Week End Blazes Firemen Busy

Cross Plains Volunteer firemen kept busy last week fighting three blazes.

Rural firemen answered at 8:20 p.m. Saturday at a house where a late Oldsmobile was afire, which was destroyed, and by Benton Coker who was with the U.S. Marine Corps.

At 4:45 p.m. four rural crews fought a grass fire for an hour at the Steve For-ple six miles west of Plains.

Three-fourths of an acre five rural firemen fought a blaze in a mobile home east of the city on Nov. 36. The structure sustained heavy damage and bent G.S.&B. Oil & Gas Cross Plains. The trailer, at about \$8,000, was used as an office and quarters, but at the time of fire, believed to have been in the water heater compartment, but was not occupied at the time.

Company spokesman opined the trailer would not be used since one end was afire. Fire was coming through roof when firemen arrived, and was extinguished in about minutes.

Federal, State Checks Aid City \$7,549.36

Two checks, one from federal sources and a state note, has added \$7,549.36 to coffers of the City of Cross Plains.

The one per cent city use sales tax check last received by Cross Plains amounted to \$4,915.36. That was for the quarter ending June 30, 1974, and was received here middle of September.

On October 7 a federal revenue sharing program check arrived. It was for \$2,634 and was the first check of four expected of about the same size, for the fifth entitlement period of the program. Just over \$10,000 is due to be awarded the City of Cross Plains during that time. Payments are usually made on a quarterly basis.
