Rain Shower Followed By Dust Storm Monday

An old-time "West Texas dust storm" struck Cross Plains and area on the heels of an extremely light shower Monday afternoon.

The shower yielded only .01 of an inch of rain in Cross Plains. At least one city resident reported a few extremely small hailstones falling here.

At the L. A. Richardson place midway between Cross Plains and Cottonwood, pea-sized hail fell for two short periods. An estimated inch of rain was received there.

Little damage was reported from the high winds in this area. Edwin Erwin in the Sabano Community reported .50 of an inch of rain with a trace of hail Monday. All area communities reported thick dust and High winds late Monday afternoon.

Some areas, Cottonwood, Burkett and Rowden included, also reported a trace of rain before the dust storm hit.

Light showers and drizzle on Saturday netted .16 of an inch of rain. Total in March thus far is .17 of an inch. Only 2.61 inches of moisture has been measured in Cross Plains to noon Tuesday during 1975.

Spring begins Friday, March 21, and promises thus far are for a good fruit crop. Although there has been freezing weather since most fruit trees bloomed, it is thought by most that the fruit crops have not been hurt.

Area farmers and ranchers are reporting a need for rain, noting that small grain crops and pastures would be greatly benefitted.

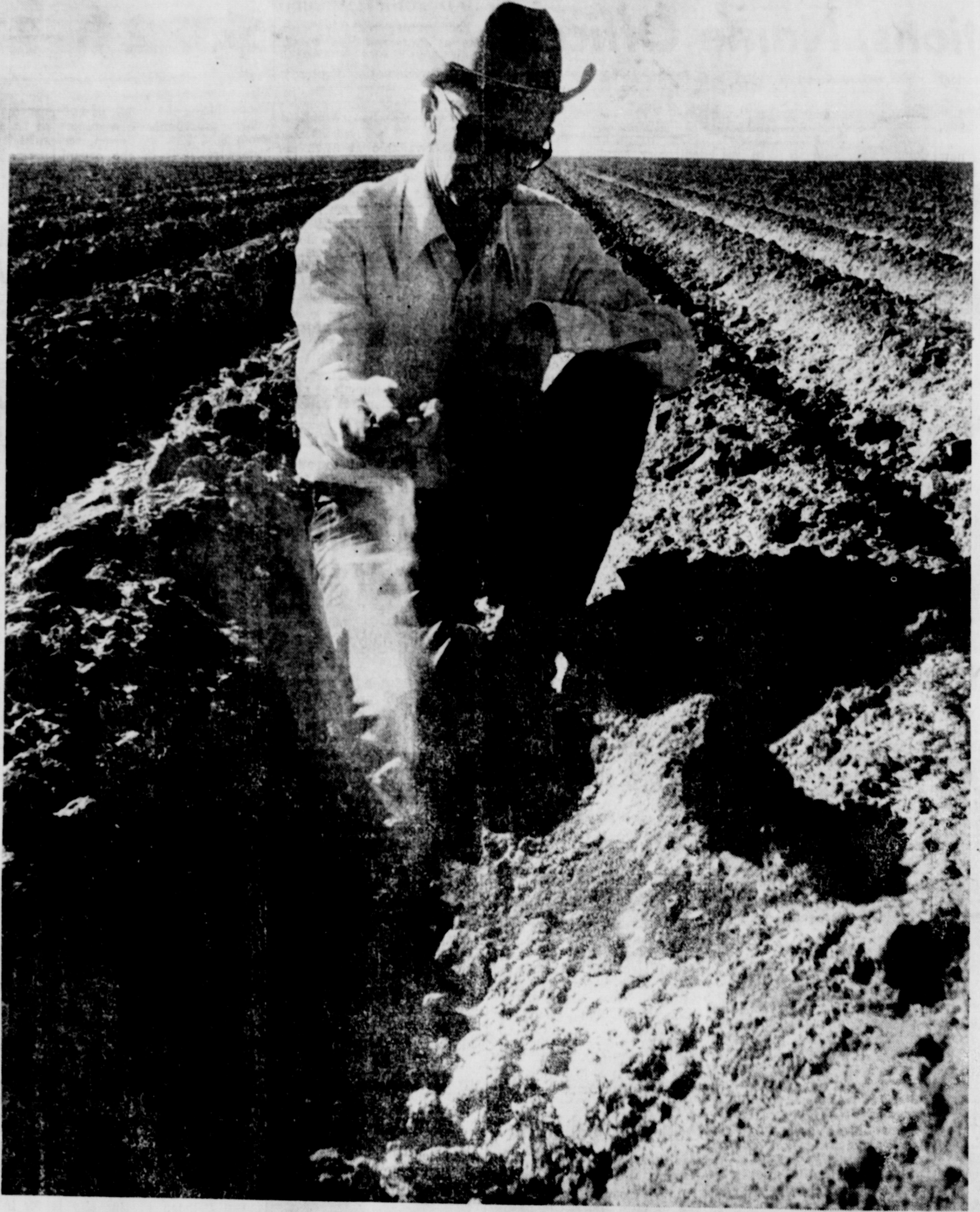
PLAYOFF DECIDES FINISH IN LAKEWOOD SCRAMBLE

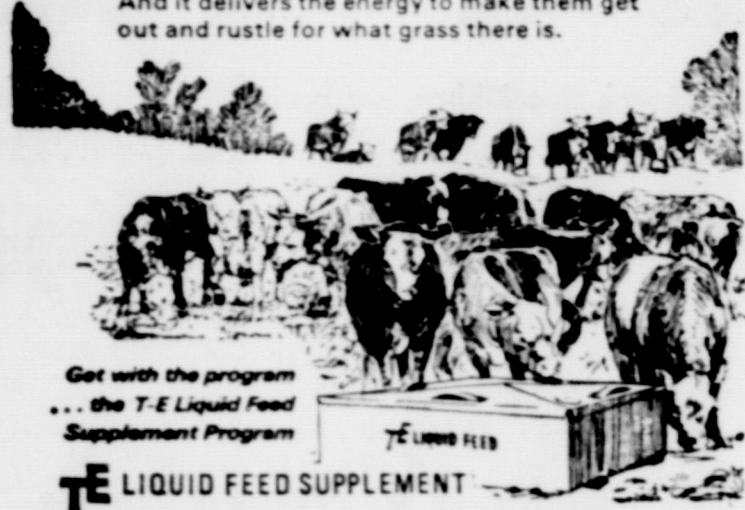

Have been told some grocery stores have their own meat grinders. Is there more than one system for grading beef?

Some meat packers utilize their own grading systems and name brand or in-house grading. However the meat you see in the supermarket is almost always that graded by the United States Department of Agriculture. Producers will generally use a label reading "USDA-Choice," "USDA-Prime" or "USDA-Select" depending on the appropriate USDA grading is done on the basis of carcass classification and is supposed to affect the eating quality of meat. A USDA grading system is seldom noticed by consumers is the Yield Grade. One of the Yield Grade determinations of the carcass is specifically, how much fat can be used in four major retail cuts of beef. Highest Yield Grade for USDA-1. Lowest is USDA-5.
