Harry Walker Dies In Accident Sunday

Harry Walker of Abilene, 38-year-old son-in-law of Mrs. Verna Mae Ramsey of Cross Plains, and two Abilene high school girls died in the firey two-vehicle accident Sunday afternoon about 13 miles southeast of Abilene on State Highway 36.

In addition to Walker, the dead were Margaret Langford and Kathy Merrell, both of Abilene. Injured in the mishap were Mrs. Walker, the former Barbara Ramsey; the Walker's

two children Paul Walker 15 and Pam Walker 11 and Buddy Fisher 15. All were treated and released from an Abilene hospital, except Mrs. Walker who was still confined there at last report received here.

Guy C. Williams, driver of the other vehicle which was in collision with Walker's motor home, was not injured.

Investigating officer Harold Hambrick of the Texas Department of Public Safety at Baird reported both vehicles were traveling east on Texas 36.

The report said the pickup driven by Williams was making a left turn when the Walker Winnebago motor home hit the pickup. The motor home then caromed off and struck a tree and began to burn.

The report stated that the Walker vehicle was attempting to overtake and pass the pickup when the accident occurred.

The Walker group was to have presented a musical program at Cross Plains First Baptist Church Sunday night. They were representing the Abilene First Baptist Church.

Walker was well known in Cross Plains, and was active in civic and church affairs in Abilene. President of the Saxon Oil Co. in Abilene and Houston, he was a former Abilene city councilman, and was named Abilene's Outstanding Young Man in 1966 by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Funeral for Walker was held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church in Abilene. Joint services were held at 4 p.m. Tuesday for the two girls who died in the crash. Pastor of the First Baptist Church in Abilene, Dr. James Flammig, officiated for both services.

Burial for Mr. Walker was in Elmwood Memorial Park. Mr. Walker's survivors include his wife of the home; one son, Paul of the home; one daughter, Pamela of the home; one brother, Dr. William F. Walker of Houston; his mother, Mrs. Harry N. Walker Sr. of Arlington; and one sister, Mrs. Betty McCoy of Waco.

Local barber and beauty shops will also be closed following usual Monday closing. Some downtown service sta-

tions will close. Cross Plains schools will also observe Monday as a holiday. Callahan County Courthouse will also be closed.

All three downtown groceries, J.R.B. Super Market, Foster Grocery and Randall's Super Market will be open. The Review office will also be open, as is the custom on most holidays which fall on Monday.

Most businesses along highways leading into Cross Plains will be open for business as usual. Some may follow a Sunday schedule.

Highways in and out of Cross Plains are expected to be exceptionally busy, and local law officers are scheduled to work longer than normal hours in an attempt to prevent accidents.

Many local persons are expected to be out of town during the long three-day week end, and many former residents and relatives of local citizens are expected to come here for reunions and visits.

Buff Band's Uniform Fund Boosted By \$290

Cross Plains Buffalo Marching Band's Uniform Fund was aided by seven gifts during the past week. The seven contributions totaled \$290.

The sponsor of the campaign, the Band Booster Club, is seeking \$8,750 to pay for the new apparel which has already been ordered and due to be delivered in mid-October.

The Band Boosters had \$4,091.35 to begin the drive. With the latest \$290 donations, the drive has netted \$1,923.79. That leaves \$2,734.86 yet to be raised.

Free School Lunch Schedule Is Told

Conditions under which school children may receive free lunches at the Cross Plains school cafeteria has been revealed by local officials of the local education system.

It was pointed out that applications have been mailed to students eating at the cafeteria, and applications should be returned to the appropriate principal. Notice of approval or disapproval of application will be made immediately. Right of appeal decision may be made with Superintendent Wayne Ford. All free lunch recipients are kept in confidence.

Kindergarten through grade six students pay 40 cents per meal, and remainder of the student body pays 45 cents per meal.

It was pointed out that if income changes during the school year, free lunches may be applied for at that time.

Stamps Will Replace Commodities In County

The first food stamps in Callahan County will be issued November 1, 1973. But before the statewide food stamp program is implemented here, there is much work to be done.

Commodities is the food assistance program currently operating in this county. The 62nd Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a statewide food stamp program to replace all county food stamp programs and commodity food distributions. By November 1973 the 254 counties in Texas will be operating the statewide program administered by the State Department of Public Welfare.

Before the first stamps are issued here, extensive preparation must be completed. Current commodity recipients will be notified that food stamps will replace the present food assistance program. Most commodity recipients should be eligible for food stamps also as well as others who might not receive commodity foods.

Certification for food stamp eligibility will begin at a later date. All persons who don't make much money or who are unemployed are encouraged to apply at that time. Welfare recipients aren't the only ones who can qualify for food stamps.

Local issuance offices will sell the food stamps to all who are certified eligible to receive them. Participating households will be able to buy their stamps at the issuance office nearest them and at their own convenience. The long waiting lines which are now a problem at commodity distribution centers should be eliminated.

Food stamps, which can be used for the purchase of most foods and food products, will be accepted by many of the local grocers. Payment is made by tearing the necessary amount of food stamps from the coupon book at the time of purchase. Tobacco, alcoholic beverages and imported items can not be purchased with food stamps.

Grocers can deposit food stamps just as they do money. Local bankers then send the stamps to the United States Department of Agriculture for redemption.

Food stamps are good for everyone. The community enjoys increased economic activity, new jobs are created and low-income households are able to eat more and better food.

MAY AREA FIELD GETS ANOTHER SMALL OILER

A Brown County well has been completed five miles southwest of May in the J. S. Lewis (Marble Falls) Field.

The oiler is GS&B Oil Co. of Austin (formerly C. E. Graham Jr.) No. 2 Jones & Burroughs. Site is 330 feet from the south and 933 feet from the east lines of Section 27, F. Byrd Survey.

Daily potential was four barrels of 41 gravity oil, pumping from perforations at 2,417-24 feet.

Operator set the 5 1/2-inch casing at 2,473 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 2,570 feet.

Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby has announced the re-appointment of Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon to the Texas Legislative Council. The Senator represents Callahan and most adjoining counties.

Also named were Senators William (Bill) Patman of Canada, Max Sherman of Amarillo, Jim Wallace of Houston and Grant Jones of Abilene. Senators Hightower, Patman and Sherman are re-appointments to the council.

The Legislative Council conducts research and drafts bills for members of the Texas Legislature. The Lieutenant Governor is chairman of the council, which consists of 10 representatives and a permanent staff.

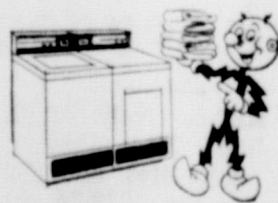

Office Supplies At Review

Fish Management Reduces Food Cost

The family food cost can be greatly reduced by proper management of farm ponds for fish production, according to Paul Kirkland, conservation technician at Baird. Kirkland said a favorable water habitat for fish production can be created by supplementing natural food supplies that will produce from 300 to 400 pounds of fish per surface acre of water annually. However, fish should not be fed too much at one time for this may cause a bacterial disease and oxygen depletion resulting in a kill of the fish. A new farm pond should be fertilized before stocking with fish, stated Kirkland, using 100 pounds of 8-8-2 or equivalent per surface acre. This rate should continue at 10 day intervals during the spring until a person's hand cannot be seen when placed 18 inches below the surface of the water. Soil conservation Service technicians will assist land owners in ordering bass or channel catfish from the Federal Fish Hatcheries. Deliveries of channel cat are usually made in October and bass in May. Kirkland stated that all other fish should be removed from an old pond before restocking. For further assistance in management of farm ponds, contact local SCS personnel in the Baird Field Office.

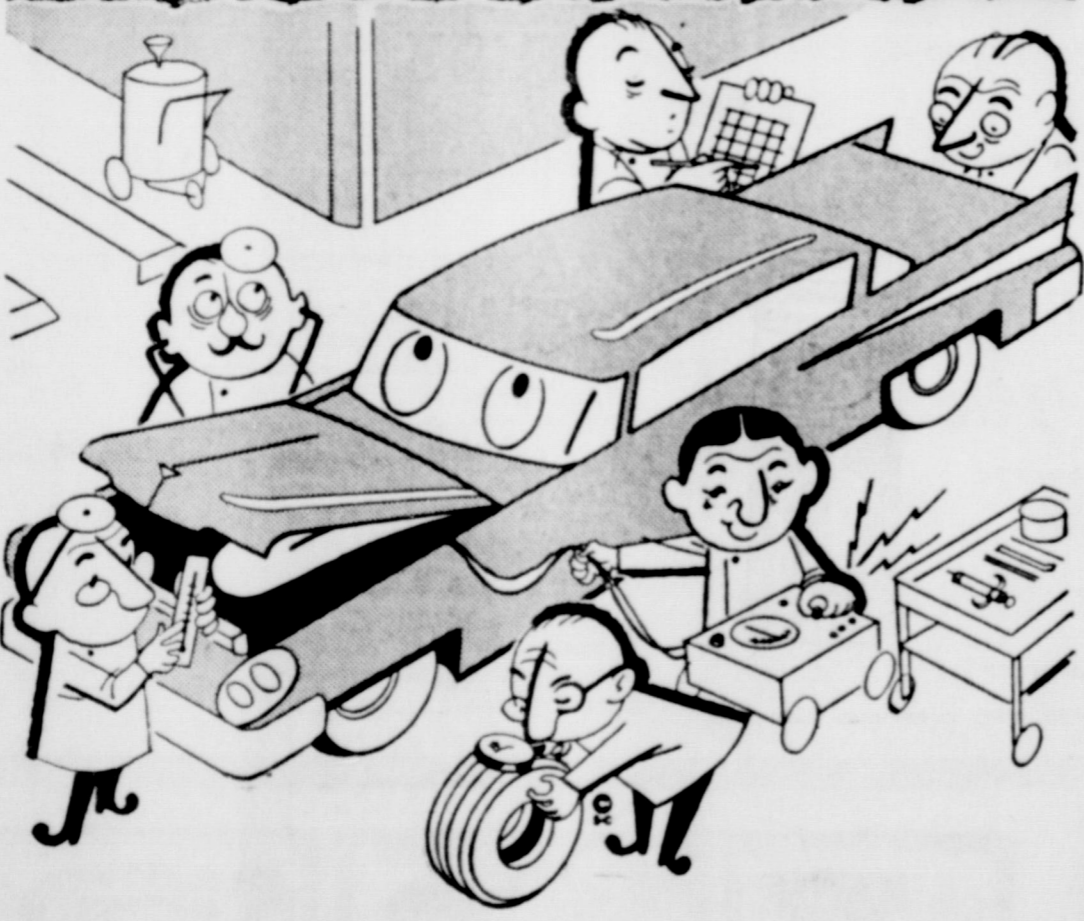

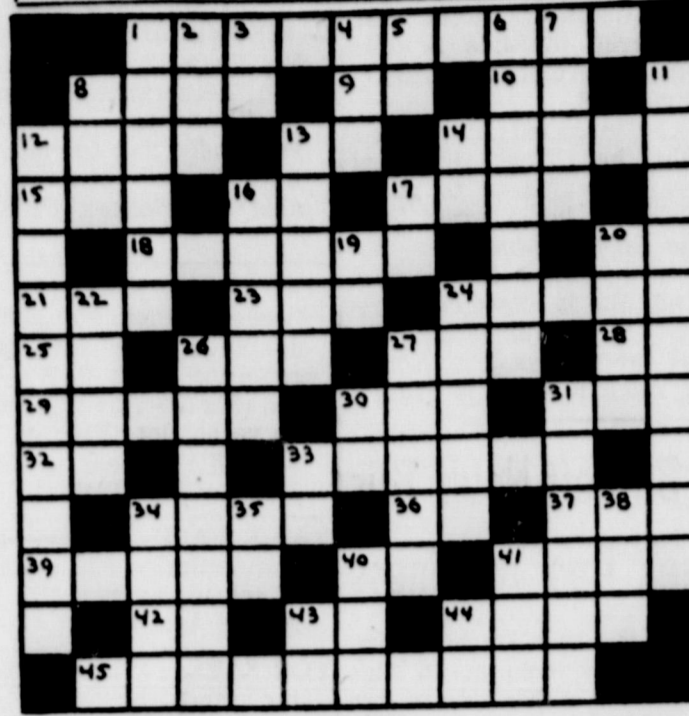

County Has 1 Health Worker For 78 Citizens

How well equipped is Callahan County to take care of the medical and dental needs of its people?

How does its supply of trained health personnel—doctors, dentists, nurses, therapists, optometrists and the like—compare with the supply in other communities?

Although the number of men and women in such occupations has increased, nationally, during the last seven or eight years, following Federal initiatives to expand the supply, there is still a big shortage.

As pointed out by the President: "The United States now spends more than \$75 billion annually on health care and, for most people, good service results."

"Yet, despite this huge annual national outlay, millions of citizens do not have adequate access to health care. Our record in this field does not live up to our potential."

Details on the number of people in health services in Callahan County and in other communities across the country have been made public by the Census Bureau.

They show that the number in the local area who are so engaged is approximately 106.

They are listed in three categories. The first consists of "physicians, dentists and related practitioner." This in-

cludes medical and osteopaths, podiatrists, dentists and chiropractors. Locally there are 9.

In the second group, there are 2 registered nurses, 1 clinical laboratory technician, 1 dental hygienist, 1 ologic technician and 1 There are 32 listed in

The third group consists of nursing and other health trainees, practical nurses, dental assistants, midwives. There are 6 classification.

As the ratio of health personnel to population in Callahan County, the government figures show that there is one health worker locally for 78 people.

Throughout the United States as a whole, the ratio is one for every 69 and in the State of Texas, one for 78.

The chances of a person getting adequate medical care depends, to a large extent, on where he lives. Health services he can get are those available to the resident.

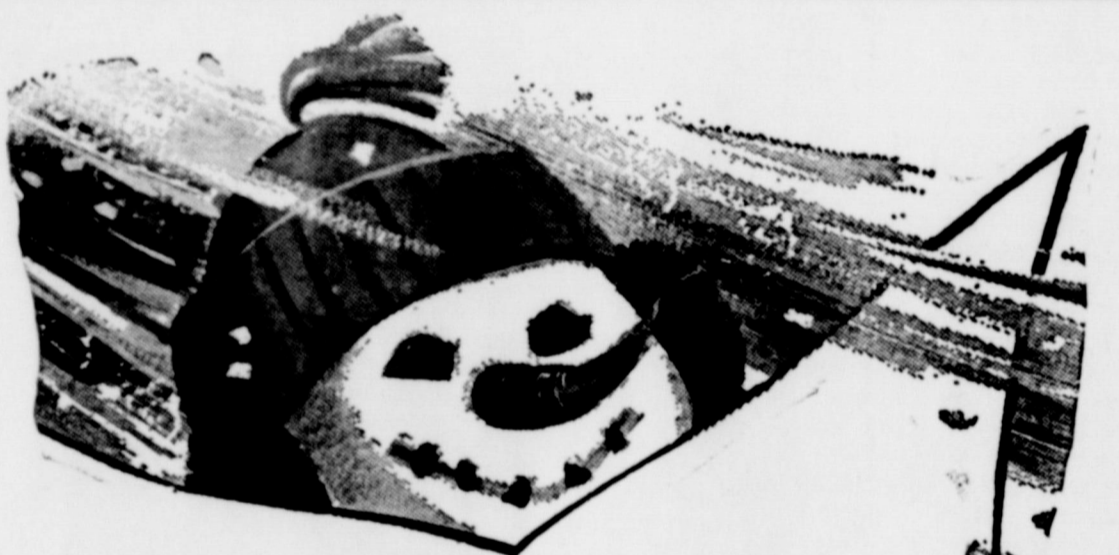

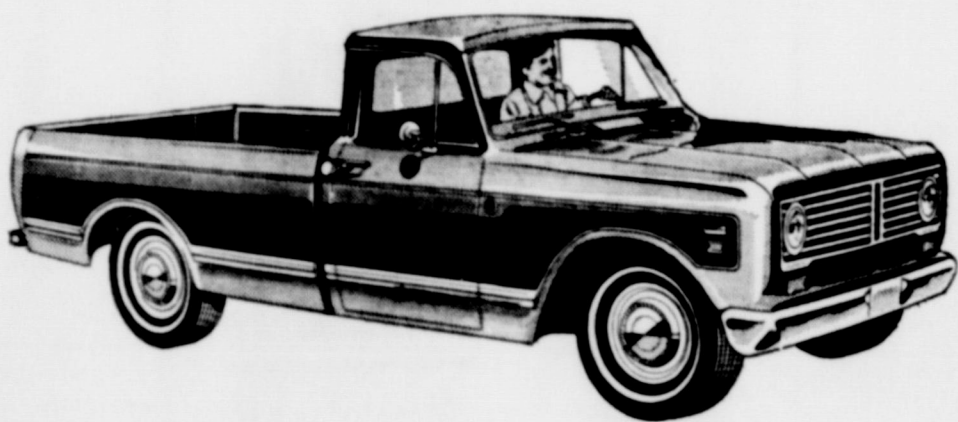
