

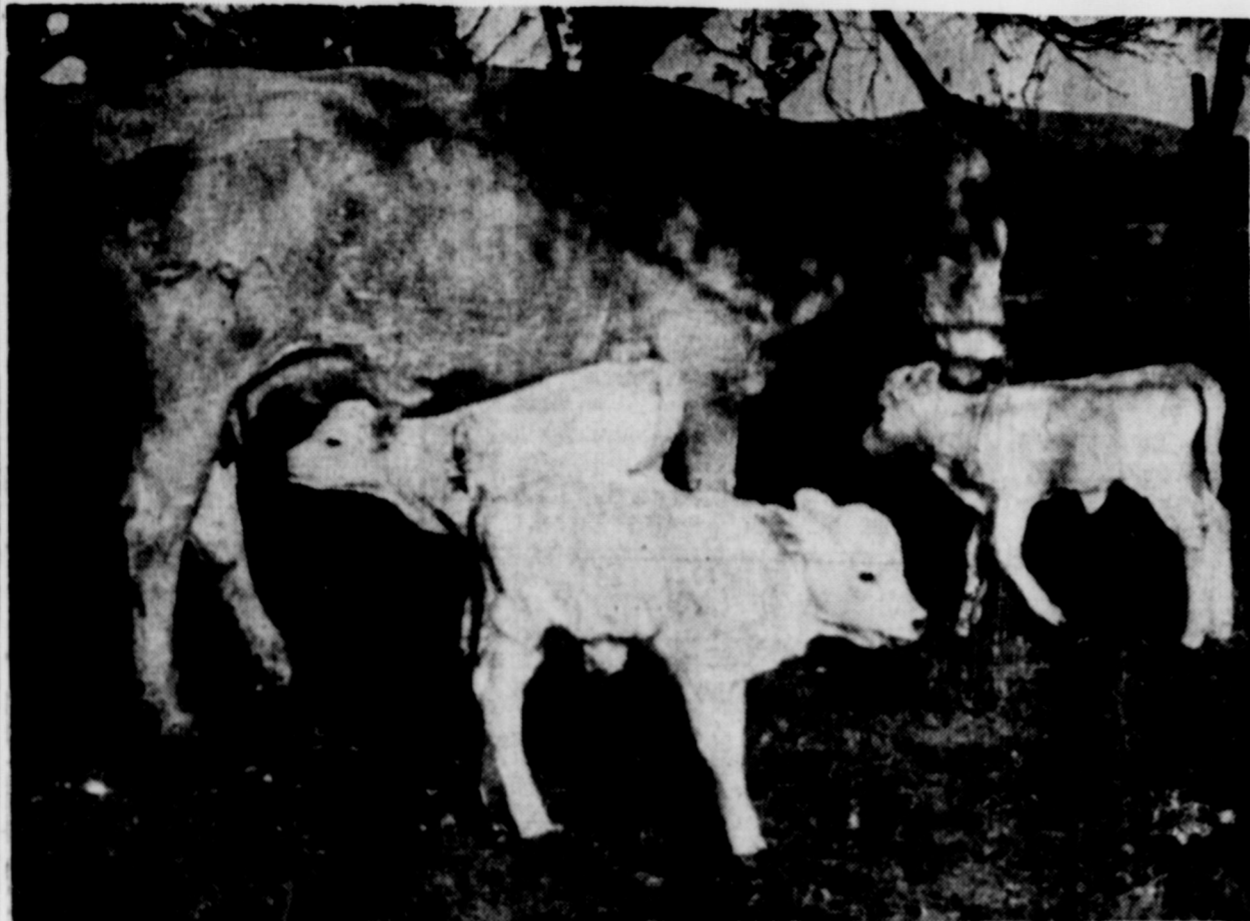

89 Students Make First Honor Listing

Eighty-nine Cross Plains students earned places on the honor roll for the first six-weeks period of the 1973-74 year according to a report from principals of the two schools.

Arthur Boyle, elementary principal, listed 67 pupils as classroom stars, and Scot H. Edington, high school principal, issued a roster of elite students numbering 22.

To earn a place on the honor roll, a student must maintain a general average of 90 or above. The first grade led all other

classes in number of honorees with 11. The fifth grade was close behind with 10 scholars. The senior class led the four high grades with eight honor students. Runner-up was the sophomore class with six.

Shanks Trial Is Delayed Again; Set For Nov. 20

The trial in which Callahan County Attorney James Paul Shanks of Baird will face charge of sodomy has once again been postponed.

The trial is now set for Tuesday, Nov. 20, in 167th District Court in Austin. Starting time is set for 9 a.m. in Judge Tom Blackwell's court.

Robert Eller, deputy district clerk at Austin, told the Review Tuesday that the defendant (Shanks) had requested a trial with witnesses, and therefore the delay was granted and rescheduled for November 20.

The trial will be before the court, Judge Blackwell.

The Callahan Attorney's trial has been re-set numerous times, and was supposed to have been held Tuesday. After an interview with an Abilene radio commentator, the Travis County District Attorney was reported to have said that all negotiations with Shanks' attorney, Charles Buraton, were off, and the defendant would have to plead guilty or face a jury trial. That statement has apparently been changed.

Shanks and two Austin men were arrested in an Austin park restroom by a park ranger on

February 13 and charged with sodomy. Both other defendants, Ronald Burke and Roberto Caraveo, have entered pleas. Caraveo did not contest the charge and was found guilty and Burke plead guilty. Sentences of five years probation was recommended by the Travis County District Attorney's office. Actual sentence in either case had not been learned here.

Shanks has contended since the arrests that he was an innocent bystander.

In Texas sodomy is a felony and punishable up to 2 to 15 years in prison.

Lovell Tells Why Tax Bills Delayed

As most residents of Callahan County know, the 1973 state and county tax statements are late. They are usually mailed to taxpayers about the first of October.

Albert Lovell, county tax assessor-collector, of Baird said Monday that the statements have been delayed because the statements were not received by the county until a few days ago. The statements are compiled by computers of the Western Data Services of Waxahachie. That company explains that computer re-programing became necessary due to the homestead laws.

Lovell continued that he and his deputies have to check the statements for possible errors, thus causing delay of another few days.

"We hope to have the statements in the mail sometime this week," the tax official said.

Lovell added that as far as he knows it is only the second time in history that state and county statements have been late, and it was due to circumstances beyond our control this time.

He pointed out that the three per cent discount on state taxes paid in October will still be allowed if paid on or before November 12.

United Fund Exceeds Goal; Collects \$3,313

Cross Plains Area United Fund drive has exceeded its goal for 1973-74.

The total collected late last Friday was listed at \$3,313.56. The goal was set by United officers and directors at \$3,000.

Jury selection was supposed to begin at 2 p.m. Tuesday, it was thought that would take most of the afternoon.

One hundred and fifty prospective jurors were called.

Preliminary hearings took up the bulk of the morning session Tuesday.

2 Constitutional Changes Are Reviewed This Week

Editor's Note: Here are analysis of proposed Amendments No. 6 and No. 7 to the Texas Constitution, which will be voted on in the General Election to be held Nov. 3. This brief explanation is intended to be informative and unbiased.

You will vote FOR or Against:

Amendment No. 6 would grant the district court the general jurisdiction of a probate court in addition to the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law in probate proceedings, and to authorize the legislature to adjust the jurisdiction of the courts in probate matters, and to provide for appeals in probate matters.

Proponents say passage would give the legislature authority to streamline judicial processes by adjusting probate jurisdiction to either the district court, county court, or both courts, by local or general law, to serve the needs of the area, and by adopting rules to govern the filing, distribution and transfer of probate proceedings as between the district, county or other courts with probate jurisdiction, and by providing that the court of civil appeals will be the court with appellate jurisdiction in all probate matters. Such measures would allow the legislature to equalize dockets for maximum efficiency.

They contend that the public is dissatisfied with the present system and want it simplified to provide less delay and expense in the handling of estates. They say that many county court judges are not lawyers, and since district court judges are, their services are often needed. They feel that dual trials could be abolished and litigation coordinated by grant-

Herd Travels To Bangs Friday For 10-A Clash

Cross Plains Buffaloes will take to the road Friday night testing the Bangs Dragons in a District 10-A contest.

The Herd will be seeking to stop a three-game losing string. Possibly at stake for both teams will be a possible loop title or a share of the crown. Cross Plains must win to have an outside chance at a partial crown, and Bangs can have a 2-0 conference mark with a victory. Buffs lost 10-A opener last Friday to De Leon 16-0. The Dragons rallied for a 27-14 win over Early last week end.

Bangs has the best overall record of any 10-A team, a 1-0 loop mark and 4-1 non-conference record. The Dragons also have the most potent offense in the conference, scoring 135 points, and the best defense, allowing just 59 points. Cross Plains, 2-4 on the season and 0-1 in loop action, is runner-up in offense with 113 points and third in overall defense allowing 88 points.

Both units have tangled with Rising Star. Bangs defeated the Wildcats 26-0 while the Herd dropped a 12-8 decision to Rising Star in the CPHS homecoming tilt.

Bangs was supposed to be lean on experience this season, but the Dragon record does not

show it. Five starters return the Bangs team that Buffaloes defeated 19-8 last year. Those are real blue-chippers how-

Cross Plains Junior Varsity bowed to the host Bangs Dragons reserve unit last Thursday 24-6.

The loss was the second Cross Plains has suffered to Bangs this season. The Buffs dropped a 16-0 decision to the Dragon squad earlier this year. The latest loss was the fourth in five outings for the younger Herd during the 1973 campaign.

Cross Plains scored first in last Thursday's contest. On first possession the Bisons moved 42 yards for the tally with Right Halfback Bruce Barnes crossing the double stripe from three yards out. The conversion attempt failed.

The lead was short lived, as Bangs countered in the same quarter on a 55-yard pass and run play. Two more pass and runs accounted for the scoring, one was a 60-yarder and the other an 18-yarder. Two-point conversions were successful after each touchdown by Bangs.

The Herd mounted two other serious threats. One carried to the Bangs eight, and another bogged down at the 12. In both instances possession was lost on downs.

Head Coach Don Lee noted that he and Assistant Coach Jack Orr were not disappointed in the way the Buffs hit, but was disappointed in the poor pass defense.

The interning Buffaloes will travel to Gorman Thursday night for a return clash with the Gorman JV. That game is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. Gorman won the first encounter between the two teams 14-6.

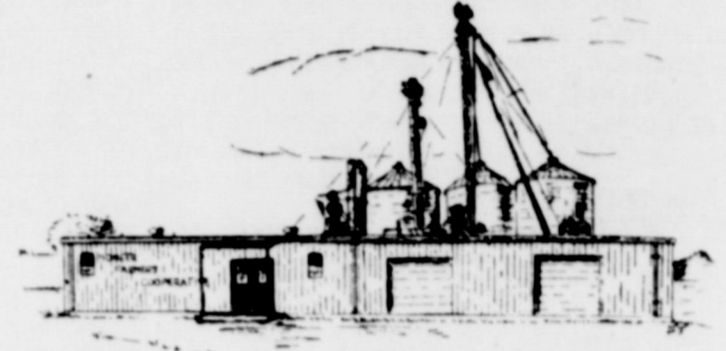

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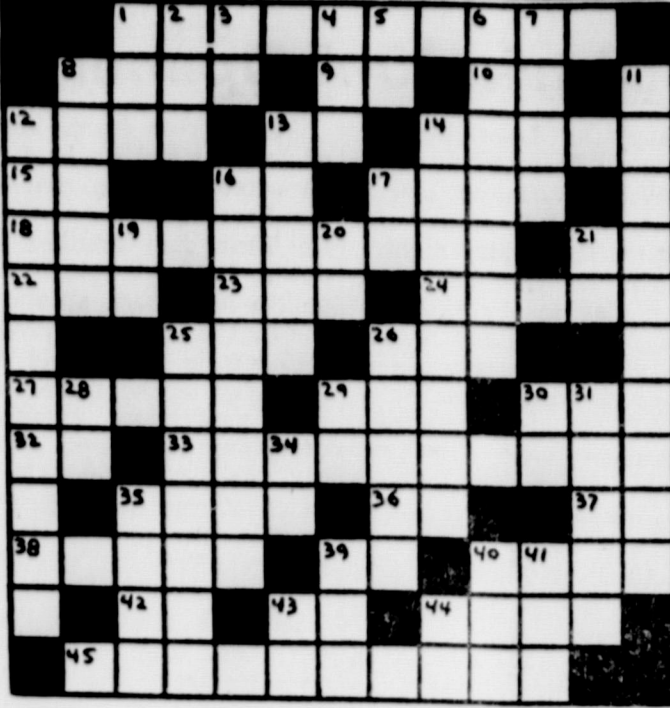

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Screwworm Outbreak Still A Threat - Agent

Just because the fall season is at hand, farmers and ranchers should not drop their guard against menacing screwworms, cautions Callahan County Extension Agent, Greg Gerngross of Baird. Cases are still popping up throughout the state, especially in South Texas, and recent warm, wet weather continues to favor screwworm activity.

Another serious problem in southern counties that is directly related to the screwworm infestations is the high number of Gulf Coast ticks. The ticks, most numerous since the summer of 1949, feed on the ears of livestock and provide a prime target for female screwworm flies to lay their eggs. Ranchers have reported that up to 30 per cent of the animals with ticks have become infest-

ed with screwworms. Screwworm cases in Texas in September totaled 1,786. More than 87 per cent of these occurred in the counties of Brooks, Jim Hogg, Kenedy, Starr and Hidalgo.

During the month screwworms also hit the South Central Texas counties of Guadalupe, Caldwell and Gonzales, and Jeff Davis, Hudspeth, El Paso, Culberson, Presidio, Reeves and Ward counties in Far West Texas. Other cases included Tom Green, Schleicher, Kimble, Bandera, Lampasas and Sterling counties in West Central Texas; Howard, Mitchell and Scurry counties in the South Plains; Fisher county in the Rolling Plains; and Bosque and Freestone counties in Central Texas.

Screwworm activity will slow down with cooler weather but may still be weeks away. So checking animals and treating all wounds is still of utmost importance Gerngross says. Both Korlan and CoRal sprays are approved by the USDA for treating wounds and provide protection from screwworms for about two weeks.

Worms found in any wounds should be sent to the Screwworm Lab, Box 969, Mission, Texas, for positive identification. Mailing kits are available at the County Extension Office at Baird.

Visiting De Leon Bearcats used a good first half to defeat Cross Plains Buffaloes 16-0 in the District 10-A opener for both teams last Friday night.

The 10-A favorites used much superior play in the first half to gain a 14-0 halftime advantage, then tacked on a two-point safety in the final canto.

Cross Plains' attack was totally ineffectual in the first quarter and through most of the second period. A flurry late in the second stanza netted the Bisons their only pair of first downs in the initial 24 minutes of play.

Things were a bit more even in the second half, although the Buffs never really threatened the Bearcat goal.

Another ineffectual Buff thrust led to a punt which carried to the Bearcat 13. At that point De Leon blitzed to the Buff 20 in just five plays. Buff Bruce Lawrence stopped the drive with a fumble recovery.

Iranian Speaks To 4 School Classes

Mehrdad Jarrah Layegh of Tehran, Iran, spoke to four classes at Cross Plains High School Monday afternoon. The Iranian is a freshman student at Cisco Junior College.

The four classes, two government and two history classes, heard of the history, culture and religion of the CJC student's homeland. He also played tapes of music favored in Iran. Layegh, whose father is an insurance executive in Tehran, will attend school two years at Cisco and then attend the University of Texas at Austin. He expects to be in the United States about eight years.

Of this area of the U.S. he said, "I like it here. The people are real friendly."

He opined that if the Arab world cuts off oil imports to the United States that it will force one out of every five service stations in this country to close. He added that the war in the Mid-East, was not vital importance to his country. On this subject he added that many Jews live in Iran and are not looked upon with disfavor.

He said that school courses in this nation seem to be somewhat easier than in Iran, explaining that some of the courses he is studying at Cisco, he had in high school in Iran. The main difficulty, he continued, is with the English language.

Students were allowed to put 50 questions to Layegh.

Rolan Jones, local teacher, was showing the Iranian the Cross Plains area, and he was interested in learning of the peanut harvest.
