
Control Of Greenbug **Encouraged By Agent**

Small grain producers in Callahan County are being faced with greatly increased production costs primarily due to the high cost of seed and fertilizer. County Extension Agent Greg Gerngross explains that these increases in cost will be added incentives to do everything possible to assure that a top yielding crop is havrested next summer.

Insect damage by greenbugs can be severe in this area. Greenbugs are really aphids that are light green in color and usually have a prominent dark green stripe down the center of the back. Greenbugs reproduce without mating and all offspring are female. Greenbugs also produce offspring at temperatures lower than can be tolerated by many of the natural predators or parasites of the greenbug. These factors are the reasons why greenbug populations can increase so rapidly, explains Extension Entomoligist Dr. Mike McWhorter. Greenbug damage to small grains results from their feeding habits. Greenbugs have piercing mouth parts in which they suck juices from infested plants. Greenbugs also inject toxins into the plant during feeding. This feeding process causes small grains to first turn yellow then orange in color and evntually die if the damage is severe. Greenbug damage is usually localized in a field but as infested plants die, new areas become infested as the greenbugs seek new food sources.

Control decisions must be made only after determining beneficial insect numbers, greenbug numbers, soil moisture conditoins and the stage of small grain growth.

Insecticides such as Diamethoate (Cygon (R), De-Fend (R) Di-Syston (R), malathion, methyl parathion or parathion are effective greenbug control agents. Additoinal information concerning application rates and specific regulations for the use of these insecticides can be obtained by contacting the Callahan County Agricultural Agent's Yuna V. Burkett.
