## Factory Carpet Men Due At School Friday

Representatives from the factory which manufactured the carpet which was installed in the new Cross Plains Elementary School Building under question by school officials and trustees are scheduled to be here Friday to check on the carpet.

The carpet was made by Wellco Carpet Co. in Georgia. The carpet is one of the sore-spots listed when the Cross Plains schools hired an attorney in Sweetwater recently. That firm,

Nunn, Griggs, Veall & Wilks, is still attempting to arrange a settlement between the local schools, the contractor, Armstrong Construction Co. of Breckenridge, and the bonding company, United States Fidelity & Guaranty Co. of Dallas, without litigation.

Architect on the building, Don Hampton of Sweetwater, has hired George Barnard of Cross Plains to correct imperfection of ceiling panels in the entryway of the new school.

An electrician has also been here checking and correcting some of the electrical work in the building.

The local school trustees are seeking to have satisfactory action taken on the carpet and to protect the one-year warranty on the complete building through the attorney. The school board has not yet officially accepted the building, but it has been used by students almost 11 months.

## Price Increases Threaten Retail LP-Gas Market

The retail liquid petroleum gas business is fighting for its life.

At least that is the belief of Verner Rose, owner and operator of Rose Butane Gas Service in Cross Plains, and the Texas LP-Gas Association, which is headquartered in Austin.

Mr. Rose recently received a bulletin from Lowry Carpenter, executive vice-president of the state liquid petroleum gas organization, citing that fact.

In the bulletin Carpenter states that the steadily increasing wholesale costs to the dealer could increase easily to 40 cents per gallon.

He emphasized, "I believe the refiners have decided to eliminate the retail market, 'qualifying' that statement by adding that with the shortage of natural gas he believes that refiners can sell all LP gas produced to such firms as electrical generating market at a rate of 40 to 50 cents per gallon.

Mr. Rose has joined the state

organization in asking his customers and those of other distributors in this area to write congressmen and senators in an attempt to stem the rising costs and preserve the retail business of the industry.

Carpenter pointed out that when retail costs go up as high as 50 cents or more per gallon, users will be forced to change fuel systems, thereby eliminating the retail LP-gas business.

Rose Butane Gas Service has purchased an advertisement in today's Review in which most of the letter from Carpenter is published.

It was pointed out that a hand-written letter would be more appropriate.

## Callahan County Residents Pay \$435,000 For Smokes

To what extent have Callahan County residents changed their smoking habits, if at all, in the 10 years that have passed since the Surgeon General's warning that cigarette smoking was a hazard to health?

How much are local people smoking today, compared with people in other parts of the country? Judging from the latest statistics, many in the area have quit smoking entirely and many others have cut down on their consumption.

However, there has been a steady influx of new smokers, mostly teen-agers, offsetting these reductions.

This trend has been noted generally throughout the United States. A report issued by the National Clearing House for Smoking and Health shows that the number of cigarettes smoked last year was 593 billion, as against 524 billion when the antismoking campaign began, a decade ago.

Figures compiled by the Department of Agriculture, the Tobacco Tax Council and others give the rate of consumption in each section of the country.

In Callahan County, according to a breakdown of these

Two candidates have filed for a pair of aldermen posts for which terms are expiring. Announced aspirants are Alvin Hutchins, asking a first term, and T. T. (Nick) Nichols, seeking re-election.

Candidates have until March 6 to file with names printed on the ballots. School trustee aspirants should file with Dr. Carl J. Sohns, trustee secretary, and candidate for council seats or mayor should file with City Secretary Mrs. Vernelle Bishop.

Trustees are named for three-year terms, and councilmen are elected for two-year tenures.

figures, an estimated 916,000 packs were sold last year.

This was at the rate of 169 packs for every local resident over the age of 18.

It was less than in some communities and more than in others. Nationally, the average rate of consumption among people over age 18 was 206 packs. In the West Central States it was 180.

The government's figures show that there are 52 million cigarette smokers in the United States now, or 2 million more than in 1964, when the warning was sounded.

However, public health officials claim, the warning and the subsequent publicity that it generated over the years helped to reverse the trend that would have resulted in 75 million smokers today.

Even though the cost of smoking has been rising chiefly due to higher taxes imposed upon cigarettes by various levels of government, it has had little effect on sales. Americans are spending no less than \$12 billion a year in that direction.

In Callahan County, the overall outlay last year was approximately \$435,000, or about \$80.30 per smoker.



### School Transfer Date Revealed As May 1

Parents who wish to transfer children from their home school district to another area for the 1974-75 scholastic year should make necessary application to the receiving district by May 1, 1974, Leon R. Graham, Texas Education Agency assistant commissioner for administration, has announced.

The May 1 deadline for requests will enable school districts to file summary reports with the Texas Education Agency by May 15, Graham points out.

These reports will be reviewed by the agency to make sure none of the transfer requests violate U.S. District Court Order 5281 issued by Judge William Wayne Justice in Tyler on April 2, 1971. Under this order, any transfer of students from one school district to another must not change the racial or ethnic balance in either the home or receiving district by more than one per cent.

If the balance is altered by more than one per cent, the transfers will be denied, Graham adds.

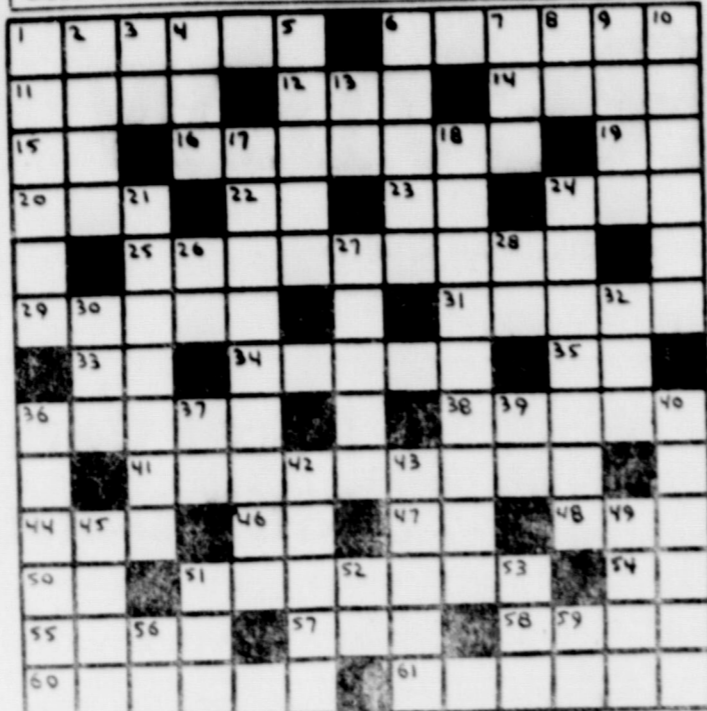

### Area Persons May Qualify For SSI

The Social Security Administration began making monthly cash payments in January 1974 to people in financial need who are 65 or older or who are blind or disabled. The payments are called Supplemental Security Income (SSI).

Glynn Hammons, district manager of the Abilene social security office, stated that many people are aware of SSI for the aged and disabled, but perhaps as many know about SSI for the blind.

In order to be considered blind, an individual's corrected vision must not be better than 20/200 in both eyes.

The aim of SSI is to provide a basic cash income to people in need who are 65 or older or blind or disabled. The basic payment nationwide will assure that each eligible person will have an income of at least \$140 a month, and each eligible couple at least \$210.

A person who is single can have assets—things he owns—worth up to \$1500 and still get SSI. The amount for a couple is \$2250. However, not everything counts as an asset.

For example, a home and a car of nominal value won't count. Nor will insurance policies if their face value is \$1500 or less.

The amount that an eligible SSI applicant can receive depends upon his other income. Therefore, pensions, social security checks, rents, and the like are first considered. Twenty dollars of the unearned income will not be counted, but the re-

mainder will be deducted from the standard monthly payment amount. This means an individual who has unearned income of \$260 per month or more will not be eligible for any payment. Similarly, a couple whose unearned income is \$230 per month or more won't qualify.

Earned income, if any, will then be considered. Each month, sixty-five dollars earned income will not be counted, and only half of the remaining earned income will be applied against the monthly payment.

Hammons noted that if additional information is needed about requirements for SSI for the blind, aged, or disabled, individuals should contact the Social Security Office located in the Federal Building at North 3rd and Pine Streets, or telephone (915) 677-5262.

## Rose Butane Gas Service

OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS

Asks Its Customers And Other Area LP-Gas

Users For Help.

Following are excerpts from a letter Mr. Verner Rose, owner and operator of Rose Butane Gas Service of Cross Plains, received recently from Lowry M. Carpenter, executive vice-president of Texas LP-Gas Association of Austin, urging LP-Gas Dealers to encourage LP-Gas customers to write Congressmen in an effort to hold price of LP-Gas down. Recent forced price increases reportedly threaten the Retail LP-Gas Industry. Portions of Carpenter's letter, dated Jan. 8, 1974, follow.

"In my bulletin of December 19, I told you of rumors of 35c-40c wholesale prices. We've had 4c-6c increases all over the state last week - putting most dealers' cost at the 22c-27c wholesale level. I can readily envision a 40c wholesale price - and that means you are out of business, for all practical purposes . . .

"I believe the refiners have decided to eliminate the retail market as we have known it for the past 35 years. With the shortage of natural gas I believe refiners have decided that they can sell all the LPG they make to the peak shaving - stand-by - electrical generating market at 40c-50c per gallon . . .

"When LP-gas at retail must be sold for 50c or more per gallon your customer will change . . .

"In my bulletin of December 19 I suggested Congressional contact by each of you. . . I then set up a Legislative Contact Committee of dealers . . . and these people are doing a good job.

"But this won't be enough. We must use the ultimate weapon - contact by your customers.

"I'm asking each of you - every dealer in the state - to make a goal of an absolute minimum of 1% of your customers and get them to write their U. S. Senator and Congressman. The best contact is the customer who is hardest hit economically (fixed income families . . .).

"An elected official pays more attention to a hand written personal letter from the consumer than to anything else! Even if the letter is written on butcher paper with a number two lead pencil.

"Don't use a form letter on this. It does much more harm than good. You may have to help your customer write and address the letter and even stamp it. But two or three days of your time on this may well be the most important time you've ever invested in your business.

"Ask your customer to tell how much his fuel bill will run in a cold month, his total income and what's left for all other necessities of life. Then to ask why LP-gas has gone up so much and what can be done to help him . . .

"Remember. The future of the retail consumer-oriented segment of the LP-gas industry is on the line. You must act fast and decisively. And you must act soon. The next two months or less will determine whether we go or stay."
