County Teen Purchasing Power Increases Greatly

Callahan County's teen-agers, growing in number and in affluence, have emerged as a consumer group with a strong economic clout. They are spending an estimated \$935,000 a year for clothing, records, care, cosmetics, costume jewelry, snacks and soft drinks, tape recorders, sportswear, entertainment and the like. The findings are based upon facts and figures compiled by the Youth Research Institute here in a survey covering the nation as a whole. It shows that America's teen-agers now have a personal income of over \$24.7 billion a year. This includes their weekly allowances and their after-school earnings—from baby sitting, lawn mowing and other jobs. According to the survey, those in the 16 to 19 age group are the wealthiest. Girls in that bracket average \$22.15 a week and boys, \$20.85. The 13 to 14 set has much less, \$7.10 for girls and \$6.85 for boys. For Callahan County's teenage population, which now totals 1,100, it produces spending at the average rate of \$850

Higher Cost Of Operation Forces School Tax Hike

Higher operation costs of Standard Act of 1974, providing wages at \$1.90 per hour effective May 1, 1974, and in January 1975, going to \$2.00 per hour for all non-teacher personnel, combined with the other mentioned operation cost increases, made shambles of school budgets. As a result local funds may have to be used to supplement transportation and to eliminate deficits in lunchroom, athletic and bond accounts, it was explained. When sacrifices are made to meet the rising costs, it was explained, the standard of education which partons want and should demand, will suffer. In addition improvements to the local school plant must not be ignored much longer or a major expense could be imposed, it was pointed out. Further, Cross Plains schools lost a classroom teacher unit due to lower attendance, and to keep the quality education provided here, a teacher must be paid out of local maintenance funds. A summary explanation noted that in order to maintain the quality level of education offered by Cross Plains schools, more funds from taxation was imperative. Therefore equalization board established the 30 per cent increase in property values. Screwworm Cases On Increase Through State

Screwworm cases are continuing their northward trek across Texas, and producers are reminded to re-double their efforts against the costly livestock pest. "Texas has just recorded 590 cases in May, or 67 per cent of the total cases it has experienced this year to date," warns Dr. M. E. Meadows, Jr., veterinarian in charge of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program at Mission. "With rains received over a number of areas recently, the moisture is expected to increase the opportunities for more worm cases, unless producers really watch their animal and treat all wounds," Meadows says. "Earlier, cases had moved north from the Hill Country to Concho, Runnels, and Haskell Counties, which probably accounts for the cases now occurring in Cottle," says Meadows. Non-screwworm sample submitted by producers dipped somewhat in May. "With the Gulf Coast ticks expected to create additional worm problems, especially in the southern portion of Texas, all producers should join in the battle against screwworms," adds Meadows. To make the battle more effective, producers should carefully check animals regularly for wounds, submit samples from worms found in wounds, treat all wounds, and spray or dip livestock on a regular basis.

Medicare Rates Slated To Increase On July 1

Monthly premiums on the medical insurance part of Medicare will go up starting July 1. The basic premium rate will go from \$6.30 to \$6.70 per month, according to Flynn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene.

The medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses and is funded by individual premiums and federal general revenues. The protection is offered automatically to people reaching 65 who are eligible for social security benefits and to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more.

"The Medicare law requires an annual review of the cost of the medical insurance program and adjustment of the monthly premium rate to cover the estimated medical expenses of Medicare patients," Hammons said.

The 40-cent increase in July is related to a rise in the cost of medical services and compares to a 50-cent increase in the medical insurance basic monthly premium rate in 1973.

Medicare hospital insurance premiums must also be increased starting July 1. "The basic premium rates will go from \$33 to \$36 a month," Hammons said.

Hospital insurance protection is extended automatically, without premium charge, to people reaching 65 who are eli-

gible for social security or railroad retirement benefits and to disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more.

People 65 and over who aren't eligible for social security benefits can get Medicare hospital insurance by paying a monthly premium if they also sign up for the medical insurance.

The hospital insurance premium rate is based on the average monthly Medicare hospital insurance payment for patients who have the protection.

About 23 million people have one or both parts of Medicare. In 1973, the hospital insurance program paid \$7.1 billion in benefits and the medical insurance program paid \$2.5 billion.

"People can get information about signing up for Medicare by calling, writing, or visiting any social security office," Hammons said. The Abilene social security office is located at 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is 698-1360.

It is R. John Catlett, Abilene, Grant Co. receiver, No. 1-B H. C. Williams. It was originally filed by the Grant Co.

Site is 1,280 feet north, thence 1,320 feet east of the northeast corner of J. C. Bailey Survey 137, but in John Beck Survey 792.

Absolute open flow was 182,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 2,772-93 feet. The 5 1/2-inch casing is set at 3,226 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,255 feet.

The well was originally completed in 1957 from an open hole at 3,226-55 feet as Reynolds, Kirk & Neeb No. 1-B Williams.

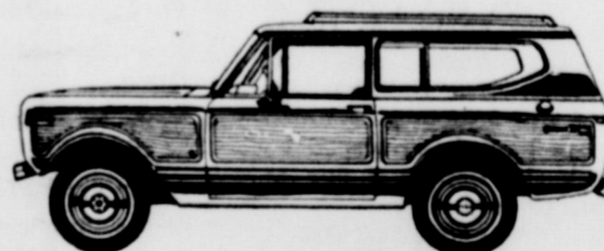

REDDY'S VACATION TIPS

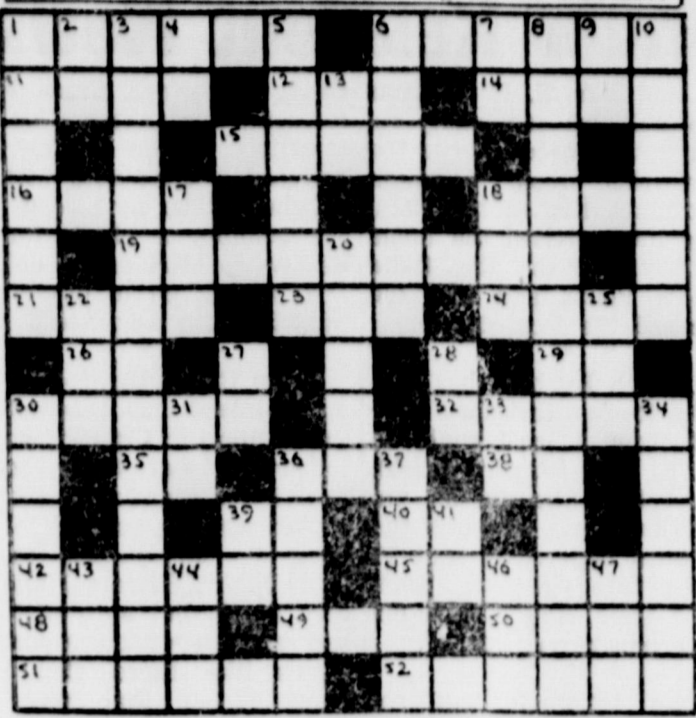


Clip and save this vacation checklist.

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls — on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.

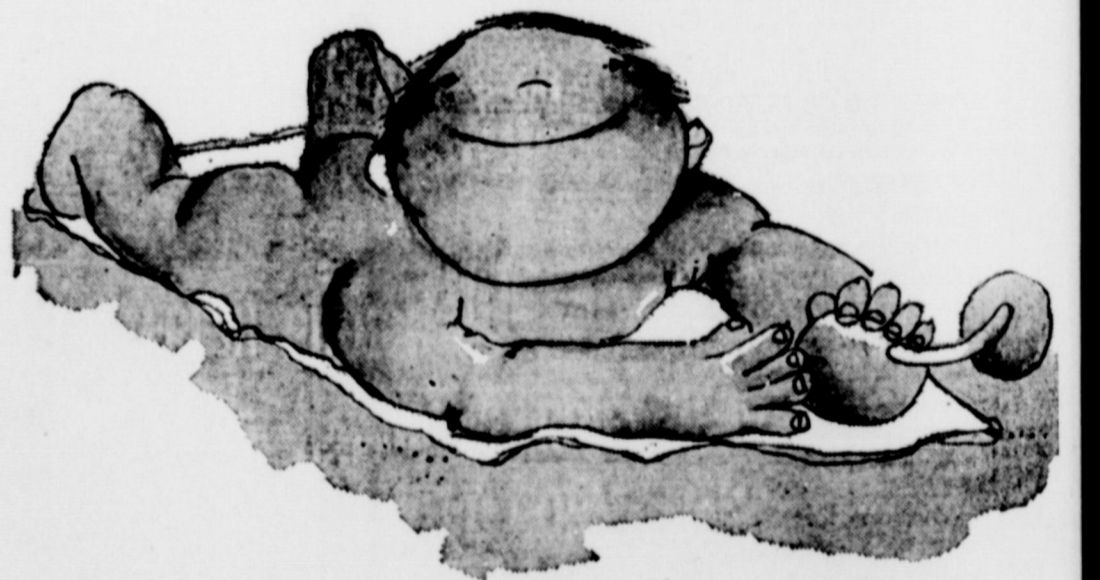
LOCAL MERCHANT ENDS GROCERY BOARD TENURE
