The annual reunion of Callahan County old settlers is scheduled to be held in Cross Plains' Treadaway Park on Saturday, August 10, beginning at 9:30 a.m. with registration. More details will be published about the gathering, which was reinstated this year after a year's absence, in next week's Review.

## Summer Band Set To Begin August 5

Summer band starts on Monday, August 5, according to band director Carroll Rhodes.

August 5 through August 8 the band will meet from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Second session will be from August 12 through August 16, at which time the band will meet 3:30 to 5:30 p.m.

Rhodes stated they originally planned to have meetings for only one week twice each day. However, due to the teachers' in-service meetings, they will have to start two weeks earlier. Rhodes added that in order to have a successful year, "We will have to start early and get everything lined up."

## Limitation On Water Use In Effect Another Week

Curtailment on water usage in Cross Plains has been continued for another week by city officials.

The limitations imposed last week will be continued for another week, according to Mayor Jack Scott. That includes a ban on outside irrigation four days weekly, Wednesday, Friday, Sunday and Monday. It was pointed out that outside watering will continue to be allowed on alternate days, Thursday, Saturday and Tuesday, but again city officials request that irrigation be limited to absolutely essential requirements.

Mayor Scott, Water Commissioner Alvin Hutchins and other city officials lauded the cooperation received from the citizens of Cross Plains last week. "The cooperation was wonderful," the mayor stated Tuesday morning, "and we hope that they will bear with us another week."

Pumpings from the 29 city wells could not keep up with the usage prior to imposing the restrictions on water use.

and that in turn was imperiling water storage held back in case of a major fire outbreak. Scott and Billy Dillard, city water superintendent, pointed out Tuesday morning that since the limitations were imposed that storage has been recovered. They explained that there are

300,000 gallons in storage tanks on city property on East 9th Street, the water tower, which holds 60,000 gallons and the Bryant tower, with a 30,000 gallon capacity, were full on Tuesday morning. "We must have a minimum of a quarter million gallons on hand at all times for

fire protection," the mayor stated.

People are still being urged to repair leaky faucets and overflowing commodes to help in preserving water.

It was pointed out that the people played the major role in recovery of water storage here, but it was also explained that the showers Friday, Monday and Tuesday and the cloudy and somewhat cooler temperatures also greatly aided in alleviating the immediate shortage.

Pumpings, as reported by Dillard for the past week, totaled 1,840,000 gallons from Tuesday of last week through Monday. Days on which irrigation was allowed are evident in the following record released by Dillard on pumpings in gallons by the city: Tuesday 325,000 (used before the curtailment was widely known) Wednesday 240,000, Thursday 320,000, Friday 255,000, Saturday 300,000, Sunday 200,000 and Monday 200,000 gallons, and that was a major factor which prompted the limitation.

City officials again expressed the hope that additional limitations could be avoided, and requested continued cooperation, as shown last week, by city water consumers.

She cited the Equal Rights Amendment as a cancerous evil gnawing at the very core of our nation. It is against every principle of God and the home which has been the mainstay of our great country.

Mrs. Tilotta assured the audience that Rep. Larry Vick, 2101 Suffolk, Houston, Texas 77027 has devoted himself to rescinding the ERA. He has every thing ready from lawyers, date for action and data, except many full mail bags of individual letters demanding this action. She urged everyone to write often to him as well as to local legislators.

The Concerned Citizens of Texas has joined hands with all groups across Texas who have taken on the responsibility of reversing the ERA in order to pass on to our children the best America that we can.

The announcement of Pope's appointment was recently made by Somervell County Judge Summers of Glen Rose and John Burleson, District Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Summers said that the Commissioners' Court is pleased to have a person of Pope's caliber for the position.

Pope, a 1967 graduate of Cross Plains High School, has for the past three years served on the Agricultural Extension Staff at Waco with responsibility for 4-H and youth programs.

The new Somervell Agent earned a bachelor of science degree in agriculture education at Tarleton State University at Stephenville. As a youth he was active in Future Farmers of America chapter activities at Cross Plains High School, and exhibited sheep and goats in local and state livestock shows. He developed a sheep flock and cow herd of his own during high school days.

Pope, who is married to the former Joan Burks of Cross Plains, has completed several hours of graduate work at Tarleton. His wife, the daughter of Mrs. Joe Burks of this city, is completing work toward becoming a registered nurse. The couple plan to move to Glen Rose about September 1.

## Rural Mail Delivery Service Extended

A liberalization of rules that will bring mail delivery service for the first time to more than 100,000 rural families has been approved by Postmaster General E. T. Klassen, Cross Plains Postmaster Joe Hanke, Jr., said today.

The new rules will benefit some families served by rural routes out of the Cross Plains Post Office, Postmaster Hanke said.

"Under previous criteria," Postmaster Hanke said, "rural delivery extensions could be made only if at least one family was benefitted for every seven-tenths of a mile a rural carrier had to go to serve the box and return to his normal line of travel."

"But the Postmaster General has increased the acceptable route variance to a mile, thereby enabling us to provide home delivery service to many additional families," Hanke noted.

Postmaster Hanke said the new rule change was a further indication of the Postmaster General's "deep concern that we provide good mail service to all our customers".

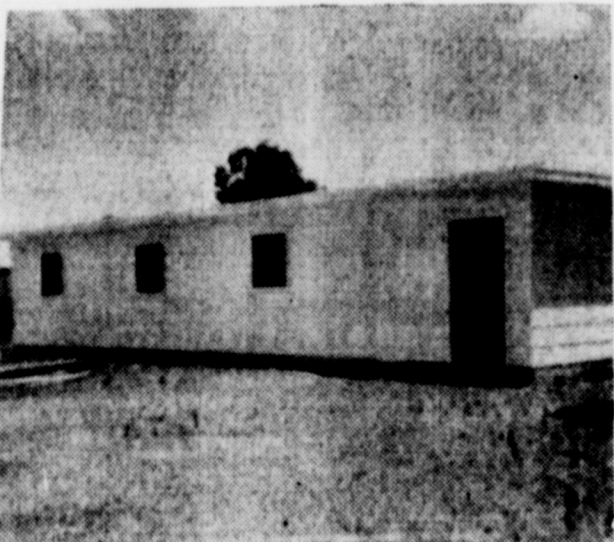

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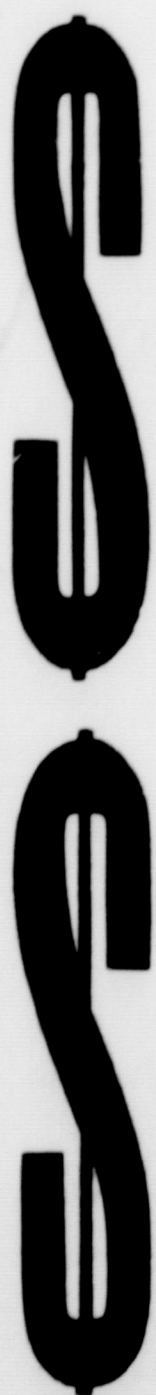

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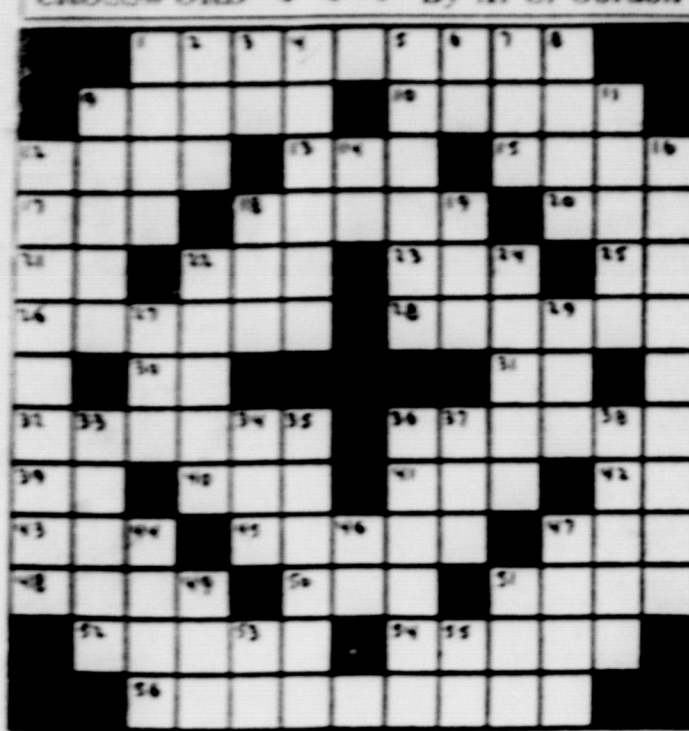

Texas cattlemen will now be able to receive federal indemnity payments from the U. S. Department of Agriculture for brucellosis reactors in their breeding herds when the infected animals are marketed for slaughter.

According to Grey Gerngross, Callahan County Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the indemnity will be paid only on reactors found in official herd tests—not in tests at sales yards.

The decision to make the pay-ments was made at the request of the Texas Animal Health Commission to strengthen ef-

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orts to eradicate brucellosis in the state.

All states are now partici-pating in the brucellosis indemnity program. At present about 99 per cent of the nation's cat-tle are free of the disease, but the remaining one per cent con-tinue to threaten the livestock industry. A large percentage of the infected herds are in south-ern and southwestern states.

The indemnity—\$40 on grade cows and \$80 on registered cows and bulls—will be paid on reactors bled on or after July 1. No indemnity is allowed for grade bulls, steers or spayed heifers.

Reactors will be branded with the letter "B" on the left jaw and will be tagged in the left ear. They must go to slaughter directly after the test.

Indemnity claims will be ini-tiated by state and federal regu-latory officials or accredited veterinarians. First indemnity payments may be delayed sev-eral months after claims are received, but such delays should be eliminated once the program becomes established.

### Cornstalk Borer Infestation Of Peanuts Reported High

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported that hot, dry weather seems to have triggered one of the worst outbreaks of lesser cornstalk borers in recent years in Central Texas peanut fields. According to progress report issued by the Texas Department of Agriculture on the status of the corn borer, practically all fields have damaging infestations, with a few fields running as high as 65 per cent infestation. Dryland peanuts where the lesser cornstalk borer is harder to control, have higher infestations than irrigated fields. The corn borer is a subtropical insect which is capable of reducing peanut yields as much as 70 per cent. The insect

is widespread, hard to detect and feeds by drilling hole into the plant. Plants then become weakened and can be destroyed by diseases and other insects. White said that a majority of the irrigated acreage has been treated for the corn borer, but lack of available moisture makes dryland treatment very difficult. The De Leon Research Lab reported that treated fields should be checked again within 15 days to see if reinfestation has occurred. Commissioner White urged all farmers to carefully check their fields before applying an insecticide and treat only if needed. He added that insecticides should be used according to directions and within the amounts specified.

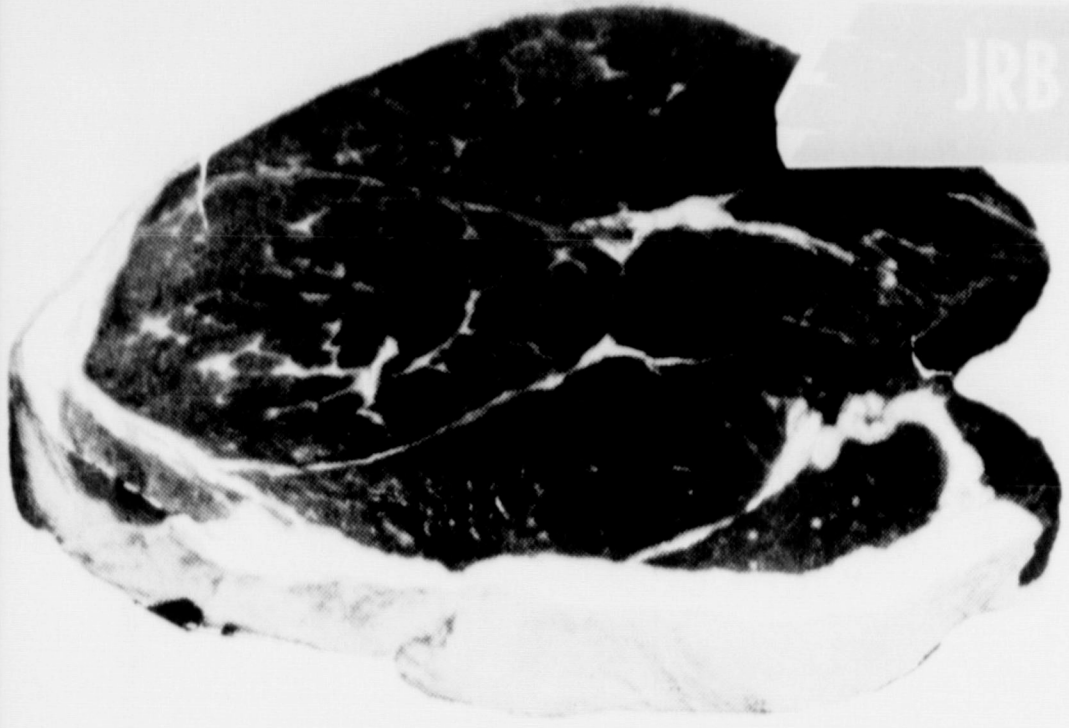

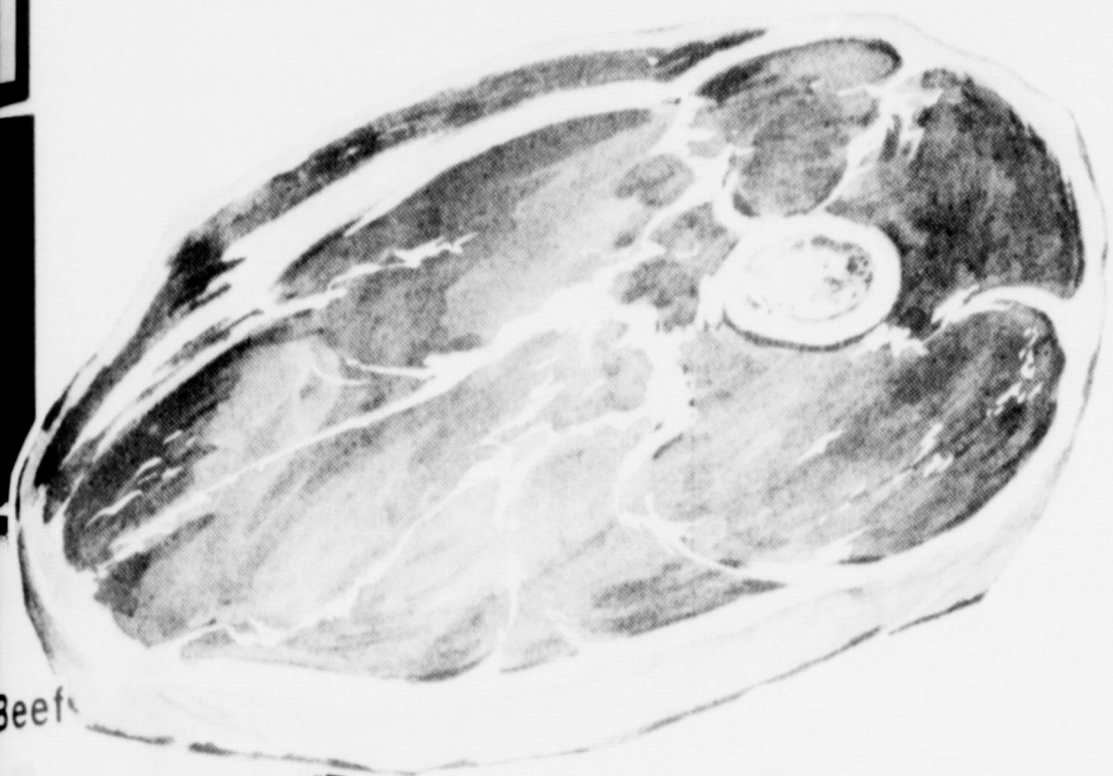

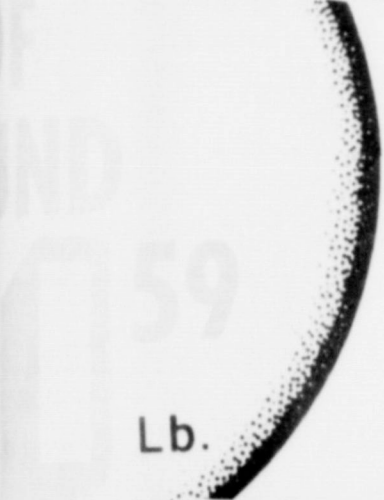
