County Schools Due \$582 In State Funds

Representative Lynn Brownwood, announcing the allocation to Callahan County schools under an agency appropriation to the school district that passed both the Texas House and the House of Representatives and awaits the Governor's signature.

He stated, "This bill relates to emergency aid to each school district from the revenue from the State School Program will entitle the Putnam School District to \$1,231,121.999.00, the Clyde School District to \$34,610.00, the Eula School District to \$12,583.00 for the 1974-75 year."

He added that the procedure for determining the amount of the emergency aid is the same for each district and is based on the average daily attendance and a factor representing the percentage of state aid for the Foundation Program in the district for the 73-74 school year.

Representative Nabers further stated, "These emergency funds may be used for any purpose which funds are allocated under the Foundation

School Program and hopefully will provide needed relief to alleviate the economic shortages our schools districts face."

Cross Plains School Superintendent Frank Rundell noted Monday that it will probably be sometime in March before the funds are actually forthcoming.

No New Filings In City, School Votes

A check Tuesday with school and city officials revealed no new filings for upcoming elections in Cross Plains Independent School District or City of Cross Plains.

Three persons have filed for three places on the Cross Plains City Council. They are Oscar Koenig, Jimmie Lee Payne and J. P. McCord. Payne and Koenig are asking re-election, and McCord is seeking the post being vacated by Gerald Bowden. McCord previously served on the council.

Terms of Lewis Fortune and R. D. (Dick) Koenig are expiring on Board of Trustees of the Cross Plains I.S.D. No candidates had filed for those places Tuesday, and the two incumbents had not made public their intentions.

Councilmen are elected for two-year terms, and school trustees are named for three-year tenures.

Filing deadline is 30 days prior to the election, both of which will be held on April 5 in the City Hall.

Aspirants for city posts may file with Mrs. Vernelle Bishop, city secretary, and candidates for the school board may file with Fortune at the office of Frank Rundell, superintendent, at the high school building.

Councilmen are elected for two-year terms, and school trustees are named for three-year tenures.

Directors Double Capital Surplus Of Local Bank

Capital and surplus of the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains has been doubled.

Bank president Jack W. Tunnell, in announcing the changes, said that the action was accomplished with a transfer of \$200,000 from undivided profits to double surplus and capital to \$200,000 each.

Detailed statement at the close of business on Friday, Feb. 14, 1975 showed \$200,000 in capital, \$200,000 in surplus and \$380,000 in reserves, making the total capital structure \$780,000.

"The enlarged capital structure raises our individual loan limit to \$100,000," said Tunnell, "enabling us to be of greater service to a growing list of customers."

Charged with aggravated robbery in the heist are Doyle

Wayne Howe, of Brownwood and Rogue River, Ore., and Danny Lee Wise, 20, of Brownwood.

A panel of 72 Callahan County residents have been summoned to report for possible petit jury duty in the case Thursday at 9 a.m. at the Dis-

trict Courtroom in the courthouse at Baird.

Howe and Wise were captured by passing Department of Public Safety Patrolmen a few minutes after the Citizens State Bank was robbed of over \$10,000 on November 19, 1974, and were soon afterward charged with the hold-up. The money was recovered.

Both men have been lodged in Callahan County Jail at Baird since that time in lieu of \$25,000 bond each.

Defense attorneys, who were court-appointed, filed a change of venue request with Judge Don Lane, but a site change for the trial was denied by the 42nd District Judge on February 6. Defense attorneys claimed that Howe and Wise could not get a fair trial in Callahan County due to great amount of publicity given the case.

\$115,784 In Bonds Sold In Callahan

According to County Bond Chairman, Howard E. Farmer of Baird, December sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Callahan County totaled \$15,651. Sales during 1974 amounted to \$115,784 for 72 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$160,000.

Texas purchased \$29,340,067 in Savings Bonds during the month. Total Bond sales during 1974 were \$242,120,223 for 102 per cent of the state's goal of \$236.8 million. One hundred thirty-nine (139) counties have achieved their 1974 sales goal.

Brown County led Callahan, Coleman and Eastland counties in percentage of goal achieved last year with 99 per cent of the quota of \$400,000 with sales of \$396,415. December sale totaled \$28,247 in that county.

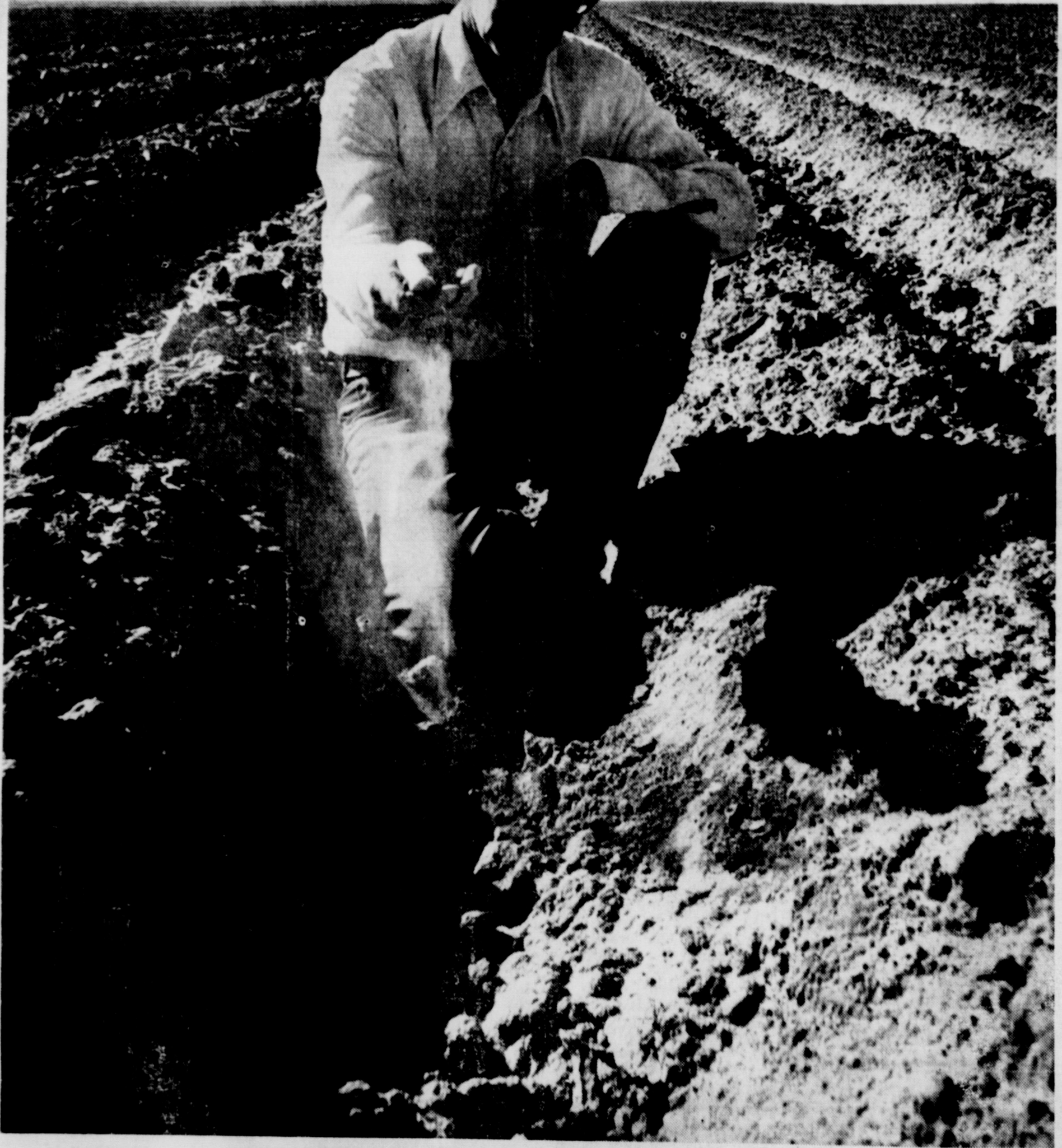

An Overlooked Factor

At the recent economic summit conference in Washington emphasis was placed on the plight of the ailing construction industry, especially in the field of home building.

It was brought out that unemployment in the housing industry is twice the national average, and is climbing daily.

The chief culprit most often named was high interest rates which makes it impossible for many potential family buyers to either qualify for a mortgage, or to meet the payments.

Largely overlooked was the remark by one expert in the field that building labor rates have gone up 20 per cent in the past year.

The nation's independent business people, and especially those in the construction field, have long voiced through the National Federation of Independent Business the view that labor organizations should be under anti-trust laws.

Probably in no area of organized labor have monopoly practices been so completely followed. Not only do unions control the number of apprentices, but they have insisted on a great feather bed regulations. Between the two practices, the building trades unions have been quite successful in maintaining a scarcity of workers.

At the present summit conference the head of the AFL-CIO scoffed at the contention of some economists that the current inflation is due to what is known as "demand-pull" but instead claimed it is a "cost-push" type. He would seem to have something in that position, but failed to enunciate who is doing the pushing.
