Deputy Taylor, shot in the head with a shotgun on March 2 near Baird, died at 5:50 p.m. Monday in a nursing home at Clyde.

Taylor, 67, was in an Abilene hospital for several weeks after the shooting before being transferred to the nursing home at Clyde.

Funeral services for Mr. Taylor will be held at 3 p.m. Wednesday at the First Baptist Church at Clyde with the Rev. Riley Fugitt, pastor, officiating.

## USDA Asks Farmers To Report Short Fuel

Petroleum fuels are becoming increasingly hard to get, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture has enlisted the assistance of county Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service offices to help monitor the fuel distribution.

The following release came from J. C. Earp, Jr., county executive director of the Callahan ASCS office at Baird.

"To help assure that farmers don't run short of fuel this season, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is asking farmers to:

—Report any shortages to local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Offices, and

—Use fuel conserving methods with tractors, trucks and other machine driven equipment.

"The Department since February has been monitoring the farm fuel supply situation through its more than 2,800 ASCS County Offices. Any shortages are reported immediately through State ASCS Offices to Washington. Any problems that arise are forwarded immediately to the Office of Oil and Gas (OOG), U. S. Department of the Interior, for solution under the voluntary allocation program.

"ASCS said some suppliers have not been able to meet farm customers' needs fully. Officials said this is partly because independent and cooperative fuel producers and marketers have not been able to obtain enough supplies. The current planting period is critical to farm production. Officials involved do follow ups on shortage reports to make certain that corrective action is being taken.

USDA has been working with the Departments of Treas-

ury and the Interior to encourage farm fuel conservation practices. Farmers can conserve fuel use by keeping tractors tuned and using minimum tillage practices, for example.

"USDA officials also urged farmers not to buy more fuel than they need in the near future. Officials stressed that equitable distribution is necessary if all farmers are to have enough fuel.

"Public hearing will be held June 11-13 in Washington by the Treasury Department to see how the voluntary crude oil and product allocation program is working. Persons wishing to supply written testimony should contact Kenneth L. Dupuy, U. S. Department of the Interior, Washington, D.C. 20240, on or before 5 p.m. June 7."

## Aerial Spraying Mesquite Proved To Be Profitable

Increased forage production is the ranchers principal objective, and this can be done by aerial spraying mesquite, according to A. H. Ringhoffer, Range Conservationist of Conservation Service at Baird.

Results of grazing studies following aerial spraying, by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, over a 12 year period, indicate a 20 to 22 per cent increase in the amount of forage utilized by cattle. This increase is for a 4-year period immediately following aerial spraying.

The above studies were made on upland range sites in Shackelford and Throckmorton Counties, which are similar to local rangelands. The sites were deferred for a 3-month period immediately following spraying. This deferral permits the grasses to effectively use the additional moisture normally used by the mesquite.

Additional benefits were also obtained on the above sites that were sprayed. Reductions in labor and winter supplemental feed are the major benefits from spraying. Most ranchers felt that time spent checking

cattle in a pasture during the summer was reduced about 15 per cent in pastures where trees were dead and remained standing. Also, the average amount of protein supplement per cow annually decreased from 90 to 60 pounds per year after spraying.

Aerial spraying for control of mesquite was scheduled to begin in Callahan County about June 5 according to Ringhoffer. In addition to having adequate moisture to insure at least 30 days of growth prior to spraying, aerial spraying should be delayed until the soil temperature has reached 75 degrees Fahrenheit or higher at the time of spraying. The soil temperature should be taken at a depth of 12 to 14 inches on the coldest significant soil in the pasture to be sprayed.

When aerial spraying re-growth mesquite, farmers and ranchers should allow a minimum of 4 years or 5 or 6 feet of height before spraying. Ringhoffer stated. Additional information on aerial spraying may be obtained from the local SCS Field Office.

## 2 Shallow Wells Finaled At Baird

Lewis Production Co. Inc., of Abilene completed two regular field wells five miles north of Baird.

No. 16 Jackson Estate spots 760 feet from the south and 205 feet from the west lines of Section 1,4 ETRR Survey.

Daily potential was five barrels of 39 gravity oil, pumping from perforations at 868-872 feet. The pay was treated with 250 gallons of mud acid and fractured with 50 sacks of sand.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 944 feet. Total depth was 1,000 feet, plugged back to 944 feet.

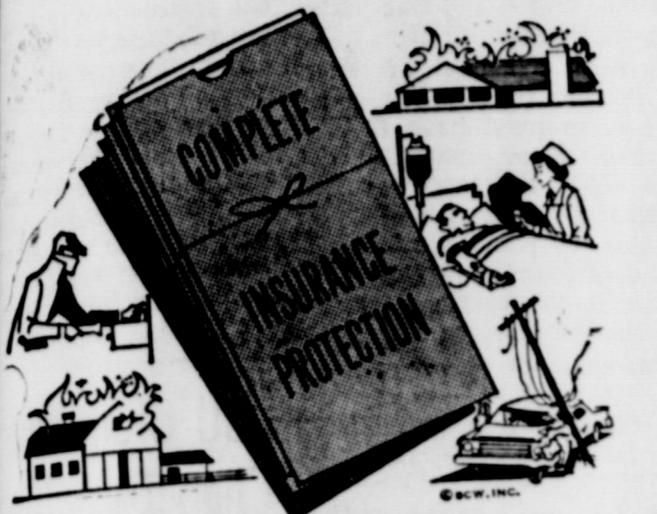

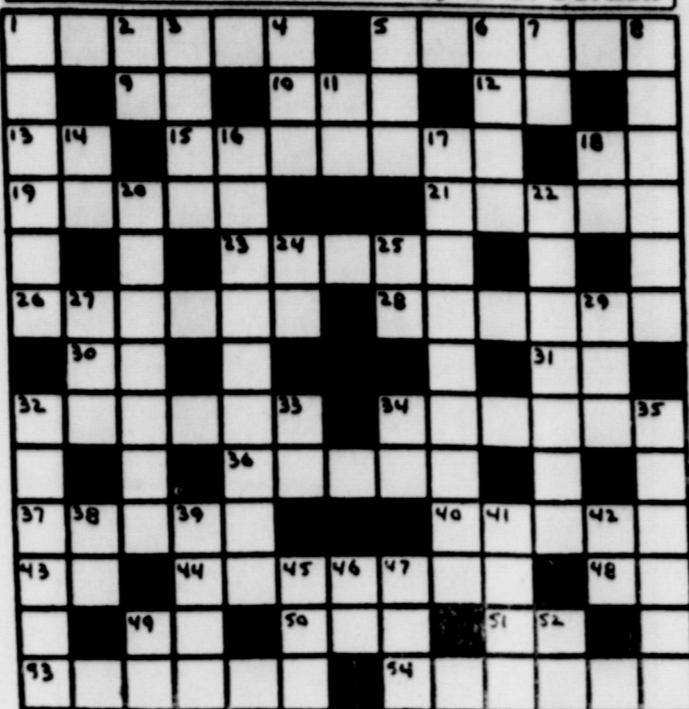

# 2.71 Inches Of Rain Measured In City

Stormy clouds have dumped 2.71 inches of rain on Cross Plains in the past few days.

Saturday night and early Sunday the city received 2.37 inches of rain. That was complete with moderate winds, vivid lightning and some light hail. Threatening clouds have appeared in the area almost daily since Saturday's rain, and early Tuesday morning the city received another .34 of an inch of rain. Light sprinkles fell here later Tuesday morning.

Much heavier rains fell in the area last week end. Burkett and Cross Cut both reported measurements up to three inches, and the former community got another fine rain Tuesday morning early. Rowden reported 1.50 inches on Sunday, and about another inch Tuesday. At Pioneer 2.25 inches was gauged Sunday morning, and another .25 to .75 of an inch was received Tuesday. In the Atwell community 1.30 inches was measured during the week end and about .10 of an inch fell early Tuesday.

The Sabanno community has received an aggregate of 3.00 inches. About 2.50 inches fell last week end, and another half-inch was gauged Monday afternoon. No rain fell there Tuesday morning. At Cottonwood the moisture totaled almost two inches with 1.70 inches being measured Sunday and another .20 Tuesday.

The moisture was a boon to farmers preparing to plant peanuts and other crops, but grain harvest was delayed by the moisture. The small grain prospects was not thought to be hurt appreciably by the moisture although some wind damage was reported to fields.

The 2.71 inches here brings the year's total to 10 a.m. Tuesday to 15.65 inches, according to figures by F. C. Newton, official weather observer here.

# News From A. S. C. S.

The following explanations and reminders were contained in a news letter received from J. C. Earp, Jr., county executive director of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service with headquarters in the courthouse at Baird.

**Report cotton, feed grain, peanut and set-aside acreage.** July 2, 1973 is the final date to report cotton, feed grain and set-aside acreage. A certification of zero acreage is required for program participants, even when no acreage is planted. Payments cannot be computed until acreages are reported. The earlier you report the earlier you are paid. August 1, 1973 is the final date to report peanut acreage.

**Skip-Row Planting of Peanuts:** Peanuts planted in a skip-row pattern must have 8 normal rows idle or planted to another crop or they will be counted as solid peanuts. If you plan to plant competitive crops with peanuts come by the office and discuss the requirements before planting.

**Protection of Feed Grain Base:** At least 45 percent of the total farm feed grain base must be planted to hold history. A 20 percent base reduction will be made each year the planting requirement is not met, with a total loss of base following three consecutive years of failure to plant. If you have questions about this, let us know.

**Grazing or Haying of Set-aside:** No grazing or haying of set-aside is permitted without prior approval of the county committee and a reduction in payment. Deferment period for set-aside not approved for grazing is April 30 to October 1.

**Crop Reports:** During the last half of May, some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. This

information will be the basis for determining the acreage for the State of Texas and for each county. Estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning marketings and in presenting an unbiased picture of Agriculture.

**Save Your Wheat Allowance:** If you did not get your planted you still have to plant feed grain (mangrove, or corn) and protect allotment by reporting planted acreage to this no later than July 2. Doubt check with the office the acreage needed for farm.

**Set-Aside Acreage:** The rent instructions provide the productivity of set-aside acreage must be at least equal to the productivity of cropland on the farm. Instructions further provide that if a producer designates average land for set-aside, entire program payments computed on the basis of yield determined for the low average set-aside.
