

Cross Plains To Get Second Patrolman



State Helps Kindergarten The state now bears about one-half the cost of kindergarten program. Under a ruling of the last Texas Legislature, all 5-year-olds are eligible to aitend kindergarten. Attendance is not compulsory, but in the past local children have partici-

pated almost 100 per cent. The local school system has run a full-day kindergarten for four years at local expense. This year's full-day schedule will be aided by an estimated \$3,000 to \$4,000 in additional state aid. An estimated 26 students are expected in this year's kindergarten program.


