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## Rain Totals 1.53 Here Past Week

Rainfall in the form of scattered showers fell in Cross Plains and over the surrounding area several days last week. Moisture totals varied widely.

F. C. Newton, local official weather observer, measured rainfall on two days during the past week. A light shower early Wednesday of last week and a heavy rain that afternoon netted 1.03 inches here. On Thursday another .50 of an inch shower was reported here.

Only other measurable rainfall here during July was .26 of an inch on July 6. Total moisture received here for the month is 1.79 inches. Aggregate moisture in Cross Plains stood at 18.46 inches at mid-morning Tuesday.

## Admiral Cemetery Care Fund Grows To \$6,599

Total of the Admiral Cemetery Endowment Fund now stands at \$6,599, according to a report Tuesday by James Eubanks of Baird, secretary-treasurer.

Eubanks reported 39 recent donations to the drive to provide perpetual care for the cemetery at Admiral. Those gifts amounted to \$1,672, and donations totaling \$4,927 have previously been acknowledged. Goal for the fund is \$8,000. A total of \$1,401 is yet to be raised.

Eubanks points out that the money received thus far has been invested, and only the interest will be spent to care for the cemetery grounds. He has urged everyone who is interested in the upkeep of the Admiral Cemetery to mail donations to him at P. O. Box 968, Baird, Texas 79504, as soon as possible so that the \$8,000 goal can be reached in the very near future.

## Corn Borer Is Said On Increase In Area

Infestations of the lesser cornstalk borer are increasing in Central Texas peanut-producing areas, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

"Hot dry weather has caused this significant increase in the larvae, according to our field observers," Commissioner White stated. "Some fields have infestations amounting to about 30 per cent."

Commissioner White urged all farmers to be checking for the lesser corn stalk borer. When the insects are present in sufficient numbers to cause economic damage, the fields should be treated with a pesticide cleared for use on peanuts.

"We always urge farmers—and anyone else using pesticides—to read the label carefully before applying and follow the directions to the letter," Commissioner White said.

## Cut Winter Feed Costs By Testing Forage

Forage testing is one of the many tools farmers and ranchers can use to decrease winter feed costs. With the cost of protein and uncertain supplies of various protein sources, forage nutrients can be a big factor in feed costs.

All sorghums and other hay crops should be analyzed for nutrient content, says Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Agent, of Baird.

To insure an adequate pro-

tein content, hay should be harvested prior to maturity. If cutting is delayed to full heading, protein content of the hay can be decreased to as low as two to three per cent. Sorghum and other hay crops when harvested prior to or just at the boot stage could contain as much as 12-14 per cent protein. As you can see from these figures, hay harvested at the right time can decrease your winter feed costs substantially.

Producers who rely on hay for winter feed can get their hay analyzed by sending a sample to the Texas A&M Forage Testing Laboratory. Forms and mailing bags are available at the County Extension office in the Courthouse in Baird.

To support this activity, the County Hay Show will be held this fall for producers wishing to enter their hay in competition. More details concerning the hay show will be made available to producers later in the season, Gerngross stated.

## Crude Oil Production Still Big Business In Callahan And Adjoining Counties

Texas' 254 counties which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a record production year for the states number one industry, according to a report from the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association published under the title "Crude Oil Production Figures for This and Other Counties" and released in another recent report from the same association.

The county ranked 138th in the state in the value of petroleum produced, \$3.4 million. The sale of crude oil brought \$3.1 million; natural gas, \$300,000.

But despite this record year, due in large part to nine months of production at 100 percent of the maximum efficient rate, the nation's largest producer of petroleum could not produce enough to satisfy the demand.

"To further stimulate production, we need a restoration of the open market force," said Robert A. Buschman of San Antonio, president of the association.

"This would produce two much-needed effects. First, it would channel the state's petroleum products to the most efficient and highest priority uses; second, it would help provide part of the capital needed so desperately to build refineries and superports and to carry on expensive exploration and production activities," Buschman added.

This study by the association also shows that production last year in Callahan County resulted in the payment of \$427,000 to royalty owners.

The state of Texas received \$167,000 in production taxes from county wells; \$142,000 on crude oil output and \$25,000 from natural gas production.

Oil and gas producers and developers spent \$2.3 million drilling 103 wells in the county last year, with \$1 million of that figure lost in 61 dry holes.

According to the Texas Employment Commission, 123 oil and gas industry employees worked in the county in 1972 and shared a payroll of \$562,000.

Processing plants also added to the county's economy: Two natural gas processing plants with a total daily capacity of 10 million cubic feet, according to the "Oil and Gas Journal."

Callahan County helped in establishing an all-time high production of crude oil in 1972 by yielding 886,574 barrels of oil. That is an average daily production of 2,422 barrels. Since oil was first discovered in this county in 1923, Callahan oil fields have produced 60,648,860 barrels.

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Eastland County is the all-time high oil producer among

Brown, Callahan and Coleman Counties, having yielded 123,126,973 barrels since oil was first discovered there in 1917. Last year the county produced an average of 818 barrels per day for an aggregate for 1972 of 299,308 barrels.

Earliest discovery of oil in the four counties was in Coleman in 1902. Since that time production has totaled 72,285,019 barrels of crude. Last year's total production was listed at 207,743 barrels or an average of 568 barrels per day.

During 1972 Texas oil fields yielded almost 1.3 billion barrels of crude oil, an all-time high, and that was about 38

per cent of the total United States production. That was due to an all-out production effort during the last nine months of the year. Last year's crude oil production recorded in 203 of the state's 254 counties, was valued at some \$4.5 billion.

Scurry County was the total production leader in 1972. Oil fields in that county produced 85.4 million barrels. Gregg County is the state's all-time oil production leader with 2.3 billion barrels, and is the only Texas county which has produced over two billion barrels.

Ector County ranks second with 1.8 billion barrels.

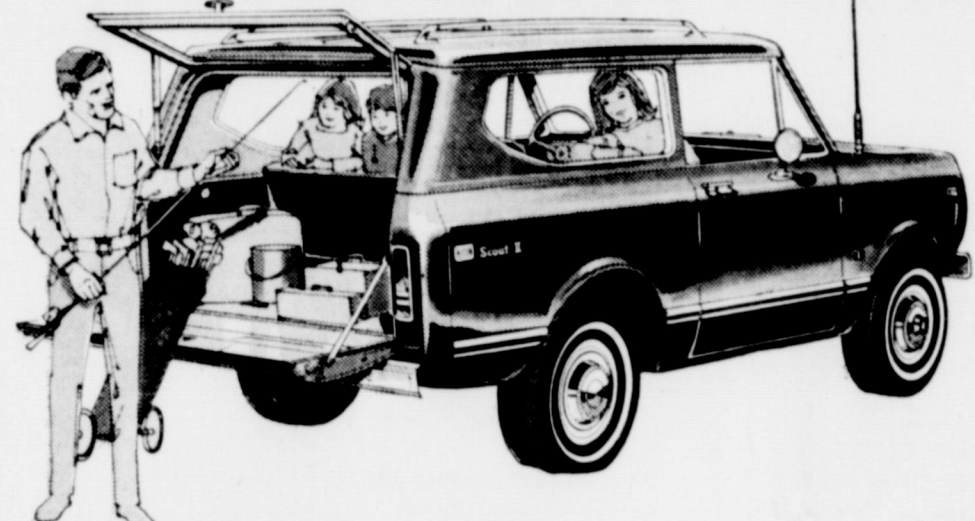

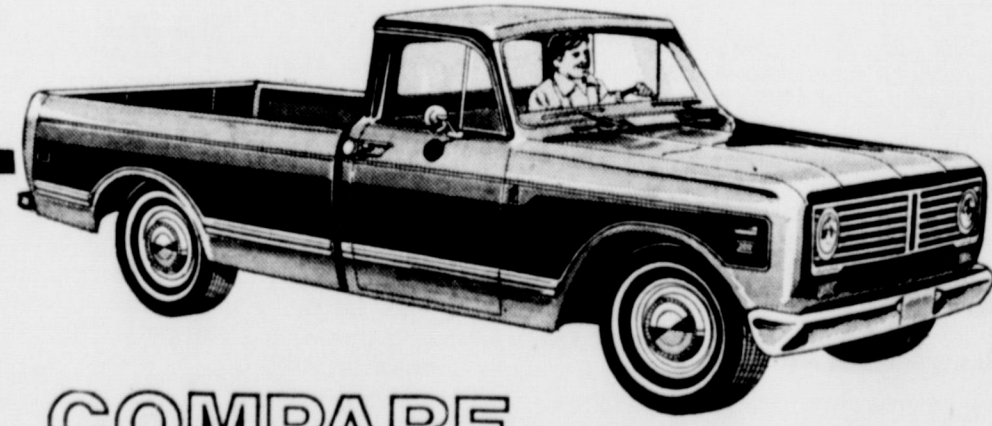

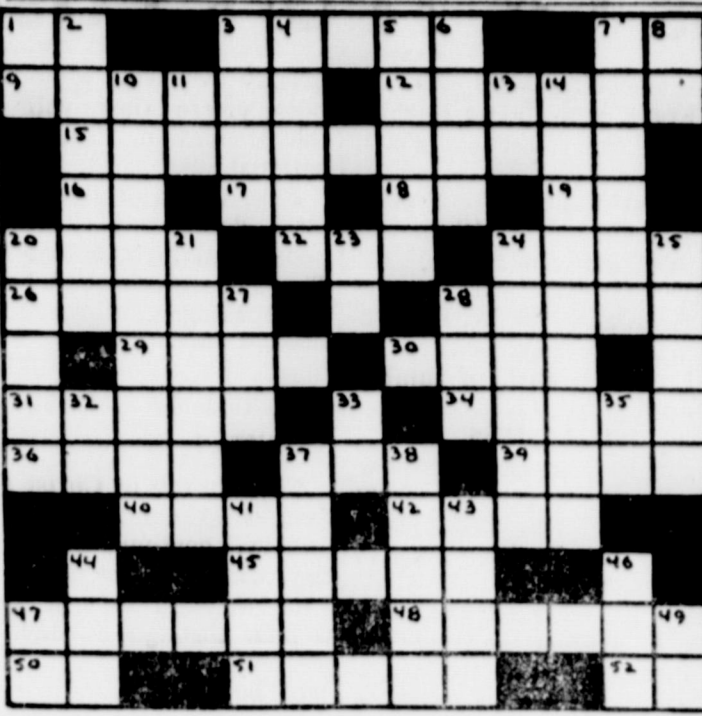
