Stock Show Opens On Friday

82 Local Students Capture Places On Third Honor Roll

Eighty-two students at Cross Plains schools earned honor roll status for the third six-week period, according to lists released by school officials this week.

Sixty-five of the elite scholars were from the eight elementary grades, and only 17 were from the top four high school classes.

According to the roster received by the Review, the first grade and the fifth grade were the top classes in number of elite students. Each had 10. Elementary Principal Arthur Boyle also listed the two runner-up classes, each with nine honor pupils, as the second and fourth grades.

Eight seniors made the elite list, according to Scot H. Edington, high school principal. Five sophomores were classroom stars, and just two juniors and a like number of freshmen made the honor list.

A student must compile a general average of 90 or above to be eligible for the honor roll.

The third six-week period marked the end of the first semester for the 1973-74 school year. It ended the week just prior to Christmas.

Local School Notes 30 Minute Change

Classes at Cross Plains schools began 30 minutes later today, Wednesday, and were dismissed 30 minutes later.

The new schedule was implemented because of darkness of the usual beginning time of 8:30 a.m. since daylight saving time was re-instituted over the nation last Sunday.

Classes now begin at the local schools at 9 a.m. and will dismiss at 4:05 p.m., DST. How long that time schedule will be followed was not immediately revealed.

It was pointed out that students taking vocational courses at Cisco Junior College would continue to leave on the old schedule.

Friday will be a holiday for local students because of the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show being held here Friday and Saturday. Teachers will, however, report for duty as usual for a work day.

It was also noted that the day lost Thursday due to inclement weather will be made up at a date to be scheduled later.

Local Bank Deposits Reach All-Time High

Deposits at the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains reached an all-time high at the close of business on December 31, 1973.

According to figures revealed upon a call by the Texas Banking Commission deposits hit \$6,826,503.10 at the close of business on the last day of 1973. That total includes both demand and savings and time deposits.

Previous high deposits held by the local financial institution totaled \$6,386,295.31. That came at mid-year, on June 30, 1973. Current deposits are nearing

Annual Callahan County Junior Livestock Show will open Friday, Jan. 11, at 10 a.m. in the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Barn a mile north of Cross Plains on Highway 206. The two-day event will include judging of over 200 separate entries from the county 4-H clubs and the four Callahan FFA chapters.

There will be 65 entries in beef cattle, 12 in dairy cattle, 50 swine, 30 poultry, 30 rabbits, 10 goats and 35 entries in the sheep division.

Immunization Clinic Slated For School

A free immunization clinic has been scheduled at Cross Plains Elementary School on Tuesday, Jan. 22, from 1 to 3 p.m.

Parents of all pre-school age children in the Cross Plains Independent School District are invited to bring children to the first of the series of immunization clinics at that time. Vaccines will be given for measles, rubella, D.P.T. and polio series or boosters. The clinic will be open to infants, age 2 months, through children, age 6 years.

The clinic will be under the direction of Dr. Carl J. Sohns of this city, Mrs. Lynn Ault, school nurse, of Baird and the State Health Department, it was pointed out.

Mrs. Ault pointed out that the state health department recommends that all infants begin D.P.T. and polio immunization at age 2 months with boosters at 1½ to 2 years and 4 to 6 years. She added that measles and rubella are usually given at 12 months of age.

It was emphasized that parents bring records of any previous shots their children may have received.

Ice Covers Area 2 Days Last Week; Gas Low

A thin but treacherously slick layer of ice covered the Cross Plains area Wednesday of last week.

A fine mist began falling about 8 a.m. Wednesday, and sub-freezing temperature soon had area streets and highways almost impassable. By late afternoon heavily travelled thoroughfares had thawed somewhat, but motor vehicle travel still was considered extremely dangerous. That condition existed until afternoon on Thursday when the sun appeared and ice melted and moisture evaporated.

The slick roadways were blamed for at least five traffic mishaps, all of them considered minor, although at least one person involved in a mishap required hospitalization. Local Department of Public Safety personnel were not available for individual listings of the mishaps.

Ab Bennett of Cross Plains was killed in a one-car accident on slick pavement near Thurber Wednesday afternoon.

Adding to the hardship was dangerously low natural gas pressure. A few Cross Plains businesses closed their doors because of insufficient gas to provide enough heat for operation. School was dismissed on Thursday because of the foul weather. Pickup of students had already begun Wednesday morning when the ice began to form, and classes were dismissed an hour early that afternoon.

Gas pressure was revitalized late Thursday, and remained strong through the remainder of the cold spell.

Moisture from the ice was recorded as a trace by F. C. Newton, local official weather observer. No measurable precipitation has been recorded here through the first seven and one-half days of 1974.

Brucellosis Program Effective On Tuesday

The new brucellosis regulations governing cattle in Texas will go into effect on Tuesday, Jan. 15.

Texas Animal Health Commission noted that the new regulations will bring the Texas Brucellosis Program into compliance with national uniform methods and rules which are considered minimum standards.

Briefly, the state commission released the following concerning the new brucellosis program.

"This regulation requires that all breeding cattle two years of age and over that change ownership are required to be brucellosis tested. Breeding cattle may be tested on the farm or ranch or at an auction market. Slaughter type breeding cattle may be sold through livestock markets without test until sampled on the kill floor.

The brucellosis test will be good for movement purposes for a 30 day period provided animal is ear tagged and accompanied by test certificate."
