Vote Re-Count In Commissioner Race Cash And Reese Face Superintendent Run-Off

Cross Plains voters went to the polls in strength Saturday in the Democratic Primary. Alton E. Hornsby, precinct chairman, reported 690 votes tallied here.

Outside of the close race for commissioner from Precinct 4, Cross Plains, the only other race in Callahan County which will require a run-off is that for Callahan County School Superintendent.

In that contest incumbent L. C. Cash polled 860 votes across the county while challenger E.

L. (Chief) Reese received 673. The third candidate, Robert F. Joy, Jr., got 345 votes. Cash and Reese will face each other in the run-off election on June 1.

In Cross Plains Cash was heavily favored with 341 ballots, Joy ran second with 170, and Reese got 147. Until the Cross Plains box came in about two hours after the polls closed, Reese owned a 526-519 advantage over Cash throughout the county.

Cross Plains polled the largest number of votes in the

county with 690. Clyde was next with 511, and Baird was third with 445. Others were: Eula 11, Putnam 100 plus, Opeline 66, Denton Valley 35, and 44 absentees.

Cross Plains and Callahan County agreed with results state and district-wide in voting Saturday.

Cross Plains turned down the referendum which could allow the 64th Legislature to enact a pari-mutuel wagering law on horse races 239 to 163. Across the county it also failed 972 to 583. It failed over the state.

Governor Dolph Briscoe was heavily favored in Cross Plains with 540 votes. Mrs. Farenthold got 75 and Alexander and Posey each got 11. Over county Briscoe received 1,536 followed by Farenthold 228, Alexander 41 and Posey 31.

Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls won the race against Charles Fennell of Holliday for the Democratic nomination for State Senator from the 30th District. In Cross Plains he was favored over Fennell 347 to 219, and across the county Farabee won 1,079 to 662. Farabee will face Mrs. Mary Kirchoff, a Republican, in the general election in November.

In other contested races across the state Cross Plains voters favored the eventual winner, Bob Bullock polled 409 votes to Hugh Edberg's 132 in seeking State Comptroller's office. Cross Plains voters favored incumbent and victor Jesse James 447 to 184 for Donald Yarborough for State Treasurer. John C. White won re-nomination as Commissioner of Agriculture and carried Cross

A hotly contested race for nominee of Democratic Party for Callahan County Commissioner from Precinct 4, Cross Plains, was the focus point of the Democratic Primary balloting here last Saturday.

A total of 690 votes were polled in Cross Plains and seven absentee votes were cast in the commissioner's race.

Incumbent Duke Mitchell was the leader in the race with 223 votes. The next two candidates, Nathan S. Foster and

E. F. (Franz) Odom tied with 144 votes each. Billy Hines was not far behind with 140 ballots. Trailing were J. E. Blanton and Lester Wyatt with 22 votes each.

The County Executive Committee met in Baird Monday to canvass returns. The committee ruled to call in the two candidates with the votes, Odom and Foster, and included Hines because his vote total was within five per cent of the two run-off spot who will oppose

County Democratic Chairman Hugh Ross of Baird reported late Monday afternoon that the three candidates, Foster, Odom and Hines had mutually agreed to a re-count of the votes at the called session in Baird. Application was made to do so.

Ross also related that the re-count would in all probability be done this week, stating that election laws called for it to be accomplished within four days.

He further explained that a three-member board from Precinct 4 would have to be selected to conduct the re-count.

Ross related that he would be responsible for providing the three member re-count board, but that he was to consult with Precinct Chairman Alton E. Hornsby of Cross Plains, who is a patient in an Abilene hospital, before naming the board.

In voting Saturday Mitchell polled 221 votes, and Foster had 143. Both Odom and Hines got 140 each. Absentee ballots, seven in number, gave Mitchell two, for a total of 223. Odom got four for a 144 aggregate, and Foster got one for a total of 144.

It was generally thought in Cross Plains that if the re-count of votes does not alter the outcome or break the deadlock, then candidates would have to resort to another method of deciding who would face Mitchell in the run-off election on June 1.

That is thought to be a "casting of lots", such as flipping a coin. Election laws provide for such procedure under certain circumstances.

Parade Will Launch L. L. Season On Friday

Although still short of players, Cross Plains Little League will open the season Friday, May 10.

Following the usual custom a downtown parade will precede opening games. The professional will form at Lawrence Farm & Ranch Supply on South Main Street and at 5 p.m. will march northward up Main to Little League Field.

The parade will feature the four Little League teams and the two Pee Wee squads. League president Skeet Walker has invited any organization and individuals to participate in the professional.

No formal opening ceremonies are planned this year, but three baseball games are on tap. The Pee Wees units will clash at 5:30 p.m. Starting at 6:30 opening Little League tilt will begin. That will feature the Buffs and Kilowatts. Starting at about 8 p.m. the Cats and Beadels will collide.

Board States Policy On School Streaking

Cross Plains High School Board of Trustees issued the following statement of policy this week after a streaking incident at the local schools last Friday.

The board's statement follows:

"Action recommended to the administration of Cross Plains Independent School District is the expulsion of the guilty student for the remainder of this school year (1973-74) for the disturbance of the high school and elementary school by running naked (genital areas exposed) on Friday, May 3, 1974, and that such may be punished by expulsion from school for one calendar year. Strong disciplinary action will be taken against anyone who encourages, entices, bribes to assist in any way a student to commit such an act."

Equal Rights Proposal Is Discussed Further

Editor's Note: The following article was written by Mrs. Homer Don Parson of the Pioneer-Sabano area regarding the Equal Rights Amendment for which ratification is being sought. This is the first in a series of stories Mrs. Parson plans to author. Members of the Texas Legislature may be addressed at Capitol Station, Austin, Texas, for those who wish to write their respective representative and Senator.

The Equal Rights Amendment according to Prof. Thomas Emerson who wrote a 114 page analysis of the 24 word ERA in the April 1971 "Yale Law Journal", sets forth 14 separate areas of law directly affected.

Briefly, these include related to military service: the draft when in use, combat duty, no privacy based on sex, no exception for married or pregnant women nor mothers, wed or unwed.

Oh yes, men, it may sound good to you, that women will be legally obligated to provide 50 percent of the family income,

but you must take over 50 percent of the household duties. That kind of takes a new light, huh? Imagine going to jail for not doing the dishes! The door for that is open unless you "push" Austin to shut it.

The moral laws will be almost abolished. Statutory rape, seduction laws, prostitution, sodomy, and adultery laws written with sex discriminating language will be obsolete.

All state laws governing family relationships will be invalidated. Men, your wife, pardon me—your "spouse" can wear any name she chooses. For that matter, so can your children. You will no longer legally be the head of your household. You can claim only 50 per cent "headship" if you're man enough to keep that. It's not enough to women who will be receiving a low blow—the men may be hit the hardest. Many grounds for divorce will be dissolved along with many all-pervasive, child custody and support laws.

Senator Sam Erwin was correct when he said the implications of the ERA would "destroy the social structure on which America rests."

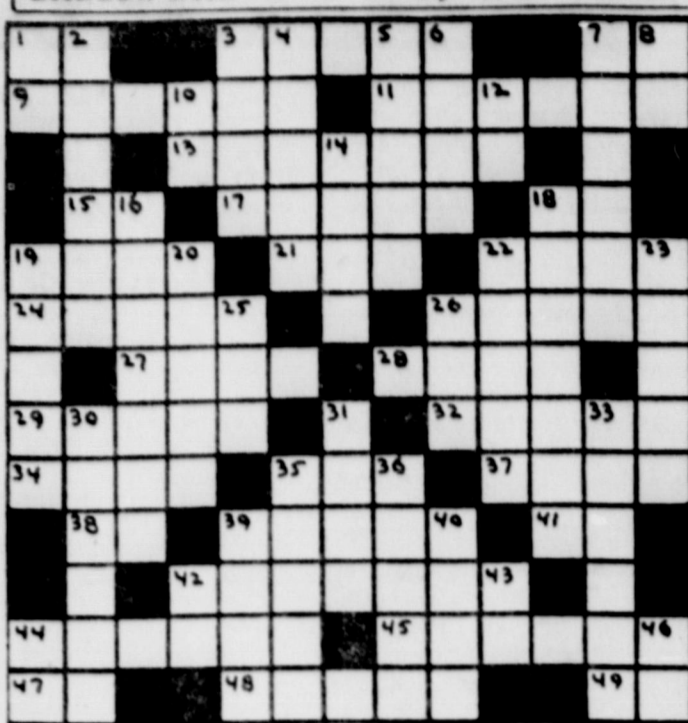
The garden wedding is set for Monday, May 27, to take place amid hundreds of exotic wild orchid plants, coconut palms, and under a 120-year-

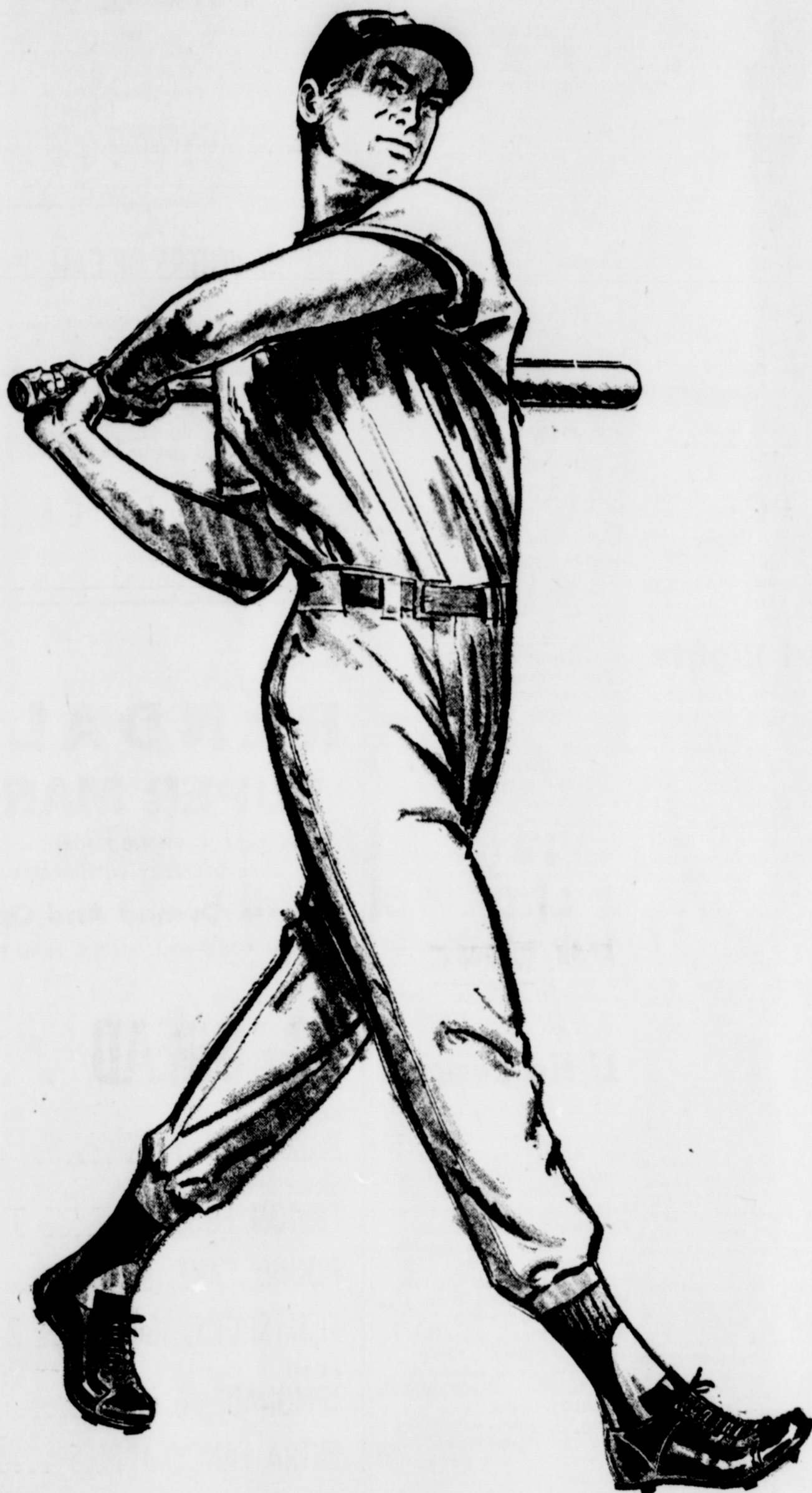

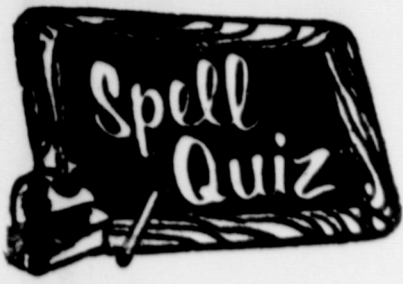

One of the worst things about the ERA is that powerful Section 2. Don't let anyone tell you that it is only common legal language amounts to nothing! As it is worded it will take absolutely all jurisdiction from the 50 separate state legislatures in ERA related matters and lay it in the lap of the Federal Government. About your "man" in Austin and elsewhere. The backers of ERA are already demanding and starting to get 53 per cent of everything in government, business and private life. The men in Austin have voted away their own voice in ERA matters, but they can "change their minds" and revoke our ratification.

Many more amendments like this and there will cease to be a need for "men" in Austin because Washington will be doing everything except changing diapers!
