The Curry Sisters will sing a song prior to the memorial service which will honor those who have passed on since the last meeting of the group. A dismissal prayer and grace will be offered just prior to serving of the catered meal at noon. Shortly after re-assembly in the afternoon, Mrs. Pete (Jean) Fore of Pioneer will have charge of selling handcraft items to benefit cemeteries in all three communities. The day's activities will end with a dismissal song.

County Old Settlers To Reune Saturday

Several hundred "Old Timers" are expected to converge on Cross Plains Saturday for the Callahan County Pioneer Reunion. The gathering was an annual affair until last year, when inadequate interest was shown in preliminary meetings to merit holding the reunion. It has been reinstated this year, and an expected larger than usual crowd is expected to gather under the huge live-oak trees in Treadaway Park (Cross Plains City Park) Saturday for renewing friendships and acquaintances by Callahan County pioneers.

A meeting of workers and committees was held at the courthouse in Baird last Friday, and all reports were that the various aspects of planning the gathering were going nicely, according to Mrs. Mike (Maggie) Cook of Baird, secretary of the Callahan County Pioneer Association. President of the organization this year is James Paul Shanks of Baird.

Saturday's festivities will begin at 9:30 a.m. with registration.

Starting at 10 a.m. the formal program will begin with group singing led by Mrs. V. E. Hill of Baird and LeRoy Butler of Abilene. Special music is also being lined up by Mrs. Hill and Butler, it has been reported.

Following the invocation by G. W. Weeks of Baird, Jack Scott, mayor of Cross Plains, will welcome the old settlers. I. G. Mobley of Putnam will make the response.

Mrs. John Berry of Clyde will lead a silent tribute to deceased pioneers. There will be no formal speaker this year, but it is thought that several persons may give reflections of by-gone days.

Rounding out the mornings activity will be introduction of special guests and announcements by Randall C. Jackson of Abilene, M. M. (Tut) Tabor of Clyde and Shanks, who will serve as masters of ceremonies during the day.

At noon basket lunches will be spread under the giant trees. Programmed activities will resume at 2 p.m. with the group singing and introduction of other guests.

Shortly after resumption of the program the masters of ceremonies will announce winners of special awards to be presented in the categories as follow: Earliest cowboy in county. Earliest pioneer man and earliest pioneer woman. Earliest pioneer man and earliest pioneer woman with continuous residence in Callahan County.

Oldest native born man and oldest native born woman. Oldest native born man and woman with continuous residence in the county.

Man coming greatest distance to attend reunion, and woman coming greatest distance.

Couple married longest and couple married longest with continuous residence in the county.

The nominating committee will report in the afternoon session, and officers for the next year will be elected.

Otte Knight of Cross Plains and Jewell Shirley of Putnam will supervise a period of old time dancing for the pioneers. It was explained by a spokesman for the old settlers that

special attractions are being planned for this time also.

Blondy McIntosh of Baird and Mr. Mobley are in charge of the free watermelon feed for pioneers after the dancing.

The gathering will officially end in later afternoon with the group singing of "God Be With You 'Til We Meet Again".

Mrs. Cook pointed out that

the public address system will be obtained by E. P. (Pop) Whitaker of Baird.

Sheriff Grayson Miller of Baird and his deputies will be in charge of parking automobiles at the reunion.

Charged with getting the grounds ready for the gathering is the Callahan County Commissioners Court.

Dr. Weldon Newton New T.S.U. Agriculture Head

Dr. Weldon Newton of Bryan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis E. Newton of Cross Cut, has been named Chairman of the Agriculture Department at Tarleton State University at Stephenville.

The announcement of Dr. Newton's appointment was made by Dr. W. O. Trogdon, president of Tarleton. Dr. Jessie L. Tackett, Dean of the School of Agriculture and Business at T.S.U., said, "We feel fortunate in having Dr. Newton on our faculty."

He noted that Dr. Newton brings a wealth of experience to the position. He succeeds J. V. Laird who retires at the end of this summer.

A native of Brown County and reared in Cross Cut, Dr. Newton attended Cross Cut schools and Cross Plains schools. He was graduated from Cross Plains High School with the class of 1954 of which he was salutatorian. He earned a bachelor, masters and doctorate degree from Texas A&M

University in entomology.

For the past five years Dr. Newton has been an entomologist. He joined the Extension Service in 1964 after military service.

He is a member of the Phi Kappa Phi society, served as secretary-treasurer of the Southwestern Branch of Entomological Society of America from 1972-74 and is a member of American Registry of Professional Entomologists and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

As a graduate student at Texas A&M, he was recipient of the National Cotton Council Fellowship for Education and Research. Dr. Newton has been a frequent contributor to scholarly journals, newspapers and magazines.

Dr. Newton and his family recently moved to Stephenville. His wife is the former Miss Cynthia McQuin of Cross Plains. They have two children, Angela, 11, and Jon, 7.

Drought Dented As Rains Cover Area

The drought which has plagued this area for the past several weeks, actually below normal rainfall for all this year, has been dented by showers and general rains which began last Thursday.

Top amount reported in this area was in the Pioneer locality where up to 4.30 inches have fallen through about noon Tuesday. Area reports ranged between that figure and the 1.75 inches recorded in Cross Plains to mid-morning Tuesday.

Most of the showers and rainfall have been the slow, soaking type with little run-off. The parched pastures and all crops have benefited tremendously. Stock water is still sorely needed by many ranchers and stockmen in this area.

In the Cross Cut community an average of about 3.50 inches has been recorded since the showers began on Thursday of last week.

The Sabanno sector had re-

ceived an even two inches to about noon Tuesday, and measurements in the Rowden area ranged from about that amount to an inch or more higher in the north part of the locale.

Early Tuesday morning the Burkett community had gauged 2.40 inches. A general average in the Cottonwood area seemed to be about three inches.

According to the official weather gauge in Cross Plains 1.75 inches had fallen here to mid-morning Tuesday. That came in showers of .17 of an inch on Thursday and Saturday. 1.15 inches were recorded in the almost day-long rain here Monday, and showers early Tuesday morning netted another .26 of an inch. Brief shower fell about 2 p.m., but no figure was immediately available.

Tuesday of last week .27 of an inch of rain was measured here which brought the July moisture total to .61 of an inch. The August aggregate 1.75 inches brings to 10.90 inches. Breakdown by months follows: January .11, February 1.05, March 1.67, April 2.09, May .93, June 2.69, July .61 and August 1.75.

Water Use Restrictions Lifted By City Dads

Restrictions on use of water in Cross Plains have been lifted. Mayor Jack Scott and Water Commissioner Alvin Hutchins announced Tuesday morning that restrictions on use of water within the City of Cross

Plains have been lifted. Mayor Scott said, "Billy Dillard (city employee superintendent) tells us we are in good shape on storage and only a portion of the wells are now being pumped."

Scott and Hutchins both praised the public for the extraordinarily fine cooperation the city received during the limitation period which began two weeks ago. That was banning outside irrigation four days weekly, Wednesday, Friday, Sunday and Monday, and requesting water being used on outside vegetation only where absolutely required. That was allowed on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

Primary purpose for imposing the restrictions was to insure adequate water reserves in the event of a major fire. That requires a quarter million gallons.

Showers last week and rain Monday and Tuesday, along with cooler temperatures eased the strain on city wells, and contributed to the lifting of the part-time watering ban.

The mayor and the water commissioner both commended city employees for their diligent and long vigil at wells and the water system during the crisis. "Without their devotion to maintaining production and distribution," Scott said, "Cross Plains could easily have faced a more serious water shortage."

He and Hutchins added that it is the city's hope that another shortage or limiting water use in Cross Plains can be avoided this year, but both emphasized that they believed that judging from the splendid cooperation received this time if another shortage should arise, it can be again dealt with by the citizens of Cross Plains as was the past crisis.

Pointing out the fact that water use had dropped drastically, Dillard said that during the past week pumpings averaged about 140,000 gallons a day, about half of consumption rate even with restrictions in force.

Teresa Ann Balkum of Cross Plains was among 476 students who recently took part in Preview ASU 1974 at Angelo State University in San Angelo.

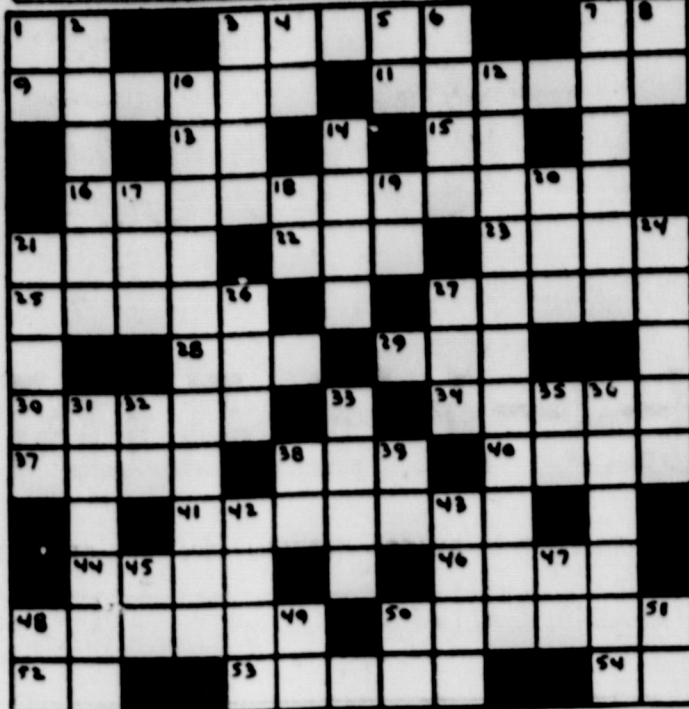
The annual summer orientation program for new students entering Angelo State in the fall attracted new students from throughout the state.

A project has been plugged back re-completed in the Moran Sand in the Red Horse Field five miles north of Baird. A former Bend Conglomerate well, it is Lewis Production Co. Inc. of Abilene No. 1 Elma Jackson. Location is 959 feet from the north and 1,052 feet from the west lines of Section 115, BBB-C Survey. Daily potential was barrels of 41 gravity oil, from perforations at feet with the 5 1/2-inch set at 4,476 feet. Total depth was 4,440 and plugged back to 2,350. Clasp envelopes at Baird.
