## Beadels Win L.L. Crown; Local All-Stars Revealed

Beadels won the championship of Cross Plains Little League in a playoff game Monday night with defending champs Buffs. The J.R.B. Super Market sponsored Beadels took the pennant 3-2 in a hard-fought nine inning affair.

Following the playoff contest, 14 of the local Little Leaguers were named to the all-star team, along with five alternates. The elite squad will represent Cross Plains in the area playoff game with Clyde all-stars, thought to be scheduled here on Thursday, July 19.

The 14 local star baseballers all 11 or 12 years old, were selected by coaches of the four teams Tuesday of last week, but were not revealed until after the completion of play Monday.

Picked from the Kilowatts are Richard King and Grady Wooten.

The five alternates, one or more of who will play if one or more regular all-stars cannot

play, are Robby Bailey and Randy Dillard of the Cats, Dennis Dickson of the Beadels and Bill McCowen and Bill Reed of the Kilowatts.

Coaches for the all-star team will be Harold (Buck) Brown of the Cats and Jack Strickland of the Buffs. Coaching assistant will be Billy King of the Buffs. Terry Watson, who broke his foot last part of the season, was named as coach's alternate. He played with the Kilowatts.

uled for action in the Clyde-Cross Plains playoff will be Pete Golson and Don Gosnell.

Winner of the Callahan County area game will advance to the district tournament. It will be held at Coleman, but dates of that event were not learned here Tuesday morning.

It took nine innings to decide a champion of Cross Plains Little League Monday night.

Beadels and Buffs were locked in a scoreless duel for eight innings before both teams tal-

lied in the eighth frame.

The Beadels, the visiting team, cracked the ice as lead-off batter Eddie Hedrick reached second on a two-base error. He scored on a single by Billy Golson. Buffs tied the score in the homehalf of the frame. Greg Pancake drew a walk to lead off the inning. He scored on a hit ball by Tommy Kitchens, which was scored as an error.

Beadels bounced back in the ninth for two runs. Richard Allan doubled to start the frame and came home on a single by Glynn Nickerson. Nickerson then scored, with two outs, on a single by Hedrick.

Buffs rallied, but fell short by a run. Edward Webb got to third base on a hit ball which caused a fielding error. He then scored on Pancake's triple.

Ricky Thomas was the winning pitcher in three innings of relief of starter Nickerson who toiled six innings. Loser was Webb in three relief innings of starter Pancake who also worked six frames. Nickerson surrendered two hits four bases on balls while striking out 15. Pancake allowed only one clean hit, one walk and fanned nine. Thomas allowed the one clean hit, walked three and whiffed six. Webb the two hits, walked none and struck out four.

## Recent County Court Cases Cost 9 \$1,800

Nine persons entered guilty pleas before Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr. in Callahan County Court the past two weeks on eight counts of driving while intoxicated and one driving while license suspended charge.

The nine paid fines of \$1,800 and court costs of \$472. No addresses were immediately available on any of the accused.

Three fines of \$300 each were levied for DWI. Paying that amount were E. C. Reese, who also got 30 days in jail probated for 18 months, S. T. Coker, Jr., who was given three days in jail, and John Thomas Bruce, who was sentenced to 30 days in jail, probated a year.

Frank Wentermuth Snell paid a \$250 fine and got a one-year probation on a 30-day jail term on a DWI charge.

A 72 hour jail sentence and a \$50 fine was levied against Robert Sidney Burks for driving while license suspended.

Fines of \$150 and 30-day jail terms probated a year were assessed against four others charged with DWI. They are Charles David Finney, Wanda Randolph, Jack Wilson Rash and Floyd DeWayne Rogers.

## Shanks Sodomy Trial Re-Set For Sept. 4

A third postponement in the trial of Callahan County Attorney James Paul Shanks of Baird, on a count of sodomy has been announced. New trial date is September 4 in 167th District Court at Austin. The trial was originally set for April and later in June.

Shanks will be tried before Judge Thomas Blackwell without a jury. Another man, Roberto Caravee, will also be heard without a jury. The third man charged in the sodomy count, Ronald Burke, is slated to go to trial with a jury in mid July. All three were arrested in a restroom at an Austin park by a city park ranger on February 13 and charged with sodomy.

It was explained by Travis County District Attorney Bob Smith that in situations like this jury trials are always held first. Indicating that Shanks and Caravee trials will not be held until after the proceedings against Burke are completed.
