Ethetton stated different soils have diferent limitations for different uses. Some soils will absorb water quickly while others hold water tightly. A septic tank may cause many problems if it is built in a soil that releases water slowly.

The survey will show the lo termining the effect a soil will have on the corrosion of pipe. and will even alert builders to areas that re frequently flooded. Ethetton said contractors can use this information to alert them to problems that might result from the different soils present on the site.
