They will appear in the Review's Christmas Edition which will be put into the mails on Sunday, Dec. 23. The letters will be forwarded to the North Pole.

The Review faces a unique situation this Yuletide. Shortage of newsprint has forced publishers to split Christmas greeting advertisements of Cross Plains and area businesses into two weeks. They will be carried in issues dated December 19 and the annual Christmas Edition.

Publishers of the home town newspaper are not happy with this situation, but in order to stretch the present dwindling supply of newsprint a week longer and still serve its supporters and readers, this ar-

rangement was necessary. Other factors governing this arrangement included time off for the Review staff. If this was not done local newspaper people would be working on Christmas Day. Postal regulations also dictate that a weekly publication may not enter two papers in one week in the mails.
