The new districting plan, represented by E. J. Cross Plains, was approved to a great extent. The boundary was extended to include all the Rowland community to U. S. Highway 80 to the west.

Approximately 15 new households were added to the precincts. The change was in the Clyde areas.

Three commissioners, represented by Putnam, were in most of Baird with the west boundary along longitude 99 and 25 minutes, to the western edge.

Two commissioners, Lowell Johnson of Denton Valley and J. McCullough of Highway 80, were in most of Precinct 1.

Sherry Koenig, Cross Plains sophomore FFA member, will compete in the largest calf scramble on January 22 evening here at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. He is son of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Koenig.

The calf scramble, a feature since 1942, was changed to allow 4-H and FFA members an opportunity to get into the beef or dairy business. Winners at each rodeo performance receive a certificate to buy registers which they bring to the next stock show.

Since inception, more than 100 calves have been paid for at the stock show to young buyers.

388 boys who compete each year, only half will win. The calf scramble is the event at every rodeo. Twenty-eight boys will compete in the beef scrambling for 14 heifers. Boys will scramble for calves. Winners will receive 225 certificates from the Houston area.

## Buffaloes Split Last 2 District Cage Contests

Cross Plains Buffaloes dropped a close tilt to Dublin then bounced back to rip Ranger in two District 10-A basketball outings last week.

Bisons opened the second half of conference action by bowing to Dublin in Buffalo Gymnasium, 45-43 Tuesday of last week, but rallied on Friday before home fans to beat Ranger 61-36. That win evened the Herd's league mark at 4-4.

Dublin gained a 15-6 advantage in the first quarter, but Buffaloes scored the nets for 21 points in the second canto to take a 27-25 lead into dressing rooms at halftime. That margin stood in the third quarter, but Dublin out-pointed the Herd by four in final stanza for the 45-43 victory.

Dublin's Duncan led all scorers with 16 on the night. Randy Hunter paced the Bison attack with 13, and Randall Franke had 10. Other Buffs tallying were Robert Allen 8, Larry Tatum and Tim Bishop 4 each, Curtis Hines and Royce Lawrence 2 each.

## \$15,000 Due 200 County World War, Korea Vets

Residents of Callahan County who are veterans of World War I, World War II or the Korean Conflict will be on the receiving end of some extra cash this year.

The money, approximately \$15,000, will go to some 200 in the local area who have maintained their GI insurance policies in force.

It represents their share of a \$335,600,000 distribution of dividends that will be made to policyholders by the Veterans Administration.

The total is \$31,800,000 more than was paid out last year. The record amount is attributed principally to the fact that the insurance trust funds have been earning more because of the higher interest rates and therefore have more money available for dividends.

In Callahan County, where the latest count shows a total of 970 World War and Korean veterans, only about 21 percent of them will be getting checks, the figures indicate. They are the ones who held onto their policies.

Vietnam vets, because of the kind of insurance they have are not eligible at this time.

The bulk of the money, over \$307 million of it, will go to the 3,120,000 World War II veterans who will be divided among 130,000 World War I veterans. The remainder will go to 566,000 who were in the Korean engagement and have Veterans Special Life Insurance.

Of the 200 in the local area who will be getting dividend checks, the amounts they receive will depend upon the type of insurance carried, the size of the policy, the time it has been in force and the age of the insured.

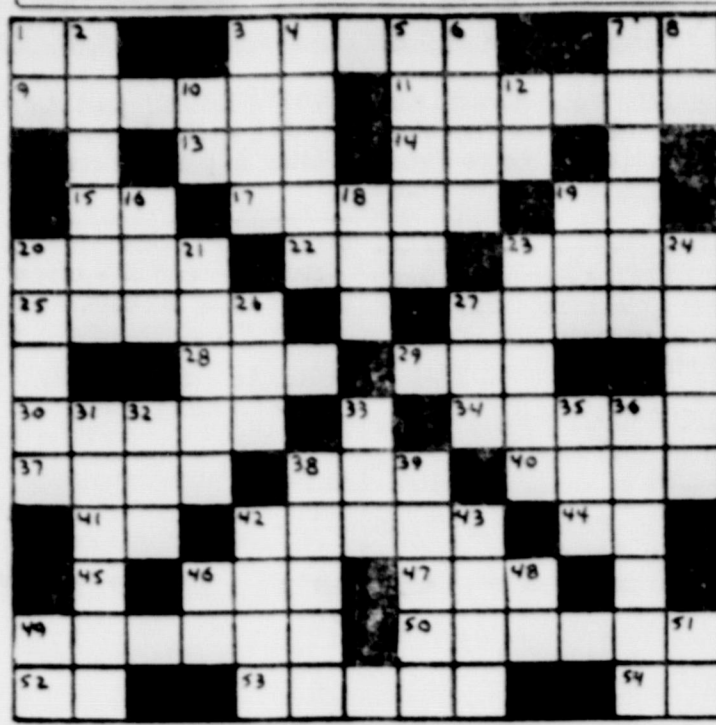

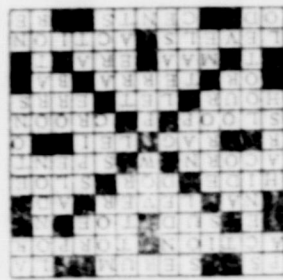
