## Era Ends Friday At Cottonwood Musicales

End of a modern-day era will come Friday as E. P. (Pop) Whitaker of Baird steps down as Master of Ceremonies of the monthly Cottonwood Musicales.

Pop, as he is known by a legion of friends and fellow musicians, has served as MC of the regular third Friday night musicale for over 10 years. He began the jamboree there in September of 1963.

The beloved musician, who plays the fiddle, guitar and piano, insists that he is not quitting. "I will still come," he says, "but I just won't serve as master of ceremonies."

Only three times in his 10-year tenure at Cottonwood has the musicale not been held as scheduled. Twice there was ice on the roads, and once after about 30 minutes of playing, the electricity went off. It was later discovered that a squirrel got into a transformer, causing the black-out.

Pop's experience with musical jamborees dates back to 1934 when he instigated such an activity at Weatherford. His first experience with playing professionally was 63 years ago. He played for a dance when he was 13 and got paid 50 cents for playing the fiddle.

"There is not a more congenial bunch of folks anywhere than at Cottonwood," Pop said.

## Paving Of Streets Planned By City

Cross Plains City Council has hopes of paving additional streets in the city in the future.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield reported Monday that the council discussed paving additional streets in Cross Plains next spring or summer at the last regular meeting of the city governing body.

He pointed out that the paving project depends on enough

local residents wanting streets paved to make it economically feasible for a contractor to move his personnel and machinery into Cross Plains. "We tried to do some paving some time back," Mayor Burchfield noted, "but not enough of the citizens were interested for a paving contractor to be hired."

The mayor said that persons who are interested in seeing more streets paved should con-

tact the City Office at earliest possible convenience. "We will have to do much of the base work this winter if enough persons now living on unpaved streets in Cross Plains are interested," he emphasized again. Burchfield pointed out that exact cost of the paving is not currently known, although he opined that it would be in the neighborhood of \$1.60 per running foot for property owner's frontage on the street. "That is only an estimated cost for a 24-foot wide hard surface," he mayor said. It was pointed out that property owners on each side of the street would be required to pay the fee.

"As in the past several paving projects in Cross Plains," Mayor Burchfield said, "the city will pay for paving intersections." He added it all boils down to enough people wanting paving and the securing of a reputable contractor at a reasonable cost.

## Buffaloes Rip Ranger 28-3 For 10-A Victory

Cross Plains Buffaloes spotted the visiting Ranger Bulldogs a three point lead then romped back to claim 28-3 victory in District 10-A football action Friday night.

The win evened the Herd's conference standing at 2-2, and improved the season record to 4-5.

Buffaloes dominated the game from almost the outset, but it took more than three quarters for the Herd to get advantage enough to breathe easy.

Bisons netted 16 first downs to seven for Ranger. The Herd also owned a big edge in rushing, rolling to 353 to 52 for the Bulldogs. Cross Plains also netted 88 yards passing, on four completions in seven tries, while Ranger had 54 yards on three successes in six attempts. Each team intercepted a pass, but Buffs lost two fumbles.

Ranger got its 20-yard field goal on a Buffalo turnover. Cross Plains lost the ball on the Bulldog 40, and Ranger moved to the Herd's 10 before Steve Chidress toed the ball between the uprights for a 3-0 lead.

Cross Plains gained the edge early in the second canto when Right Halfback Rex Beggs

scampered about 14 yards, capped an 80-yard drive which began on the kick after Ranger's field goal. Tim Bishop kicked the point and Cross Plains owned a 7-3 lead.

It didn't take the Herd long to tally in the second half. After taking the kickoff, Ranger was forced to punt. On first play from scrimmage Quarterback Roger Crawford romped 75 yards on a keeper around right end for the six pointer. Blocks by C. B. Hutchins and Rick Kirkham cleared the run. The kick failed and about a minute and a half deep into the third canto Bisons led 13-3.

Buffaloes tallied 15 points in the final period. First two points of that came when Buff Defensive Tackle Randall Franke trapped Bulldog Quarterback Dale Christian in the end zone on the third play after Buffs had driven 50 yards to the Ranger three and fumbled.

Ranger used its free kick after the safety, and Cross Plains regained possession at the Herd's 40. Fullback Kirkham rambled 60 yards to paydirt with Flankerback Randy Hunter clearing the way with a block. Bishop's placement point upped the edge to 22-3.

With about four minutes left in the game Kirkham caught a screen pass from Crawford and traveled 25 yards for the touchdown. A two-point bonus try failed and the final score read 28-3.

Kirkham was the leading rusher with 142 yards, an average of 11 yards per tote. Crawford had 121 yards, an average of 15 per rush, and Hunter netted 58 yards, 8.4 per carry.

Defense was led by linebacker Eddy Wyatt, Tackle Bill Nickerson, Middleguard Bruce Lawrence, Tackle Johnny Joy and End Kenny Pancake.

Cross Plains Buffaloes will attempt to keep sole possession of third place in District 10-A football race in the season finale Friday night at Santa Anna.

A win would give the Herd a 3-2 league mark, best in several years, but a loss would mean sharing the spot with at least the Mountaineers. Ranger could also gain a share with a win over Early.

The Mountaineers have been playing hot and cold all season. They own a 3-6 season mark and stand 1-3 in loop competition. Comparison scores show first one team then the other as favorites. Last week the Mounties played Bangs well before finally bowing 16-13. Cross Plains lost to the Dragons 16-0. On the other hand Ranger upset Santa Anna for its one conference win while the Bisons defeated Ranger 28-3 last Friday.

Santa Anna, defending 10-A champs, is a versatile team. The Mountaineers seem to like to run better, but are able and will pass when it becomes necessary. In the backfield Santa Anna is paced by Tailback David Huggins, a speedy 160-pounder, and Fullback Danny Valdez, who also possesses speed and weighs 160. Undoubted leader in the line is 253-pounder Steve Beal who doubles as offensive guard and middleguard on defense.

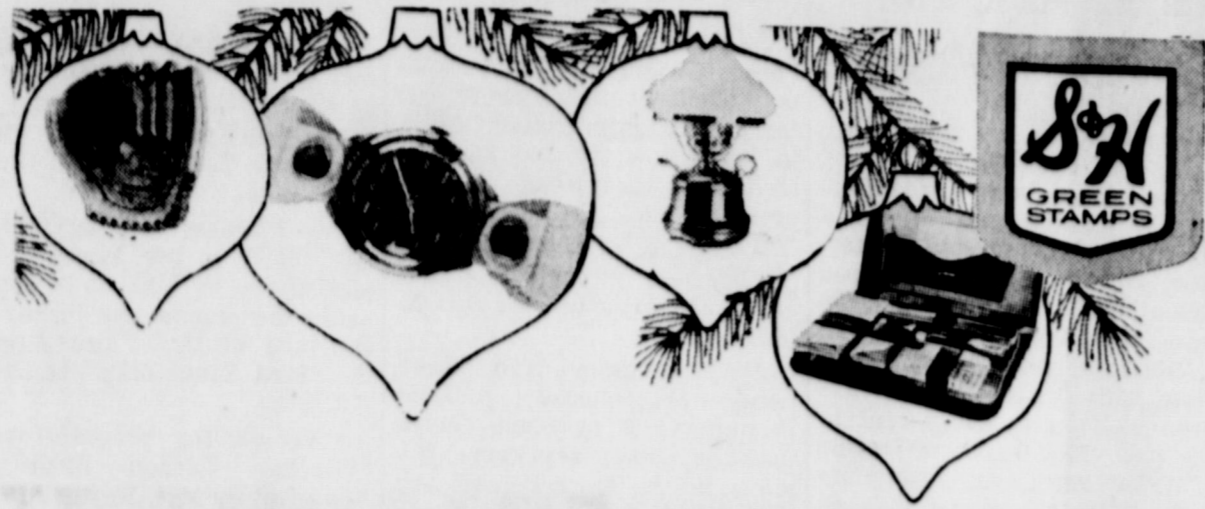

**Control Of Greenbug Encouraged By Agent**

Small grain producers in Callahan County are being faced with greatly increased production costs primarily due to the high cost of seed and fertilizer. County Extension Agent Greg Gerngross explains that these increases in cost will be added incentives to do everything possible to assure that a top yielding crop is harvested next summer.

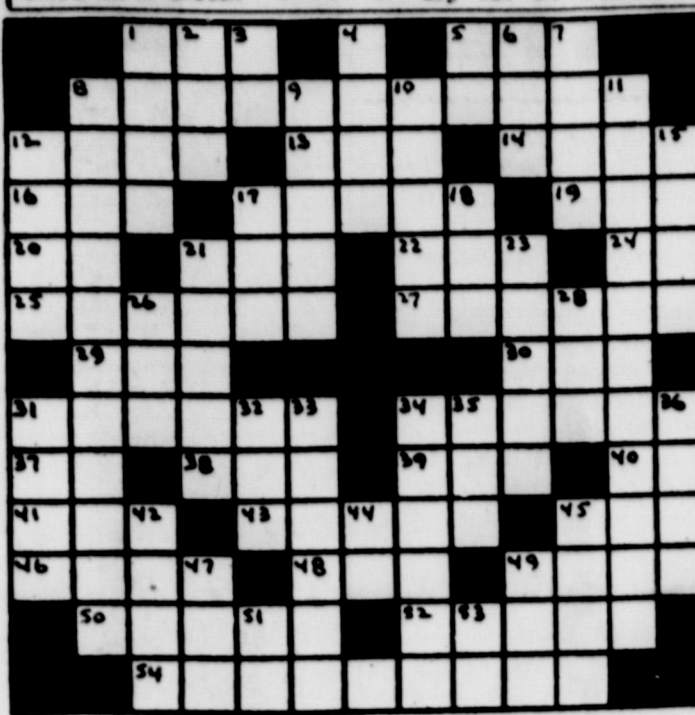
Insect damage by greenbugs can be severe in this area. Greenbugs are really aphids that are light green in color and usually have a prominent dark green stripe down the center of the back. Greenbugs reproduce without mating and all offspring are female. Greenbugs also produce offspring at temperatures lower than can be tolerated by many of the natural predators or parasites of the greenbug. These factors are the reasons why greenbug populations can increase so rapidly, explains Extension Entomologist Dr. Mike McWhorter.

Greenbug damage to small grains results from their feeding habits. Greenbugs have piercing mouth parts in which they suck juices from infested plants. Greenbugs also inject toxins into the plant during feeding. This feeding process causes small grains to first turn yellow then orange in color and eventually die if the damage is severe. Greenbug damage is usually localized in a field but as infested plants die, new areas become infested as the greenbugs seek new food sources.

Control decisions must be made only after determining beneficial insect numbers, greenbug numbers, soil moisture conditions and the stage of small grain growth.

Insecticides such as Diathoate (Cygon (R)), De-Fend (R), Di-Syston (R), malathion, methyl parathion or parathion are effective greenbug control agents. Additional information concerning application rates and specific regulations for the use of these insecticides can be obtained by contacting the Callahan County Agricultural Agent's office in Baird.
