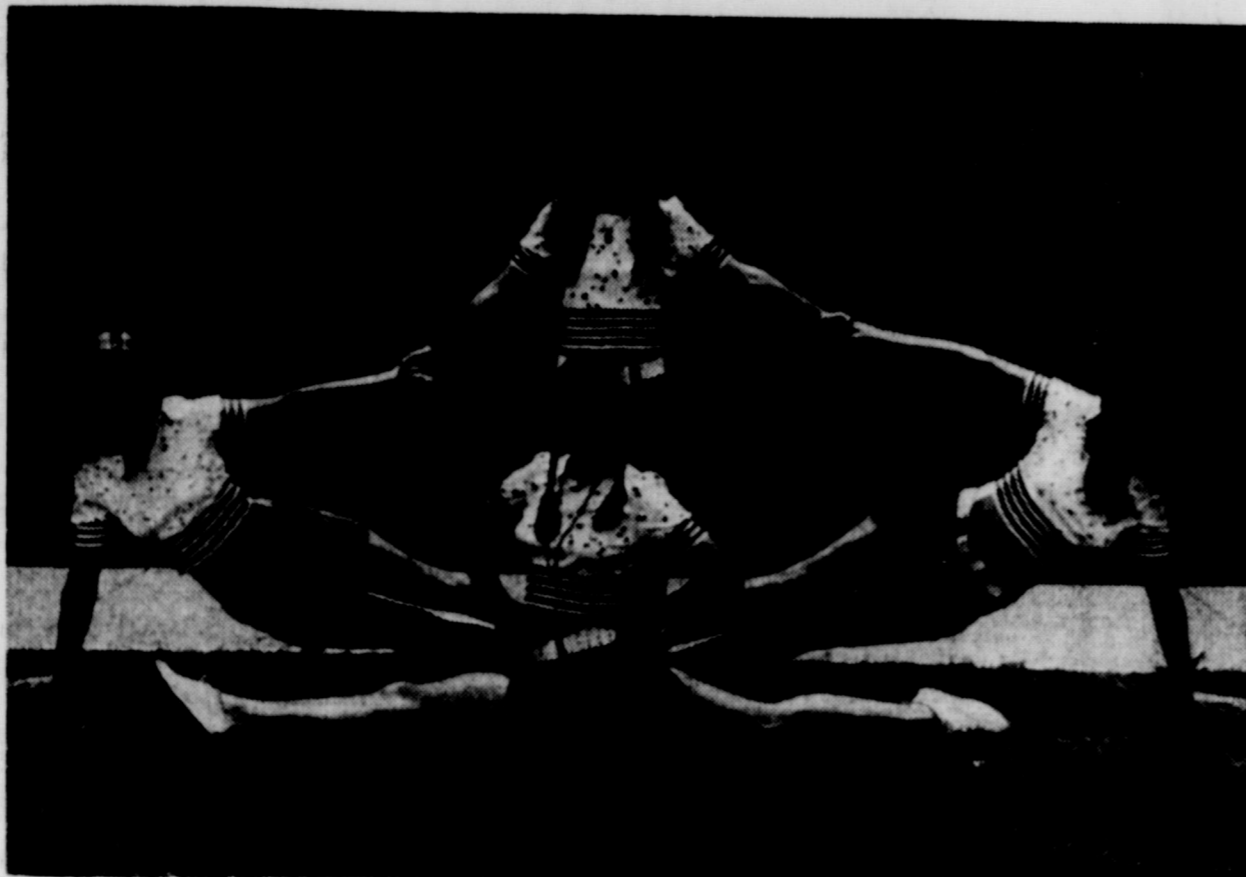

Bank Deposits Hit All-Time High Here

Deposits at the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains are at an all-time high.

At the close of business on June 30, the Cross Plains bank had a total of demand and time and savings deposits of \$6,386,295.31. That total is listed in a report of condition advertise-

ment, required to be published by the State Banking Commission, elsewhere in this issue of the Review.

It was pointed out that total demand deposits amounted to \$3,051,743.85, and total time and savings deposits totaled \$3,334,551.46.

Jack W. Tunnell, president, and Leonard H. Mosley, vice-president, noted that the total is an all-time high for end of any quarter of the year. They explained that more than six million dollars was held on deposit at the local financial institution after the first of the year, and now the figure approaches the six and one-half million dollar mark.

Increased prices of raw agricultural produce and higher livestock prices have had a direct effect on the increased deposits at the local bank.

Bank have also announced that effective Monday, July 9, certificates of deposit and passbook savings accounts will earn a higher rate of interest. The higher interest rate was recently approved by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

The following interest rates on certificates of deposit were announced by bank officials.

Certificates of deposit for six to 12 month will earn 5½ per cent interest. Those for 12 months to two and one-half years will earn 6 per cent interest, and CD's for two and one-half years and over will earn 6½ per cent.

It was pointed out that the interest rate on all certificates of deposit for over \$100,000 will be negotiable.

Regular passbook savings accounts are now earning 5 per cent. That rate became effective on July 1, 1973.

Sunday Rain Varies Widely Over Locality

Rainfall varied from heavy downpours to light sprinkles in the Cross Plains area last Sunday afternoon.

Apparently the top amount measured in this section was in the Rowden community where over three inches reported at the N. V. Gibbs farm. A few miles west at the Roy Thornton place just two inches was gauged. Baird reported 40 of an inch. The Larry Byrd place at Cross Cut received 2.80 inches, and the Les Byrd farm got 1.30 inches.

The spotted showers dropped two inches of moisture at the Roger Watson place between here and Burkett, and the Bur-

kett township got 1.50. The rainfall was lighter in most other areas. At Pioneer one gauge measured .50 of an inch. In the Atwell area Dayton Sessions got almost an inch while at the Alton Tatam farm only 10 of an inch fell. The Sabanno sector ranged from a sprinkle to 20 of an inch at the Edwin Erwin home. Cottonwood township recorded only a trace.

In Cross Plains, F. C. Newton, official weather observer, gauged 26 of an inch. That is all the moisture received here during July. Total for the year stood at 16.93 inches for 1973.

The rain was welcome. Pastures and fields were becoming extremely dry.

Vaccinate Animals Now Urges County Agent

With summer weather and rains, mosquitoes are becoming more plentiful. And, since they transmit sleeping sickness to horses, steps should be taken now to protect these animals, urges Callahan County Extension Agent Greg Gerngross, of Baird.

All horses, mules, asses and ponies should be vaccinated for the three types of equine encephalomyelitis (Horse sleeping sickness)— Eastern and Western equine encephalomyelitis, and Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis (VEE). VEE caused many horse death when it ravaged Mexico and southern Texas in 1971.

The three diseases are caused by different viruses carried by mosquitoes, and therefore separate vaccinations are required.

Vaccine for the Eastern and Western strains of the disease is in a combined form and annual booster shots should be given to horses after the initial vaccination. The VEE vaccine provides ample protection for 18 months. The agent urges that horses not vaccinated since the 1971 emergency be revaccinated as soon as possible.

Also colts vaccinated while under six months of age should be revaccinated.

The Texas Animal Health Commission requires that all horses moving to shows be vaccinated for VEE.

Death often results after animals contact encephalomyelitis. Outward signs of the three diseases include depression, lack of appetite and drowsiness. Animals may frequently grind their teeth and stagger when moving.

Veterinarians can provide information on vaccination procedures, adds Gerngross.

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Rev. Helm Local Head Of Lung Disease Drive

Rev. Luther Helm has been named chairman of the Breath of Life Campaign to fight children's lung diseases according to Frank Scott, president of the North Texas Chapter, National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation.

Rev. Helm of Cross Plains, pastor of the First United Methodist Church here, will lead local volunteers in raising funds to support research and care program for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "childhood emphysema".

Cystic fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C.F. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C.F. genes, usually without knowing it. Current research funded by the Na-

tional Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therapy and constant research, many C-F patients are living beyond infancy to their teens and into young adulthood. That same kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of C-F.

"Most people don't realize that there are six million children in the U.S. affected by pulmonary illness," said Rev. Helm. "For some of these children, breathing is not the natural function we, who are lucky, take for granted."

The Breath of Life Campaign supports not only research but over 100 C-F centers for diagnosis and treatment across the county, Rev. Helm explained.

"Therefore, in what seemed then to be a fair settlement—nobody knew much about the game anyway—Pat was allowed to play on the side of her choice. In other words, three against two.

Pecan Webworms Hit Callahan County Hard

Pecan webworms are becoming a real problem to homeowners and pecan producers in Callahan County, reports Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Extension Agent of Baird.

There are several ways of getting rid of these pests. A high pressure sprayer is necessary to get the insecticide into the web formed by the webworms. Insecticides recommended include Toxaphene and Endosulfan.

Another method of getting rid of the webworm is to cut the infested part of the tree off and burn it.

Further information of the webworm or any other pecan insect may be obtained from the county extension office in the courthouse in Baird.

Brown County Again Bond Sales Leader

Brown County has again taken the lead in area sales of U. S. Savings Bonds.

During the month of May, latest report from savings bonds division of the Department of the Treasury, Brown County had reached 37 per cent of its goal. Callahan County, who was co-leader with Brown on the April report, fell four percentage points behind to 3 per cent. Coleman and Eastland Counties had attained 28 per cent of their goals through the first five months of 1973, according to the report.

Only \$2,415 worth of Series E and H bonds were purchased in Callahan County during May, according to Howard E. Farmer, county bond chairman. That made an aggregate of \$45,910 for the year or 33 per cent of the standard of \$140,000.

Sales in Brown County in May netted \$21,918 for a total of \$134,728, or 37 per cent of the 1973 goal of \$360,000.

Robert I. Bowen, Jr., Coleman County bond chairman, reported May sales as \$3,833 for a five-month aggregate of \$39,020. That is 28 per cent of the quota of \$140,000 for the county.

Eastland County also had reached the 28 per cent level of its goal of \$320,000. May sales of \$17,643 raised the total for the year to \$89,729.

Sales for the state of Texas during May were \$19,193,889—a 10.8 per cent increase over May 1972 when sales totaled \$17,314,314. The January-May sales amounted to \$102,985,728 with 47 per cent of the \$216.6 million 1973 goal achieved.

He was born Feb. 14, 1910, in Burkett. He married Alvena Koenig Aug. 10, 1932, in Cross Plains. She died in 1947. He was a member of the Methodist Church. He was a stock farmer and had spent most of his life in Coleman County.

Survivors include a son, Wayne of Coleman; two grandsons; two sisters, Mrs. Vernon Nich and Mrs. L. W. Bozeman, both of Coleman; a brother, Stancl of Coleman.

WILDCAT IN NORTHWEST CALLAHAN IS SAID DRY

A 3,489-foot wildcat oil test in northwest Callahan County has been abandoned as a dry hole.

The venture was Three Brothers Oil Co. No. 1 Glenn Martin seven miles northeast of Abilene. It spotted 1,600 feet from the south and 2,193 feet from the east lines of Section 17, B&L Survey.

A number of news reporters called to inquire why he had been fired as Judge of the Cross Plains Corporation Court. Since it was reported to the news media, and twice printed in the local paper, without comment, it was obviously expected to be construed as judicial incompetence, or lack of integrity on the part of the Judge. We are deeply resentful of this implication.

There was a number of factors involved in this decision, including, we believe, diametrically opposed concepts of the legal structure of municipal government; an erroneous idea that the court is subordinate to the administrative department and the law enforcement branch, in matters of law; that the administrative department has authority to override or veto decisions of the court; resentment of sharp protests against illegal acts and undue interference with the business of the court, and a lack of responsible leadership, a sense of justice and the moral courage to take the action that every member well knew they should take.

We have seen nothing to indicate that any member of the Executive or Legislative Department is remotely aware that there is a Judicial Department of City Government; that the Corporation Court (City Court) is a State Criminal Court, created by an act of the State Legislature, granting authority to any incorporated town or city to set up a court and elect or provide for the election of a judge, but not the authority to run the court. The judge's duties, responsibility, authority, and the limit of his authority is defined by law, and not by the City Council, and that it is their duty, not to run the court, but to see that it is allowed to function without interference.

A city councilman advised us against being technical in court cases. We are in total disagreement with this concept. The law is law, technically inflexible, being flexible only in degree of punishment.

In one case a Young Lady had her father bedded down in the back seat of her car, moving him from the M.D.A. Cancer Clinic in Houston to his home in Big Spring, to die, received a ticket for running a red light. Due to extenuating circumstances we dismissed the charge, and instructed the court clerk to return the fine, if and when received. The check was received, seized and appropriated by the city. We advised the Executive Department of the serious legal implications of this act, and ordered the money refunded. So far as we know the advice was ignored.

The two preceding paragraphs would indicate that the judge must run the court to suit an administration that has no respect for, or knowledge of the law, or be fired.

We submit that the City of Cross Plains has, far too long, been burdened with an administration that is consistently and callously oblivious of the consensus of the citizens of Cross Plains, and that the whole caboodle should resign.
