ASCS Office At Baird Outlines 3 Programs

J. C. Earp, Jr. county executive director of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service at Baird, has released the following data concerning cost-share conservation practices, cotton acreage deadline extension and wheat disaster payments.

The 1973 REAP that was terminated in December of 1972 has been reinstated. A sign-up period to accept requests for cost-share assistance for the following practices will begin immediately: planting permanent grass, wells, terraces, diversion terraces, waterways, control of oak, mesquite, or prickly pear. Requests will be considered by the committee on April 26 and May 10, provided funds are available.

A sign-up period for winter cover crops will be announced at a later date.

The final date to sell, lease, release or request cotton acreage has been extended until May 1, 1974. The final date for peanuts was not extended and expired April 1.

The reason for the extension of the final date was due to a change in disaster provisions of the cotton program.

There are two kinds of disaster payments that producers may be eligible for in the 1974 wheat program: (1) natural disaster such as drought or hail and (2) abnormally low yields.

Under the drought or hail provision, a producer must make application and the crop appraised before it is plowed up or grazing is started. If a low yield is obtained due to natural causes an application may be filed after harvest and production evidence presented at that time.

He married Nellie Gould in Loveington, N. M. on Oct. 22, 1930.

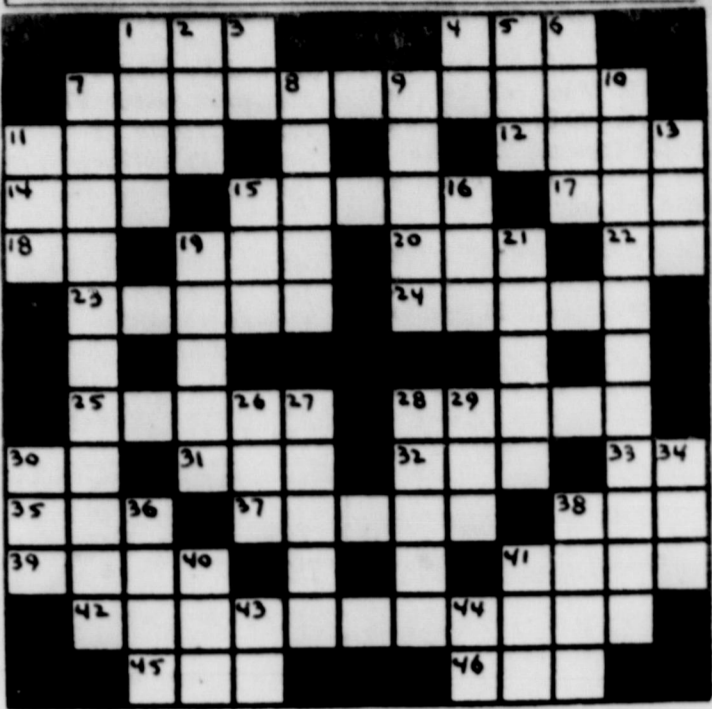

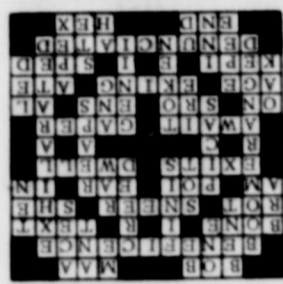

Stockmen Warned Of Screwworm Hazard

Livestock owners of the southwestern United States should redouble their efforts this spring to find, treat and prevent screwworm cases, since the livestock parasite is expected to reach record numbers due to unusually mild winter just ended.

This warning comes from Dr. M. E. "Cotton" Meadows, Jr., director of the Mission-based screwworm eradication program of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Meadows also cautioned producers to refrain from livestock surgery or other manmade wounds to prevent screwworm infestations.

"Thirty per cent of all laboratory confirmed cases so far in 1974 have been collected from manmade wounds (dehorning, branding, docking and the like), and every effort should be made to prevent wounding animals during the screwworm season," Meadows said.

The USDA veterinarian emphasized that the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association also solicits the cooperation of all livestock owners in an all-out effort to eliminate the screwworm fly. In a special resolution approved by the industry organization at its recent annual meeting in Dallas, all livestock owners of the southwest were urged to support the eradication effort by inspecting their animals frequently; treating all wounds with an approved product, and collecting and submitting worm specimens to the screwworm laboratory at Mission, Texas, for identification. Positive cases then can be given sterile fly treatment, officials reminded.

Screwworm cases are off to a fast start this spring, with 23 new cases confirmed last week from counties as far north as Brown and Haskell. Others reporting first '74 cases last week were Atascosa, Brooks, Jim Hogg, Willacy and Zavala.

Total case tally for Texas thus far in 1974 is 78, while only 59 were recorded through the end of March a year ago. The U. S. total for 1974 now stands at 90, with California reporting 8 and Arizona, 4.

Callahan U. S. Tax Bill Estimated At 5.7 Billion

Taxes are again in the spotlight in Callahan County, what with the day of reckoning, April 15th, just around the bend.

The big question among local residents is how much of a bite Uncle Sam will be taking this time.

Last April he collected approximately \$5,012,000 in personal income and employment taxes in the area, based upon the previous year's earnings.

That is the estimate of what was turned in locally as determined by a breakdown of the overall tax receipts through out the state of Texas.

The statewide total was approximately \$8,354,000,000, according to figures released by the Treasury Department.

It is estimated, as a result, that Callahan County residents contributed 0.06 per cent of the Federal income taxes collected in the state.

Because employment was at a high level in most parts of the country in the past year, despite relative weakness in the economy in the last quarter, total earnings were greater than in 1972.

The tax yield, therefore, is expected to be greater, since bigger earnings mean bigger taxes.

The administration anticipates that its receipts from individual income and employment taxes will be \$24.8 billion greater than they were last April.

Its budget, submitted to Congress in January, counts on \$202 billion from this source, as against last year's total of \$177.2 billion.
