Rain Soaks Area

Rain ranging from fine to heavy downpours soaked the Cross Plains area almost a week. It was raining lightly at midday Tuesday as the Herald carried to press.

Rainfall which began Wednesday has totaled 3.14 inches in Cross Plains. Rains continued to mid-afternoon and accounted for 2.85 inches of that amount.

Moisture was welcomed by farmers and alike. Some local peanut growers had begun digging peanuts. That was due to the moisture. Later crops will benefit from rain as will pastures and grain which has already started.

Stock tanks in this area had not previously caught water being filled by running the occasional heavy rain. Pecan Bayou was run Tuesday morning at the footbridge over the footbridge in City Park here.

Cut received four inches Monday and Tuesday, according to a report shortly after Tuesday. Week end rainfall was 3.90 inches. Area two-day totals in Atwell 2.80, Pioneer Cottonwood 3.10, Saban

no 3.00. Showers were much heavier in some localities than in others.

Rainfall in Cross Plains during September has been recorded as follows: Thursday .10, Saturday .17, Sunday .02, Monday 1.73 and Tuesday, to 2:30

p.m. 1.12. This month now rates second wettest month in 1974 with the 3.14 inches. In August 5.32 inches fell here. Aggregate for the year now stands at 17.61 inches, still a bit below normal for this time of year.

Local F.F.A. Chapter Big WT Fair Winner

Future Farmers of America chapter at Cross Plains High School again won a lion's share of awards and prize money in agricultural related exhibits at the recent West Texas Fair in Abilene.

The local chapter, under the supervision of O. B. Edmondson, advisor, pocketed \$143 in prize money and took 28 first places, 20 seconds and 15 thirds in competition with other area FFA chapters.

The chapter's educational exhibit was not allowed, due to a change in rules from prior shows. Cross Plains has won that coveted award several times in past years.

First, second and third places were taken by Cross Plains in cow pea vine; peanut vine; Irish potatoes; red or yellow grain sorghum; one gallon; vetch; one gallon; Spanish peanuts; and yellow corn, one gallon.

Buff-Baird Gridiron Feud Renews Saturday Night

The Cross Plains Buffalo-Baird Bear gridiron rivalry will flare anew Saturday night in the Bears' Den at Baird.

It has been two years since the two Callahan County Class A schools have met on the foot-

ball field. The 41st renewal of the competition will begin at 8 p.m. as a highlight of homecoming festivities at Baird.

Both the Callahan schools are undefeated in two outings thus far in the young season.

Baird has beaten Throckmorton, and last week the Bears blanketed Santa Anna 24-0. Cross Plains beat Wylie 19-0 in the opener, and last Friday thumped Richland Springs 44-0.

Bears and Buffaloes have collided 40 times since 1924 with Cross Plains winning 19 times and Baird taking 18 triumphs. There have been three ties. Baird romped past Cross Plains the last two times the schools met. In 1970 the Bears won 55-16, and in 1971 it was Baird with a 61-6 tally. Both were records for most points scored by either team at that time. Cross Plains last emerged victorious in 1963 when the Herd won 43-6 which was the fourth consecutive victory over Baird.

Baird, a member of District 8-A, was rated fourth in the league in pre-season polls, immediately behind Merkel which thumped the Herd in a scrimmage session. The Bears have a good nucleus back from their 6-4 team last year with about nine season veterans returning.

A veteran backfield is both powerful and explosive. New comer Mike Doty, is a hard-running halfback, and Jay Ringhoffer, 170-pound senior, is a seasoned and talented signal caller. Other ball carrying chores can be ably handled by such returnees as Paul Strickland, 150 junior and Rudy Rodriguez, 175 senior. Up front help can be expected from James King, 200, Joe McNeil, 170, Joey Henley, 175, Kevin Waldrop, 180, Randy Fleming, 200, and Terry Lee, 180.

Cross Plains Head Coach Sam McBrierty said that Baird is regarded as a "real tough team." He also pointed out that the Buffs should be physically ready for the contest.

Buff Thump Coyotes 44-0

Cross Plains Buffaloes starting strong, relaxed and then reaped forces to thunder past Richland Springs Coyotes in a non-conference football game here last Friday night.

The game was loosely played with eleven with numerous errors and penalties on both sides. Buffs were flagged down times for 70 yards, and Coyotes assessed 115 yards in infractions. Herdsmen kept six Coyote passes picked up four fumbles. Cross Plains gave up the ball times on bobbles and had pass swiped.

Richland Springs depended mainly on the airways to the ball, gaining nine first downs, with less than 50 yards accumulated on the ground. Cross Plains rolled to 19 first downs and almost 300 yards on ground.

Buffs built a 16-0 lead in the quarter, but it took a while for the Herd to get going. Midway of the initial canto Buffs possession on their own.

Seven plays later End Koenig took a pass behind the defenders from Quarterback Greg Turner and rambled 50 of the 70-yard play into a 4-09 left. Tim Bishop's kick was good for a 7-0

Buff defender Jimmy Bates returned intercepted pass about 30 yards for a touchdown with 11 seconds left in the first period. Bishop again kicked the point for a 16-0 advantage.

Midway of the second quarter a short punt, into a north wind, put the Herd in operation on the Coyote 38. Seven plays later Halfback Randy Hunter cashed in from five yards out. Point after kick was low.

Buffalo Bates put the next Cross Plains scoring drive into motion when he returned an intercepted pass about 20 yards to the Coyote 25. Three plays later, 3:3, showing on the clock in the first half, Bates scampered over his left side for 18 and six more points. Bishop added the point after for a 29-0 halftime score.

Turnovers by a disorganized Herd in the third quarter allowed the Coyotes to penetrate deep into Buff territory, but twice Bisons stopped the visitors inside the 20.

Again it was Bates who put the Herd on the next scoring drive. He intercepted another pass at the Richland Springs 43. Halfback Hunter circled right on the second play for 43 yards with just under a minute gone in the last stanza. Bishop's kick was wide, but Buffs led 35-0.

Coyotes then began a drive which carried through the air lanes 74 yards on four comple-

tions to the Herd's three. On first down Buff Randall Franke stole a pass in the end zone. He crossed the goal line then fumbled upon being tackled, but the ball was recovered by an unidentified Bison.

Starting from the one-foot line Buffaloes drove the almost 100 yards in 10 plays with Halfback Randy Pancake blasting his way the final 10 yards up the middle. Bishop added the bonus point for a 42-0 lead with 4:55 left in the game. During the drive Halfback Beggs rambled 88 yards for an apparent tally which was nullified by an infraction at the Herd's 45. The drive was also aided by a 15-yard roughing by the kicker penalty against the Coyotes.

Bisons began another drive after the free kick, but a lost fumble halted the march on the Coyote 10. On first play Buff's Nickerson, Franke and Joe Simpson combined to down Quarterback Robert Burleson in the end zone attempting to pass for another two-point safety. With 40 seconds on the clock final score stood 44-0.

Leading Buffalo rusher was Pancake with 121 yards. Hunter added 70 and others were Bates 58, Beggs 53, Turner 13, Bubba McConal 8 and Bishop and Rusty Dimitri 2 each.

Nickerson was the Herd's leading tackler with 10. Lynn Tatam had 9 and Bishop got 8

about 90 seconds later Buffs Nickerson, Steve Petty and others scored a safety on an attempted punt for a 9-0 edge.



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

Concerned Citizens Group Fighting ERA Amendment

Editor's Note: Following is an item written by Mrs. Homer Don Parson of Pioneer, a prominent member of the Concerned Citizens of Texas of Cross Plains. That group is fighting the Equal Rights Amendment. She writes of past and upcoming efforts of the local and other groups in the following article.

"The Concerned Citizens of Texas booth at the West Texas Fair was a much earned success. The officers wish to express their deepest appreciation to each contributor and worker who participated in this uphill endeavor. Over 1,200 names were added to the "pink" petition during the fair week even though no petition was available one day. Several thousand information sheets were given the public along with addresses of

area legislators. One sheet which made its way to Coleman prompted residents there to supply a booth at the Coleman County Fair the 28th of this month for the distribution of the "pink sheet" of ERA facts.

"The reason for all the "pink" is a special day planned for Austin in 1975 when several organizations will combine efforts to educate state legislators on the public view of the amendment. The petition sheets are being filled all over the state by individuals as well as groups and these will be presented to the Texas Legislature by a delegation of ladies all in pink maxi or midi dresses. More details will be released at a later date.

Other information given to the area citizens during the West Texas Fair was in regard to the controversial land control policies that some congressmen would like to bind our nation. FFA boys were most eager to read and hear the details. It was suggested that they return to their schools and make class reports on the Udall Land Use Bill and those that already exist in some states. See page 20 of the August 1974 Progressive Farmer or contact your local Farm Bureau office for your own study. Your Congressman, Omar Burleson, could provide you with a copy of the bill and others. You should not fail to let him know how you feel about such land control.

"Those who have not kept track of the Equal Rights Amendment facts should understand that it is not needed in order to provide women with the equal pay that has been listed as the number one reason for its passage. Aside from that it is extremely costly to the taxpayer on both the federal and state level when you consider all the laws that must be re-written to fit the ERA and we don't have enough tax money to pay our way now! As if that were not enough reason to do away with ERA, it takes away our freedom of living as this sex or that. Not only will we lose our separate restrooms among other things, but perhaps worst of all, we cannot legally belong to a single sex club or organization! This will be the death of many American social trademarks. As one Abilene Jaycee put it, "It will be the end of us!" In light of these things, why are you just sitting there?

"All citizens should be aware of the plans that the Health, Education, and Welfare Department has for our school and all schools that receive federal aid, except for a few church schools and military academies. The H.E.W. is accepting public comment on their new recommendations until October 15 at which time the plan will be written in its final form and presented to the President for his approval. Thirty days after his approval it will be the law governing our schools. If the ERA passes it will be mandatory for schools without exception! In a nut-shell, it deals with forced equality of the sexes in federally aided schools. I have a copy which I obtained from the H.E.W. and I welcome anyone to read it. Better yet, write for your own. The H.E.W. will get your letter with only Washington, D. C., for an address.

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
