Questionnaires Due Agribusinessmen

During the last half of November and in December, some 75,000 farmers and ranchers will receive either a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Accurate estimates have always been of great importance to producers and are even more important in light of supply-demand situation facing agriculture today, says Greg Gergross, Callahan County Agent.

Data collected in this survey will provide an accurate picture of agriculture for each county and for the State of Texas. Each farmer receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin, the agent said. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.



SSI Aid Replaces State Public Welfare

The United States Government can sometimes pay monthly checks to people who are 65 or older who are disabled and under age 65, if they meet a financial need requirement. "There is no minimum age limit for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) for the disabled, so that even young children might qualify," said Glyn Hammons, manager of the Abilene Area Security Office. SSI is a new program which began January 1974, to take the place of payments formerly made by the State Department of Public Welfare to the aged and disabled.

Hammons said that a child might qualify even though the parents do not. If the nature of the child's disability can be determined medically to be so severe that it would keep him from doing any substantial gainful work even if he were an adult, he is considered disabled for SSI purposes. However, if the child lives with his parents, the parents' income and resources must be considered along with the child's own income and resources in deciding whether the child meets the SSI law's requirement as to financial need. If the family consists also of one or more non-disabled children the parents can have higher income without affecting the disabled child's eligibility.

To get more information about the possibility that a disabled child is eligible for SSI payments, contact the Abilene social security office at 142 South Pioneer or telephone 608-1360. Or check a visit schedule of representatives of that office in a town near you. These schedules are posted at all post offices.

Bugs, Worms Threat To Small Grains

Small grain producers in the area should check their fields for the presence of greenbugs and army worms in the next few weeks. Cool moist weather may increase these insect population, says Greg Geringross of Baird, county extension agent.

Greenbugs are aphids 1-16 inch long and light green in color. Greenbugs with their piercing mouth parts suck plant juices. Toxins are injected into the plant during the feeding process. Small grain infested with greenbugs first turn yellow to orange. As infestation increases, plants die and greenbugs move to uninfested plants enlarging the affected area.

Insecticide need depends on the number of greenbugs present, size and vigor of plants, time of year, moisture conditions and stage of growth. Wheat is usually less susceptible to greenbug damage than oats or barley.

Armyworms are foliage feeders and can destroy an entire field in a matter of days if infestation is heavy. Color of armyworms may vary from a light green to black with dorsal stripes. Older plants can withstand higher infestations than seeding plants.

Control recommendations on these and other insects are available from the County Extension office in Baird.

Prussic Acid Poisoning Season Near Says Agent

"Animals that graze on pasture or forage that has recently been hit by a frost are subject to prussic poisoning," says Greg Gerngross, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, of Baird.

Among grasses that are especially toxic to animals after a frost are Johnsongrass, Sudan and other sorghum hybrids.

Prussic acid poisoning is a disease which prevents oxygen in the blood from reaching the tissues and thus causes death due to suffocation.

Symptoms of the disease are suffocation and muscular twitching, and the animal may have his head turned toward his flank. The blood of the ani-

mal has a bright red color. Animals become affected within 10 to 15 minutes after eating toxic material and rarely survive more than one or two hours.

"Livestock should not be allowed access to wilted material after a frost until it has dried completely," says the county agent. "Grazing should also be prevented after a rain when new sprouts begin to form on plants."

Wilted material will usually dry out in a day or two of strong sunlight. New growth usually become non-toxic within a week to 10 days after a rain can then be grazed safely by livestock.

"If you're not sure about your pasture, have a veterinarian check it with a picrate test or have a sample checked in a lab, adds Gerngross.

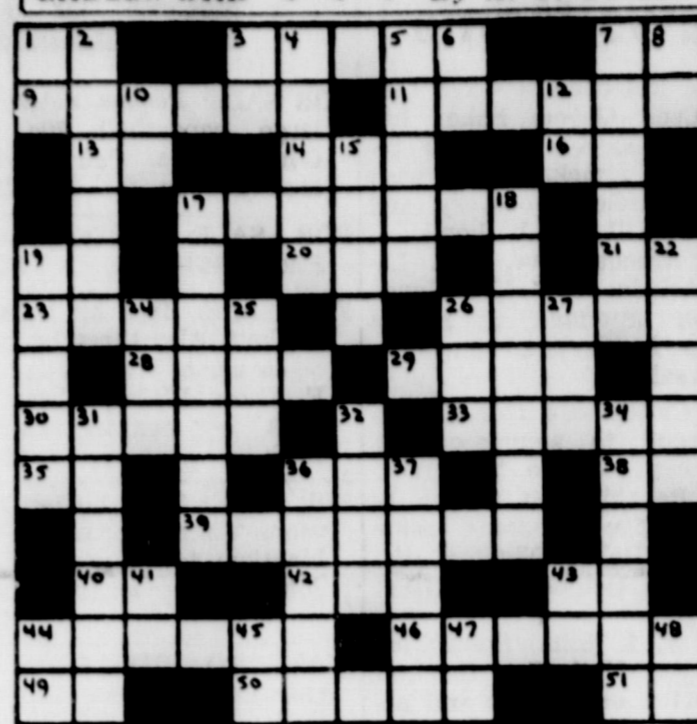
One way to check a pasture is to turn out a less valuable animal that has been without hay or grass for 24 hours. A hungry animal will fill up faster and show toxic symptoms if the plant material is dangerous.

"If you think your animal shows signs of prussic acid poisoning, don't hesitate to call a vet immediately," warns Gerngross.
