This is a homely truism that the Washington bureaucrats never seem to learn.

The Environmental Protection Agency, one of those strange agencies that have been spawning rapidly has now decided railroad diesel locomotives make too much noise.

Obviously, there is need to protect the purity of air and water, and a great deal can be said about high noise levels in the metropolitan areas. But a locomotive puffing up a grade in the Rockies or streaking across the wheat fields of the Midwest contributes little to human discomfort.

However, the EPA, regardless of all the facts in the matter, has decreed that diesel locomotives must be fitted with noise suppressors costing railroads as much as \$103 million

But that its not the full story, for the bankrupt Penn Central. the bankrupt Boston & Maine, and the bankrupt Central of New Jersey will have to comply at a cost of \$20 million for these roads which do not have

The EPA acknowledges this would increase the operating expenses of the bankrupt rail roads, but says the increase should not cause problems.
