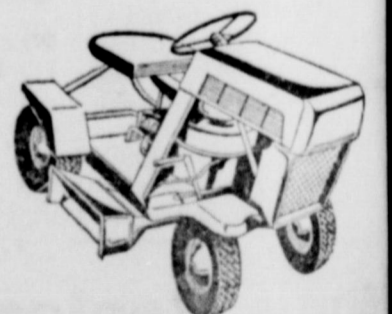
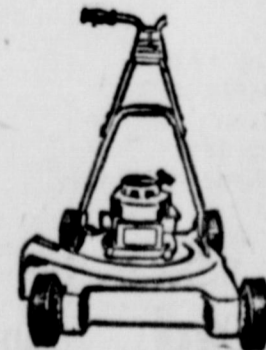
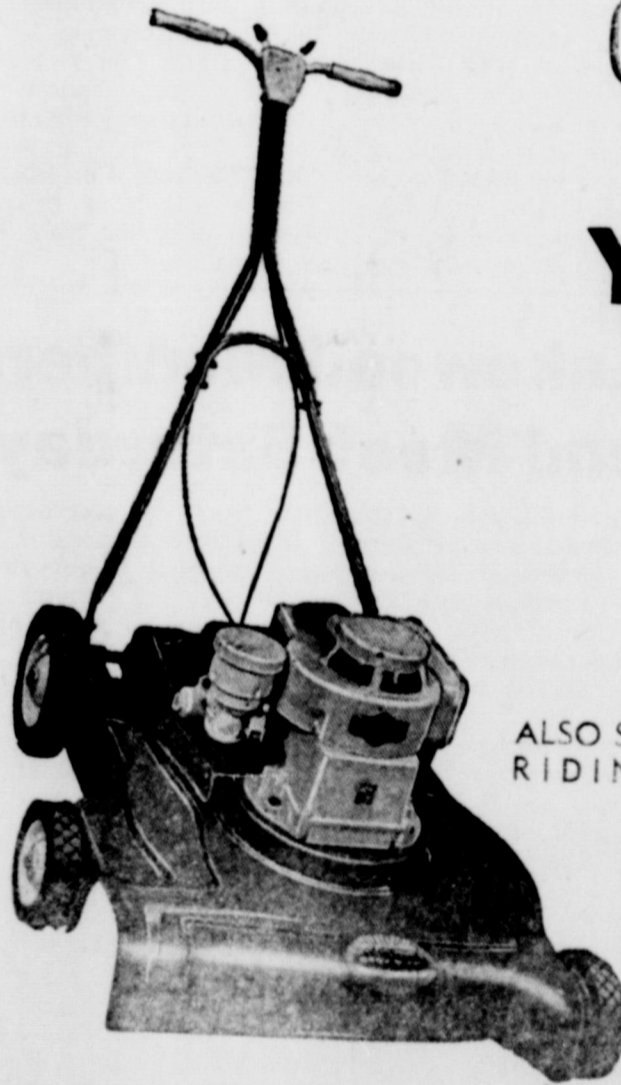

MRS. CLIFF CRENSHAW IS BACK AT HOME HERE

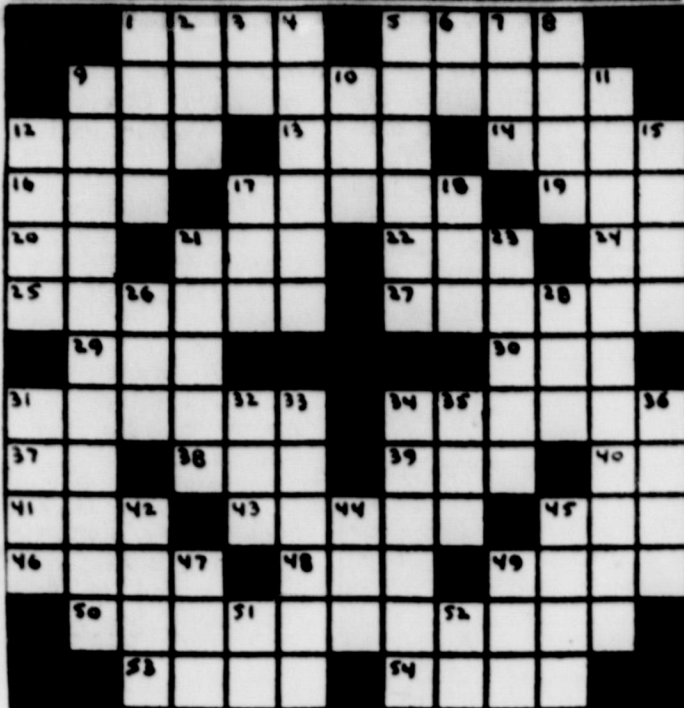

County Agent Gives Tips On Gardening

Many home gardeners are making seed and plant selections in preparation for the spring gardening season. Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Extension Agent of Baird, suggests that growers select plants and seeds that are suited to soil types and climatic conditions in this area.

In past years tomato growers have been plagued with nematodes and several different types of wilt. *Fusarium Wilt* was a big problem in 1973 and if you had any trouble with this disease, you should consider planting one of the varieties resistant to wilt. *Homestead* and *Floradel* are two of the varieties that are resistant to this disease. *Nematex* tomato is resistant to nematodes, however plants of this variety may be hard to find and you may have to grow your own from seed.

Seeds should be started as soon as possible so that plants will be ready to plant in the garden the first part of May, Gerngross noted.
