## Albert Lovell Explains Vote Registration Rules

Albert Lovell of Baird, Callahan County Tax Assessor-Collector who is also charged with keeping voter registration polls, has offered the following explanation of registration regulations.

He noted that if a person registered after October 1, 1971, he is eligible to vote through 1974. Additionally, it was explained, that if a person votes in a primary or the general election this year, 1974, he will automatically be pre-registered for another three years.

Lovell further advised that if a person does not vote in the primary or general election this year that he will need to

re-register. He pointed out, however, that his office would notify those who do not vote this year that re-registration is necessary.

The tax assessor-collector also pointed out that if a person has moved into Callahan County from elsewhere in Texas or from out-of-state, he must register at least 30 days prior to an election to be eligible to ballot.

Lovell also pointed out that some persons may now be exempt from jury duty. He issued the following to help persons, as indicated, gaining exemption from being called for jury service. It follows.

"Any person summoned as a juror who is exempt by law from jury service may establish his exemption without appearing in person by filing with the clerk of the court at any time before the date upon which he is summoned to appear.

"I hereby claim my exemption because of the following reason: (check one)

- ( ) 1. All persons over sixty-five (65) years of age.
- ( ) 2. All females who have legal custody of a child or children under the age of ten (10) years.

"Sign and check the proper exemption claimed and return to:

Albert Lovell, Tax Assessor-Collector, Callahan County, Baird, Texas 79504."

## One Person Households In County On Increase

In Callahan County, as well as in most other parts of the country, there has been a dramatic increase in the last few years in the number of people who are living apart from other members of their families and maintaining their own households.

Nationally, according to the Census Bureau, there are now no fewer than 13.5 million men and women living alone, as compared with 7.9 million in 1960.

As a result, singles households increased nearly four times as rapidly in the period as did other household formations. They rose by 71 per cent, as against 18 per cent for the others.

Many unattached men and women in the local area, who may have had no choice in former years but to reside with relatives or friends, have now found it possible to support themselves and maintain their own living quarters.

According to the latest government figures, the proportion of dwelling units in Callahan County that are occupied by singles is 21.3 per cent. In 1960 it was 17 per cent.

Throughout the United States as a whole, 20.2 per cent are one-person households. In the West South Central States, it is 18.4 per cent and, in the State of Texas, 18.2 per cent.

Included in this unattached group are young people and unmarried older people as well as divorced and widowed persons who have remained single.

In the local area, according to the findings, the number of one-person households has reached 639, as compared with the 1960 total of 476.

Various explanations are given to account for this trend. Analysts point to the great increase in job opportunities for women, making them more self-sufficient, economically.

It has led older women who have been widowed or divorced to return to the labor force. They have been able, aided by pensions, social security or other resources, to make out quite well on their own.

Chiefly responsible for the big upswing in living alone, however, are the young singles. The number of under-35's who are doing so has jumped nearly 160 per cent in the last ten years.

## Modified Peanut Program Is Presented To USDA

Editor's Note: Following is a news release from Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association at Gorman, which details the modified peanut program plan as recently presented to Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz by a national peanut grower group. It is in response to some proposed changes announced by the USDA some time ago.

"The steering committee of the National Peanut Grower Group on January 10 presented to Agriculture Secretary Butz a proposal for modification of the peanut price support program. The national grower organization had previously approved the general principles for modification of the program in the hope of eliminating points of vulnerability in the present program, particularly cost and lack of flexibility in permitting the production of peanuts for export and crushing at prices less than those prevailing on domestic edible peanuts.

"The plan as presented by the NPGG would drastically reduce CCC program costs through grower assessments that would be paid on the peanuts marketed in the United States. Such assessments, deducted from the grower's market price, would be placed in a general fund and used to defray program losses.

"The present domestic allotment of 1,610,000 acres would be retained for allotment production, but unlimited production would be permitted for peanuts to be used in export and domestic crushing. Under

the plan, price support loans would be available to growers through the three area grower associations as presently practiced. Peanuts produced on non-allotment acreage would be required to be moved through the grower associations in order to maintain identity, prevent substitution of peanuts, and preserve quality.

"Price support for allotment production would be based on 75 per cent of 1974 parity and adjusted for each crop by the change in the index of prices paid by farmers. The loan rate to growers would be 100 per cent of the adjusted base price, to be decreased by one percentage point annually to not less than 96 per cent. Support on non-allotment production would be established annually by USDA at 90 per cent of the estimated world market price.

"Stringent regulations would be established by the growers associations in determining that non-allotment peanuts are used expressly for export and crushing and do not reach the domestic edible market unless the domestic market cannot be supplied from allotment production.

"Agriculture Secretary Butz expressed reservations relative to the assessment approach, but a compromise may be accomplished by utilizing a gradual acreage reduction in allotment production and supporting such production as prices somewhat less than the 75 per cent of parity. The grower committee will continue to work with USDA personnel in an attempt to reach a solution that will be acceptable to both industry, USDA, and the Congress."

**6 WAYS TO CONSERVE AND SAVE**

**ON WINTER HEATING**

1. For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save on energy.
2. A routine service inspection by a qualified service man is advisable prior to the heating season. Follow the manufacturers recommendations on this. Clean filters keep the heating unit operating at maximum efficiency and economy. Filters are the most neglected part of any forced-air heating system.
3. A wood burning fireplace should be equipped with an efficient damper. Be sure to keep the damper closed when not in use. A chimney with the damper open carries warm air out the house, wasting heat.
4. To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extremely cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
5. Some wall heaters have fan-forced circulation. To clean, turn the unit "OFF". Blow dust out of unit with vacuum exhaust attachment. Clean the grill cover with a vacuum or warm detergent water.
6. Proper insulation and weather stripping will make your home more comfortable. It will help keep dust and dirt from blowing in, and will help to eliminate cold drafts in the winter time, thus saving money on your heating bill.

## 2,205 Callahan County Citizens Get S.S. Checks

The number of Callahan County residents who are getting Social Security checks each month from Washington continues to rise.

And the amounts that are going to them are increasing as well. The latest upward revision, just acted upon by Congress, will boost their payments by 11 per cent during 1974.

A total of 2,205 persons in the local area, more than ever before, are now on the receiving end. Three years ago there were 1,948.

They are benefitting from the contributions they made to the Social Security Trust Fund over the years via money deducted from their pay envelopes.

The majority of the recipients are retired workers. The others include disabled workers, widows, children and other dependents.

The facts and figures are contained in the latest annual report of the Social Security Administration.

They show that the increase in the number of beneficiaries has been due, chiefly, to periodic revisions of the law. The changes have had the effect of bringing more and more people

under coverage. Nationally, as a result, more than 9 out of every 10 working people now have Social Security protection.

Along with the increase in the number of persons enrolled has been the big increase in the size of pension checks.

In Callahan County, the average annual payment per recipient was \$1,431 in the past year, considerably more than the \$880 paid three years ago.

The combination of more beneficiaries and bigger checks has boosted considerably the inflow of cash to the local area.

The government's figures show that overall payments to local residents, as of the beginning of this year, were at the annual rate of \$3,156,000. Three years before, by way of contrast, the total was only \$1,716,000.

The rise, 83.9 per cent, tops the United States rise of 81.3 per cent and the West South Central States' 80.9 per cent.

To help pay for the 11 per cent hike in benefits that will be going into effect, the amount of a worker's income that will become subject to Social Security tax will be \$13,200 in 1974, instead of the present \$10,800.

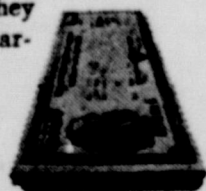

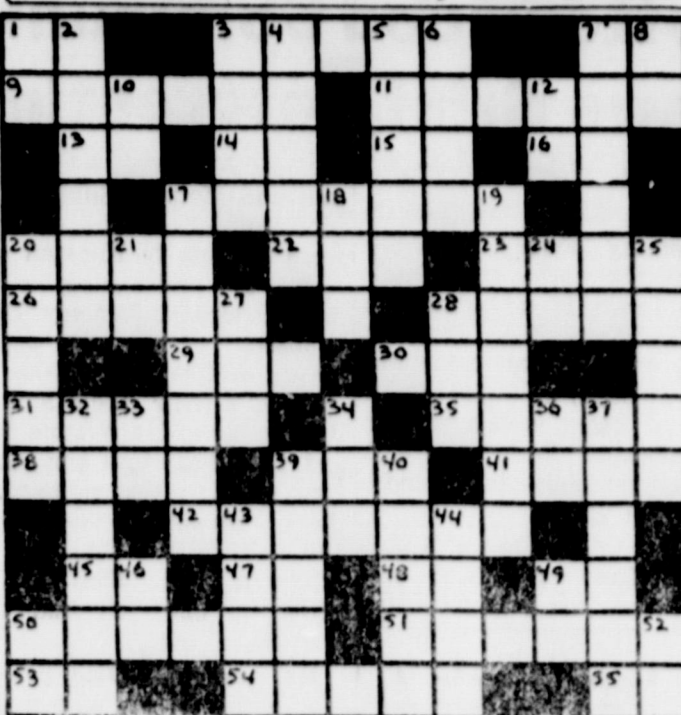

According to Joe F. Staley of the San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

The reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any post office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friends obtain a card for them.

The card should have an 8 cents postage stamp affixed and placed in the mail.
