders 13-8 in Friday's opener. Beadels, who moved into a tie for second place after last week's action, were the only team to record two triumphs in last week end's action.

The J.R.B. Supermarket sponsored Beadels countered four Buf runs in the home half of the first in Friday's curtain-raiser. The eventual winners added five tallies in the second and insured the 13-8 victory with four more scores in the third frame. Bufs did tally three in the second and get another in the third before Beadels iced the game. Clean-up hitter Glynn Nickerson, who collected two doubles and a single, led the Beadels 10-hit attack. Leading hitter for the Bufs was Greg Pancake who managed a triple and a single.

Cats rallied in late innings in Friday's nightcap for a 17-10 win over the Kilowatts. The win temporarily put the Cats in a tie for first place with the Bufs. Kilowatts, designated as the home team, tallied three runs in the first to post a 3-1 margin, and counted another in the second frame. With a 4-1 edge, Kilowatts countered two Cat runs in the third before seven Cats crossed home plate in the fourth frame. Kilowatts rallied in the bottom of the inning for a 10-10 tie. Seven more Cats scored in the top of the fifth frame. Robby Bailey hit three singles to pace the Cat attack, and Bill McCowen paced Kilowatt hitters with a triple, double and two singles in four plate appearances.

Bufs rebounded from Friday's defeat by nipping the Cats 8-7 in the first game Saturday. Bufs tallied two in the first and five in the home half of the second inning while Cats scored one run each in the first two frames. A five-run Cat rally in the top of the third knotted the score at 7-7, and Duane Hutchins scored the winning run in the last of the fourth after singling on a bingle by Jackie Strickland, who was the winners' leading hitter with a pair of two-baggers and the game-winning single in three at bats. Jerry Luceford paced the Cat attack with a double and a single in two official trips to the plate.

Kilowatts again got off to a fast start in Saturday's nightcap, scoring two runs in home half of the initial frame overcoming a single tally by Beadel Jimmy Kelly. The eventual winners, Beadels who took a 7-4 decision, grabbed a 4-2 advantage in the second with a trio of runs. Neither team scored in

the third inning, but each counted a single run in the fourth. Beadels padded the lead to 7-3 in the top of fifth, and a Kilowatt rally just managed a single run in the last of the frame. Winning pitcher Richard Allen, who went the distance, surrendered just four hits, two of which were collected by Bill McCowen, a double and a single. Leading Beadel hitter was again Glynn Nickerson, who collected two doubles and a single in three plate appearances. Beadels collected seven team hits.

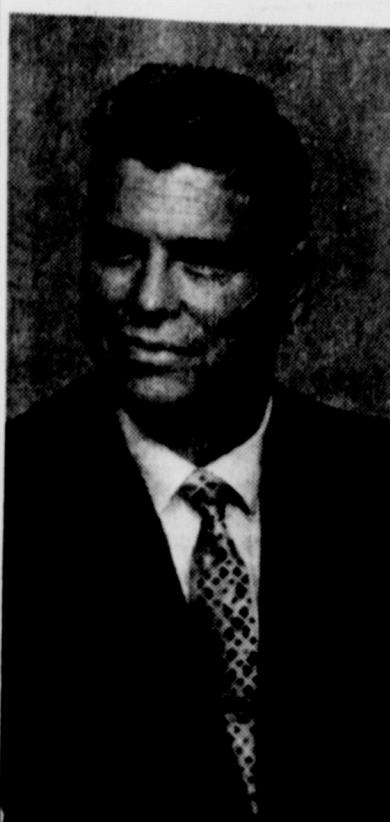

Pioneer Bluegrass Event Starts 3-Day Run Friday

Some of the southwest's most talented Bluegrass musicians are expected this week end at Pioneer's Sharn Park located seven miles east of Cross Plains.

Bluegrass banjo, mandolin

and guitar pickers as well as fiddlers from throughout the southwest are to be in attendance at the three-day musicale which promises a feull week end of activities.

Tickets for the event are set

at \$2 Friday, \$3 Saturday and \$3 Sunday with a three day ticket at \$6. It was pointed out that tickets are good for the entire day's activities allowing freedom to come and go throughout each day.

Featured bands include The Stone Mountain Boys, The Oklahoma Bluegrass Gentlemen, The Lambert Brothers, The Country Kinfolk, The Oak Grove Travelers, The Village Creek Ramblers, and The Bluegrass Drifters as well as amateur bands from throughout the southwest.

The festival of Bluegrass is the second happening of this type for the park following an initial festival last September which featured Bill Monroe and the Bluegrass Boys as well as several other Nashville bands.

Planned for Friday of the week end is amateur contests including band contests and banjo and guitar pickin' contests. An evening stage show is set for 6 p.m. with some of the contracted bands.

Saturday schedule is set to get underway at 10 a.m. with morning jam sessions and afternoon and evening stage shows with all bands.

Sunday's show will include a morning worship service with Bluegrass style gospel singing, and an afternoon stage show with all the bands.

Sharon Park is said to have available lots of shade and conveniences for weekenders and complete concessions for guests throughout the three days.

Gasoline Rationed; No Immediate Crisis Seen

Gasoline in Cross Plains is not yet in short supply, as has been the case in other sections of the country, but local stations are being allocated only so much of the fuel.

It was the consensus of most of the retail station operators here that at present there is no immediate crisis. It was pointed out, however, that allocations for the month of June would not be completely known until the first of the month and possible shortages could develop. Most of the Cross Plains station operators have reported that they are supposed to receive at least as much as they sold a year ago. One station manager was told several days ago that he would not get any more gasoline until June, but a few days later more was delivered.

Two local petroleum distributors indicated that they do not believe that they will have any big problem with obtaining ample amounts of gasoline for agricultural customers. One said that he now has on hand 100 per cent of the amount that was used in that industry last year. Another, however, said that he had not received notice

of how much he would get, but did say that he could not take new accounts for other industrial purposes.

One retail station attendant indicated that diesel fuel is in short supply, and that he has had trouble obtaining adequate amounts. Diesel fuel had been allotted or rationed since January 1. Most oil companies have voluntarily rationed or apportioned supplies of other petroleum fuels to comply with directives from the federal government.

One local distributor said that agriculture in general has top priority on getting gasoline. He said that the cultivation, production and preserving food was the top priority for obtaining gasoline.

One operator said that it boils down to a month by month allotment. If a big run develops, shortage of fuel could result in Cross Plains.

Shelter To Be Built At Atwell Cemetery

An estimated 60 persons attended the annual Memorial Service at Atwell Cemetery last Sunday.

Four persons gave brief talks during the activities. They are B. C. Chrisman of Baird, Lowell Burks of Lake Brownwood and Glen Purvis of Walnut Springs and Pauline Reed, of Brownwood.

It was reported that a shelter will be constructed near the cemetery at Atwell under which gatherings in future years will be held. It is reported that about \$600 has been collected for that purpose. It is expected that a report on donations to the cemetery will be published in next week's Review.

Callahan Shares Lead In 4-County Bond Sales

Callahan County has surged into a share of the lead with Brown County in percentage of 1973 goal achieved in new purchases of U.S. Savings Bonds in those two counties and Coleman and Eastland counties.

Howard E. Farmer of Baird, Callahan bond chairman, reported April sales of \$19,854 for an aggregate of \$43,495, or 31 per cent of the standard of \$140,000, attained during the first four months of 1973. Callahan County was a distant third at last reporting by the Department of the Treasury.

Brown County, always high in the four-county ranking, sold \$18,310 worth of Series E and H bonds in April for a total of \$112,747, also 31 per cent of its goal of \$360,000.

Coleman County rates third with 25 per cent of its quota of \$140,000 attained. April sales

there amounted to \$8,132, according to Chairman Robert I. Bowen, Jr. of Coleman. The four-month aggregate there is \$35,187.

Eastland County is fourth with 22 per cent of its goal of \$320,000 reached. April sales there totaled \$16,333, and the total for the first third of 1973 stands at \$72,086.

April sales in Texas totaled \$19,525,843 exceeding last year's \$17,331,291 by \$2,194,552. Year-to-date sales amounted to \$83,791,839, an increase of \$9,533,410 over 1972 sales of \$74,258,429.

Nationwide, monthly sales were \$562 million, 11.8% above 1972 sales of \$502 million. Exchanges of Series E and Savings Notes for Series H Bonds amounting to \$30 million were reported for April, 13% above the \$27 million exchanged last year.

She added that eight fish ranging in weight from 12 to 16 pounds were caught as were an estimated 25 fish weighing from 4 to 10 pounds.

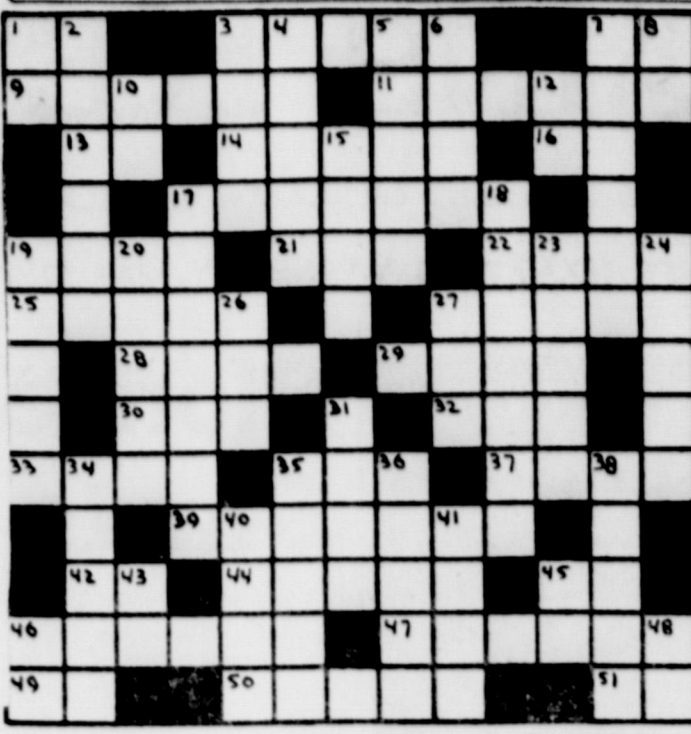

60% Adults Getting S.S. Are Women

Sixty percent of adults getting monthly social security payments are women, according to R. R. Tuley, social security district manager in Abilene.

"Twenty-three million adults are paid social security benefits," Mr. Tuley said, "and 13.8 million are women. About 6 million women get monthly retirement benefits based on their own social security work records—20 times as many as in 1950."

About half of the women getting retirement checks became eligible on their husband's earnings records, he said.

A working woman can retire at 62 and get reduced monthly payments on her own record. Or she can wait until she's 65 and get full benefits as well as Medicare coverage.

"But if she's entitled to higher benefits as a wife or a widow on her husband's record," Bob Tuley said, "she'll be paid the higher amount."

"The working woman has both disability and survivors protection from social security," he said. "If she becomes severely disabled and cannot work for a year or more, she and her family may be eligible for monthly cash payments from social security. And starting July 1, 1973, workers of any age who've been getting social security disability payments for two years or more may be eligible for Medicare."

About 460,000 children get monthly social security payments based on their mother's work records, he said. "A child who is entitled to monthly social security payments based on the mother's record can get them even though the child's father may be working at a full-time job," Mr. Tuley said.

He married Clara Walker in 1922. She died in 1960.

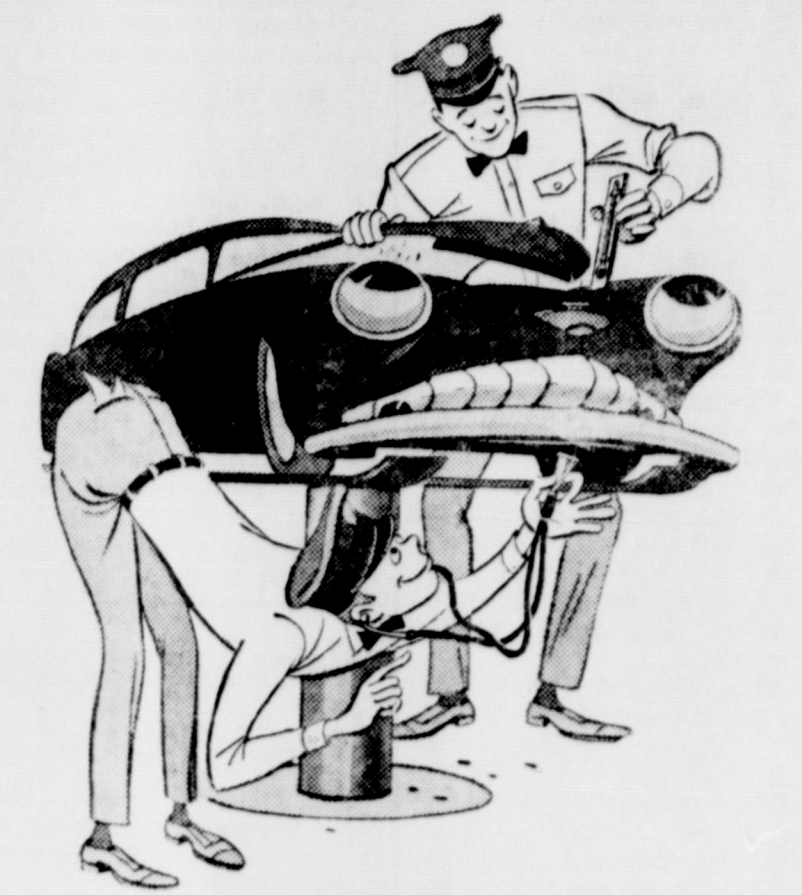

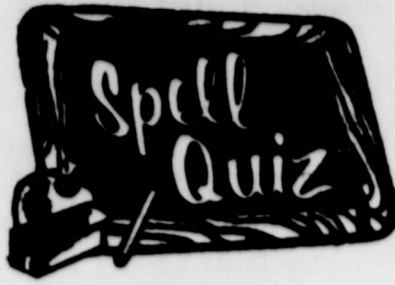
