## Constitution Amendment Election Slated Tuesday

Across the state and County will go to Tuesday, April 22, to reject two proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Expected to be light turnout of the state. The election will be open at seven o'clock on Tuesday, April 22, to 7 p.m.

Voting and probable judges in Callahan follow: Community Center, Callahan; Clyde, Callahan; Allen Johnson; City Hall, Mrs. W. Putnam, Cook's Building, Mrs. John Sawyer; Eula, school; Reo Jolly; Denton Baptist Church, J. Frank and Oplin, Community Center, Albert Betcher.

It is noted that the Clyde precinct will not be divided for the election as it will be held in the old precinct set-up. A simple proposition for each amendment will be read. "The proposed amendment revising provisions re-

lating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 per cent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

The first proposed amendment has two major purposes: (1) to consolidate nearly all constitutional provisions relating to state and local retirement systems in one section of the constitution, and (2) to lift the ceiling on state contributions to state systems from the existing maximum of 6 per cent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals to a maximum of 10 per cent.

The second proposed amendment will read, "The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

The second proposed change make several changes in Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution. Major changes follow:

(1) The salary of members of the legislature, now set at \$4,800 per year is raised to \$6,000 per month, or \$7,200 per year.

(2) The mileage allowance, now limited to \$2.50 for every 25 miles in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route of travel as indicated on a table prepared by the Comptroller of Public Accounts, is changed to entitle members of each house mileage at the same rate as prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

## City Pays \$11,000 On Revenue Bonds

City of Cross Plains is \$11,000 less in debt.

Cross Plains city officers paid off \$11,000 in revenue bonds last Thursday.

It was pointed out that \$3,000 of this amount was normal retirement on the April 10 date but the added \$8,000 was paid in advance of due date.

Mayor Jack Scott noted that the City of Cross Plains now has bonded indebtedness of \$25,000, all revenue bonds. All are revenue bonds.

The bonds now being paid were voted in 1964 against the city utilities. It was also pointed out that funds are added each month to insure retirement of the bonds on or before due date.

## Superintendent Files Report

In regular school board meeting April 10th, the votes were canvassed. New board members, Leonard Mosley and Dick Koenig, were sworn in and the board was then re-organized. The officers for the school year 1975-76 are president, Tommy Harris; vice-president, Roy Neil Tatom; and secretary-treasurer, Baylis Pope.

Board action axed the General Mechanical Repair course which was being planned for next year. This course was to serve eighth and ninth grade students and prepare them for ranch and farm life as well as 60 per cent of the equipment cost, was to have been paid entirely by the federal government.

The building which also was to house a bus barn, resource room, media center and classroom in the Title I program (federal program for slow earners) was to have cost in the

neighborhood of \$50,000. We have had an increase in federal money received and students to be served under our present set-up, so we will have to return some of the money. Under the weighted pupil program this would be a loss of \$120,000 income to our school system the next 10 years. This building would have provided room for an extra special education teacher for which we now qualify.

The teacher's salary would have been paid completely by the State. This program would have helped educate early childhood (3 and 4-year-old) students as well as kindergarten, first and second graders.

Two teachers have resigned, Joe Coppinger and Donnie McMillan, and one teacher, Dora Smith has asked for and received a one-year leave of absence. Mr. Coppinger's and Mr. McMillan's letters of resignation were accepted with regret, as both men are fine teachers.

Only two of these three positions will be filled for the coming year. The school administration was told to stay within the present budget (revenues received locally and state funds) on expenditures. Therefore, due to increased costs, excess teachers will have to be released. We were to have had a teacher's aid in grades kindergarten through third grade, for students who are one to two grade levels behind their class in reading or math. Over fifty per cent of our ninth, tenth and eleventh grade students are behind one or two grade levels. To correct this and better prepare our children to compete for the good jobs in cities was the guide for the proposed curriculum.

School Board President Tommie Harris said that there will be a called meeting to see what can be done about financing the excess teachers as we surely don't want to go backwards.

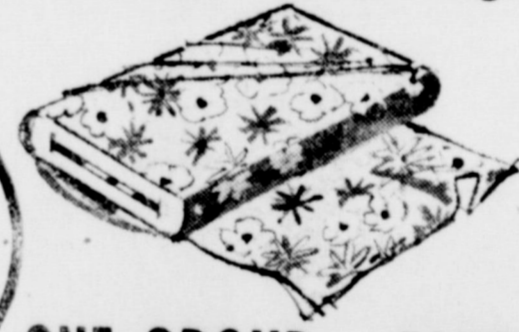

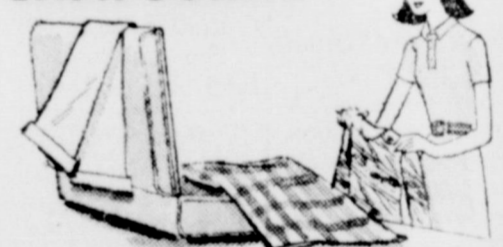

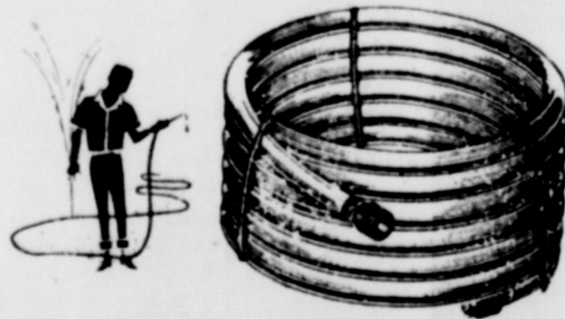

Local feminine track team was sixth in District 10-A competition last Thursday at Ranger.

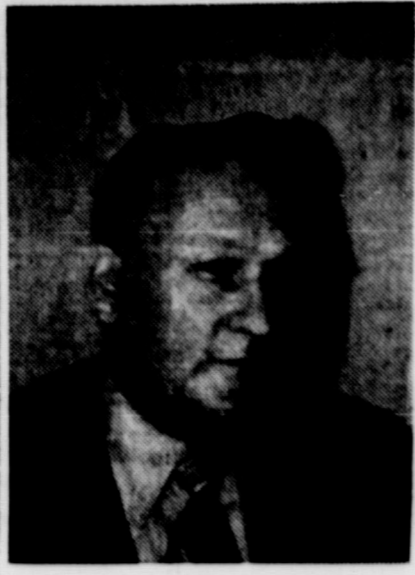

GOOBER, EARTH NUT, GROUND NUT AND PINDAR are all names for the common peanut which really should be called the nutpea since the seed, coming from a legume, is a pea and not a real nut. Nevertheless, the mis-named pea accounts for itself very well, being the third most important cash crop in the Southern United States. Peanut yields now average as much as 1400 pounds per acre and with more than a million and a half acres used for production every year that's a lot of peanut butter. It's also a lot of essential livestock feed, peanut oil and plain peanuts. Annual consumption for capita, according to government reports, is four pounds of shelled peanuts per person. About 55 percent is peanut butter, 25 percent salted nuts and the rest is some form of peanut oil.

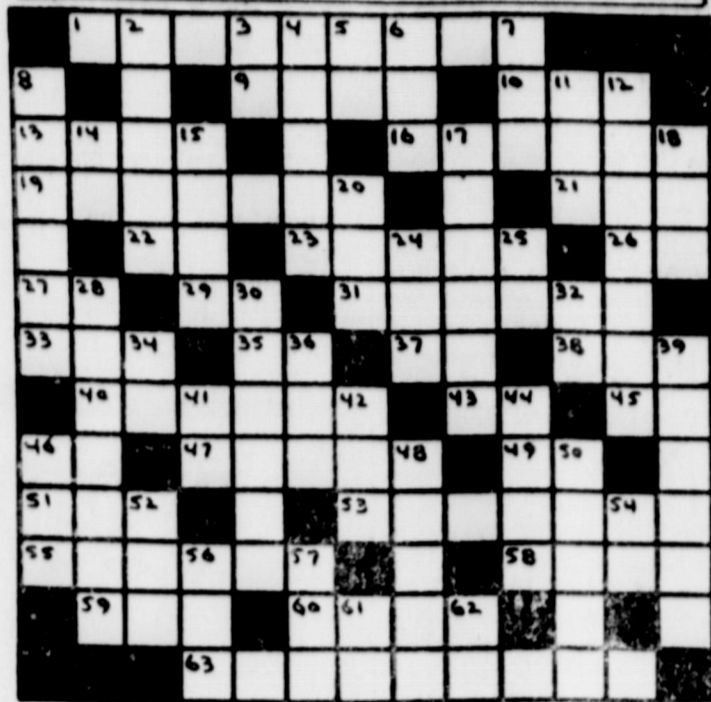

## Some May Need To File S.S. Report

People under 72 who earned over \$2,400 and got one or more monthly Social Security retirement, dependent, or survivors checks in 1974 must submit an annual report of their earnings to Social Security by April 15, according to Glvn Hammons, Social Security District Manager in Abilene.

The report shows how much was earned in wages and self-employment income last year by people who got monthly Social Security payments—as well as how much they expect to earn this year.

"The report will be used to determine if people were paid the correct amount of Social Security benefits for 1974," Hammons said. "It will also be used to adjust their monthly 1975 Social Security payments according to their estimated earnings," he added.

Full Social Security benefits could be paid to eligible people in 1974 if they earned \$2,400 or less for the year. But no matter how much they earned for the year they could be paid their full Social Security benefits for any month they earned \$200 or less and didn't do substantial work in their own business.

The figures for 1975 are \$2,520 for the year and \$210 a month.

"People who file an annual report late or don't file one that's due may suffer a penalty," Hammons said.

People who were 72 or over in all months of 1974 don't need to file an annual report of their earnings.

"If you have questions about the annual report or need an earnings report form, call or write any Social Security office," Hammons said. The Abilene Social Security office is at 142 S. Pioneer. The phone number is 689-1360.
