## 14 County Court Cases Nets \$1,600 In Fines

Fourteen cases heard in Callahan County Court at Baird brought \$1,475 in fines handed down by A. E. Dyer, Jr., judge. The 14 infractions also netted \$734 in court costs. Costs of \$52 were levied in 11 cases and charges of \$54 in three instances.

Eleven of the most recent cases heard stemmed from driving while intoxicated charges. Two were for driving while license suspended, and one was for indecent exposure.

All persons charged entered guilty pleas to the charges in all instances. No addresses on any of the persons charged were available from the court docket book.

Philip Rogers pleaded guilty to DWI and indecent exposure. He was fined 200 and given 30 days in jail, probated a year on the DWI charge, and was assessed a \$50 fine on the exposure count.

Paul Wesley Randolph was handed a 10-day jail sentence for DWI and a \$100 fine. He also received a \$50 levy for driving while license suspended.

John L. Ivie was handed a three-day jail term, probated for six months, for DWLS and paid a \$25 fine.

Leo J. Glennon, Jr., was fined \$200 for DWI and was handed a 30-day jail sentence, probated one year.

Five persons paid \$150 fines

for driving while intoxicated, and each was given 30 days in jail which was probated a year. They are Wm. Martin Davis, Harley Everett Harlow, Johnnie Curtis Hardin, Daniel C. Maurillo, and Barbara A. Mansfield.

Sammy Lee Hendrix was fined \$100 for DWI and given 30 days in jail, probated a year. Dennis E. Nelson was assessed three days in jail for driving while intoxicated. He was also handed a \$50 fine.

Katherine Ratliff was assessed 10 days in jail for DWI, probated one year. She also paid a \$75 fine.

Shanks was to have gone to trial Tuesday before Judge Blackwell without a jury, however, the District Clerk's office in Austin reported Tuesday that the trial has been re-set for Monday. It will be with a jury, according to the Austin clerk's office.

The trial has been re-scheduled many times since Shanks and two other men were arrested in an Austin park restroom by a city park ranger on February 13 and charged with sodomy.

Cross Plains defeated the Tigers in a non-conference battle last year 35-0, however, the Herd had considerably more experience for the 1972 season. Only eight lettermen return to the Herd this year, but there is a strong squad behind the monogram winners.

Very little is known in local quarters about the Tigers. Although picked last in a pre-season poll in the eight-team District 6-B, Blanket could provide some upsets. Anything can happen in an opening tilt.

### Bisons Nip Merkel

Cross Plains took on Class A Merkel in a controlled scrimmage at the Bedger den last Saturday. The Buffs scored a 1-0 triumph. Both teams scored, but the Merkel tally was called back on an infraction. In goal-line drills the Herd scored three times while Merkel crossed the double stripe two times. Full back Rickey Kirkham tallied on a six-yard run for the Herd, but Halfback Randy Hunter set score with a 40-yard romp.

"They (the Buffaloes) are amazing us with their hustle," Head Coach Don Lee said after the scrimmage. "Overall" Lee and assistant Jack Orr stated, "we were real pleased with the

basic game." Lee added that the enthusiasm is great and blocking and timing has improved over last week. Lee continued that a lot of mistakes were made, and the Herd drew numerous penalties.

The local junior varsity fought to a 11 draw with the Badger reserves, but the Cross Plains score was nullified by a penalty.

## Local FFA Chapter Gets Ford Tractor Power Train

A Model 4000 tractor power train was presented Friday to Cross Plains High School by Ford Motor Company's Tractor and Implement Operations—North America.

The power train consists of a three-cylinder, 201-cubic-inch diesel engine, eight-speed manual transmission rear axle.

The unit was donated by the company at the recommendation of the school's vocational agricultural instructor, O. B. Edmonson, an Honorary American Farmer.

Honorary American Farmers are selected annually by the Future Farmers of America for the highest honor the organization bestows to non-members. Mr. Edmonson was one of 67 vo-ag instructors so honored last year and invited to nominate a qualified school of his choice to receive a Ford tractor power train.

Worth more than \$5,441, the Ford power train will be used for instruction in the school's vocational shop courses.

Scot Edington, high school principal, joined Edmonson in accepting the unit from Dale DeShazo of Stephenville, zone manager for Tractor and Implement Operations' Southwestern District Office, and Durwood Stephenson, of Stephenson Ford Tractor at Comanche.

Stephenson noted that the service man of today is a highly trained technician, and that the need for such qualified men is increasing rapidly.

Selection of Honorary American Farmers is based on a score-

card of achievement which includes years of service, the number of award-winning FFA members developed, number of members established in farming and agriculturally-related businesses, records of group achievements posted by the local FFA chapter served as advisor, and community-service accomplishments.

A total of 299 Ford tractor power trains—worth more than \$1,740,000—was donated to educational institutions in 1972. Last year's total increased donations of Ford tractor components since 1961 to 1,767, worth more than \$7,490,500.

The power train program is one of several Ford agricultural assistance programs carried on to further the knowledge and development of the industry.

## County A.S.C.S. Officer Explains New Farm Bill

J. C. Earp, Jr., county executive director of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office at Baird, has briefly explained the new farm bill which was passed by Congress recently.

His explanation, as affects most Callahan County farmers and stockmen, follows.

"A new farm program for wheat, feed grain and cotton has been approved and will be effective for 1974 through 1977 crop years. A completely new approach to crop production is contained in the new program.

"Instead of restricting or controlling production, the new program is designed to encourage farmers to go all out to produce more wheat, feed grain and cotton in future years. Although we will still establish allotments for the above crops, a producer can plant his entire farm to any one or any combination of crops except peanuts. Peanuts is the only crop grown in this county that cannot exceed the farm's allotment with-

out penalty.

"Gone are set-aside acreage requirements, conserving bases and payments based on planted acreage. It is doubtful that payments as we have known them in the past will be made from this office for several years. 'Target price' is the new phrase that will be used under the new program. As an example, the target price for wheat is \$2.05 per bushel and 38c per pound for cotton. As long as the average price received by farmers is at or above the target price, no payments will be made by this office.

"There are provisions made where payments are made when production is reduced by natural causes. If the average price is below the target, a producer will receive the difference between the target price and the average price received by all farmers. Where a payment is due it will be determined by multiplying the farm allotment times the projected yield times the payment rate."

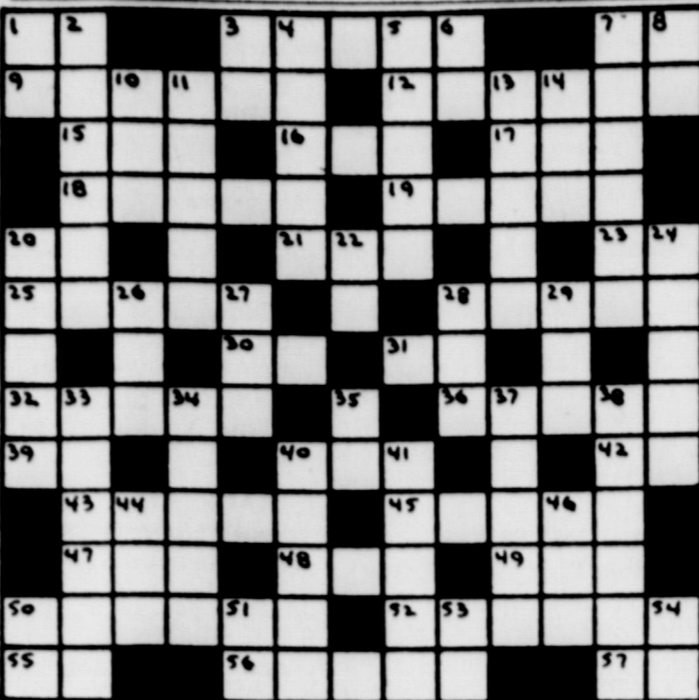

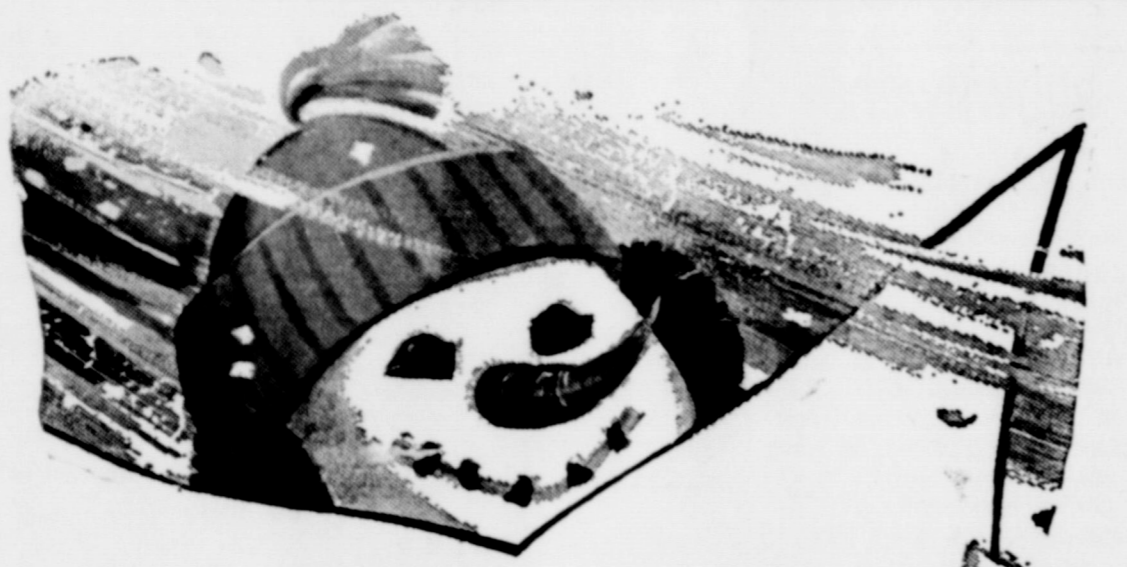

## Council Extends City Limit Line To North

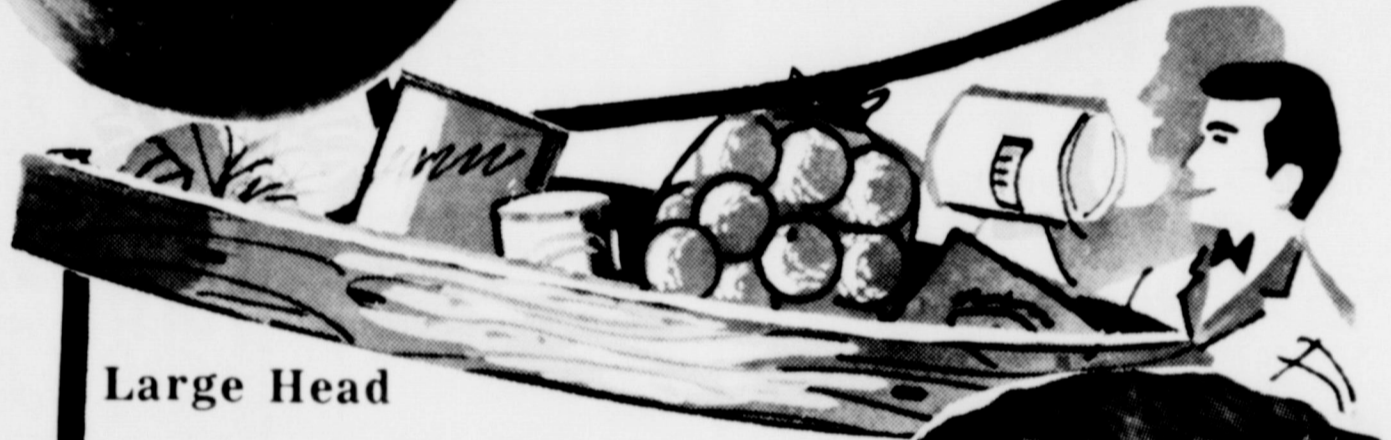

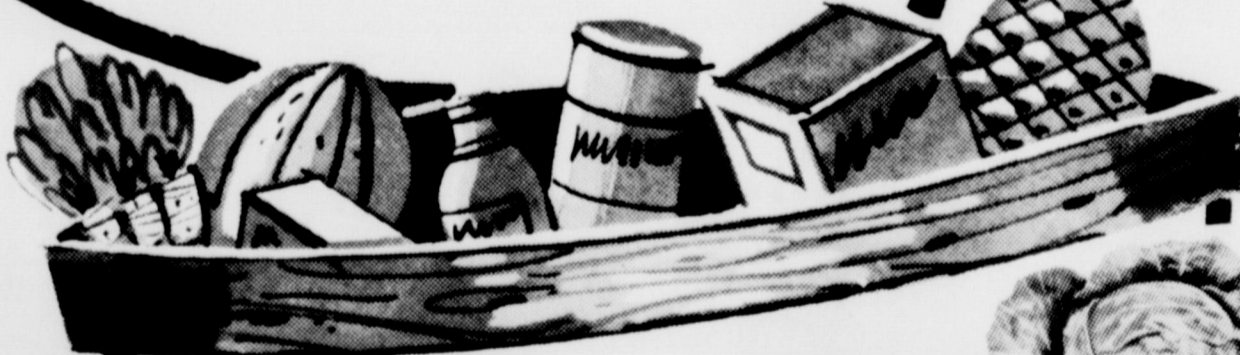
