## Annual Rodeo At Baird Scheduled May 2-4

The 48th annual Callahan Sheriff's Posse Rodeo will be held at Baird Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

## Rain Shower Yields Quarter Inch Here

Cross Plains received only .25 of an inch of rain from the shower which fell over this area early Tuesday morning.

It was the first measurable moisture since April 11 when F. C. Newton, official weather observer here, gauged .41 of an inch. Total rainfall here for April, to mid-morning Tuesday, is .66 of an inch and year's total stands at 3.49 inches.

Atwell and Rowden areas reported .40 of an inch Tuesday morning, and .30 of an inch was received in the Cross Cut and Burkett sectors. Only .20 was gauged in Cottonwood, Sabano and Pioneer communities.

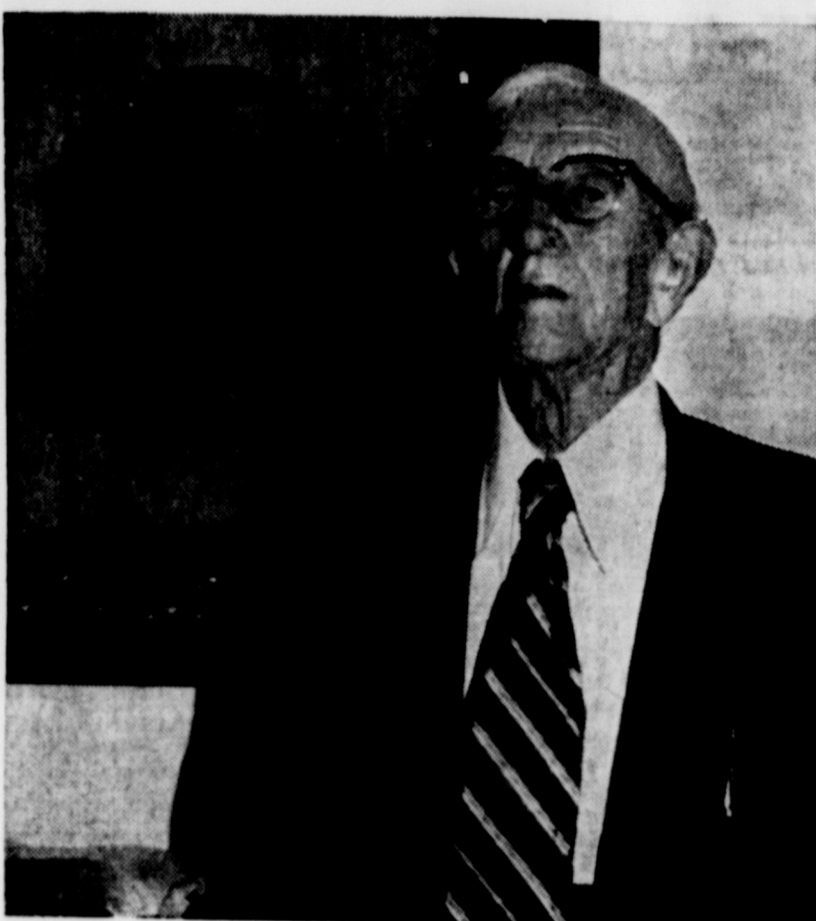

## S. F. "Fos" Bond, 101, Buried Here Monday

Cross Plains buried a founding father Monday.

Samuel Foster Bond, 101, last surviving member of the Townsite Company which incorporated the present City of Cross Plains on Jan. 12 1911, died Saturday night in West Texas Medical Center at Abilene. He had been taken there earlier in the day by local ambulance after becoming ill at Colonial Oaks Nursing Home here, where he had been a resident several months.

Funeral was conducted from Higginbotham Chapel Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock with the Rev. Luther Helm, pastor of the First United Methodist Church officiating. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery.

Mr. Bond was born March 16, 1873, in Holly Springs, Miss. He came to Cross Plains with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Bond, in 1884. Although only 11 years of age at the time Mr. Bond and a cousin drove a herd of cattle here from Grayson County.

He married Mable Jones, also a member of a pioneer family in this section of Texas, Dec. 19, 1900. She preceded him in death on Oct. 16, 1964.

## Democratic Voting Is Slated Saturday

A six-man race for County Commissioner from Precinct 4 is expected to result in a heavy turnout of voters in Cross Plains for the Democratic Primary election Saturday.

Alton Hornsby, Democratic precinct chairman who will supervise voting here, said Tuesday that a heavier than normal voter total is expected to be cast in Cross Plains.

Polls in Cross Plains will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. at the City Hall.

Hornsby asked all voters to please have registrations in hand when voting. "It will speed up balloting, and make operations easier on all election personnel," he emphasized.

Those seeking the commissioner's post are, in alphabetical order: J. E. Blanton, Nathan S. Foster, Billy Hines, Duke Mitchell, E. P. (Franzel) Odom and Lester M. Wyatt. Mitchell is the incumbent.

The only contested Callahan County race is that for county school superintendent. L. C. Cash of Baird, incumbent, is being challenged by Robert F. Joy, Jr. of Cross Plains, and E. L. (Chief) Reese of Baird.

No other county office is contested. Running unopposed are A. E. Dyer, Jr., county judge; Cora Mae Payne, district clerk; Beatrice Deal, county clerk; and Hazel Reynolds, county treasurer.

Omar Burleson is not opposed for re-election as U. S. Congressman from the 17th District. Lynn Nabers of Brownwood likewise drew no contestant for re-election to the State House of Representatives from the 55th District.

A referendum on making pari-mutuel wagering on horse races legal on a local option basis is stirring up considerable interest.
