City Council Calls Town Meeting For Thursday

Citizens of Cross Plains are being invited and urged to attend a "town meeting" at the City Hall on Thursday night, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Purpose of the called mass meeting is discussion of possible purchase of 36 acres of land two miles north of Cross Plains and developing it into a new water field.

Alvin Hutchins, water commissioner for the city, said

Tuesday that he and the remainder of the council hope that all towns people who possibly can will attend the session. "We want to explain in detail why the City Council is interested in spending the people's tax money in this manner," Hutchins emphasized.

The tract being considered contains 36 acres, and is located just east of Farm Road 880, across the road from the E. K.

Coppering place. It is currently owned by Harold Hinkle of this city. Purchase price is \$15,600. That will include the land, all mineral rights, believed to be 100 per cent, and miscellaneous irrigation equipment.

City of Cross Plains has already taken initial steps toward the purchase of the land, having put up a \$250 for a 60-day option. That amount will go in on the \$15,600 purchase price should the city decide to buy the land.

Alderman Hutchins noted that tests for volume have and are being made this week on three wells which were already drilled on the tract as well as two wells which the city drilled in the past few days. A sample of water was sent for content analysis.

The local water commissioner noted that all statistics on the five wells will be made public at the town meeting Thursday. "We also hope the content report will also be back by then," he stated.

The option to buy the land became effective April 16, thus

leaving just a month for the decision to buy to be made. Another 30 days is allowed after the June 16 deadline for completion of paper work on the purchase if made.

It was pointed out at a recent special meeting of the council that the three original wells on the tract were capable of producing from 80 to 120 gallons per minute. Sand in those wells was reportedly hit at 17 feet and it was believed to carry water to a depth of 55 feet.

Rough estimates of cost of equipping and laying a pipeline from the field to the city's settling basins here are also expected to be discussed at Thursday's meeting. Financial aspects of the proposed venture are also expected to be aired.

Hutchins explained Tuesday, "We are interested in what the people of Cross Plains think about the proposed plan, and would like to hear ideas other than our own on the project, therefore we need a representative turn-out for the meeting".

West Texas Utilities Company, a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation which is joining with the university in putting on the symposium, will sponsor them.

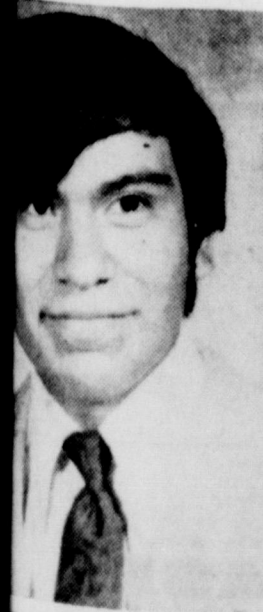

"Attending this symposium should be a most interesting and educational experience and a chance to learn more about the latest achievements in nuclear science for those participants," Bob Kennedy, Chairman of West Texas Utilities Company, said. "We are pleased to provide them with the opportunity and hope it will encourage these students to continue their interest in the area of science."

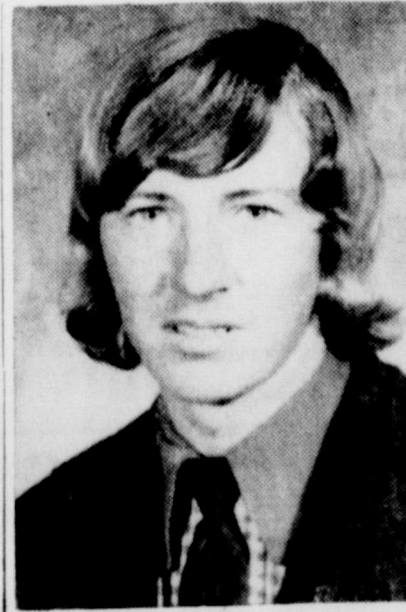
Eddieberto Ramirez

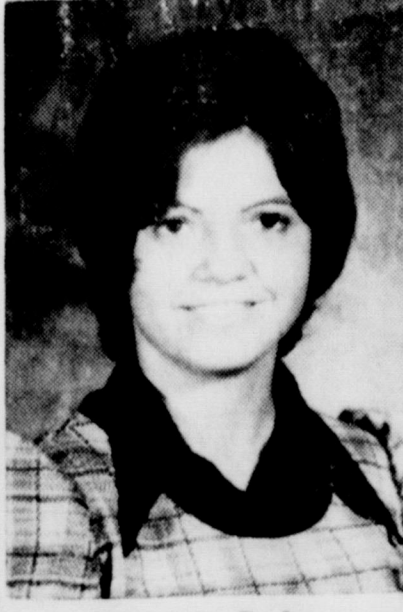
Ramona (Brooks) Crawford

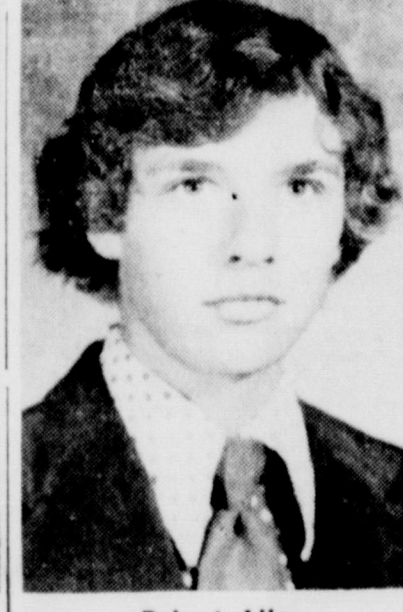
Clarence W. Tension, Jr.

Robert Allen

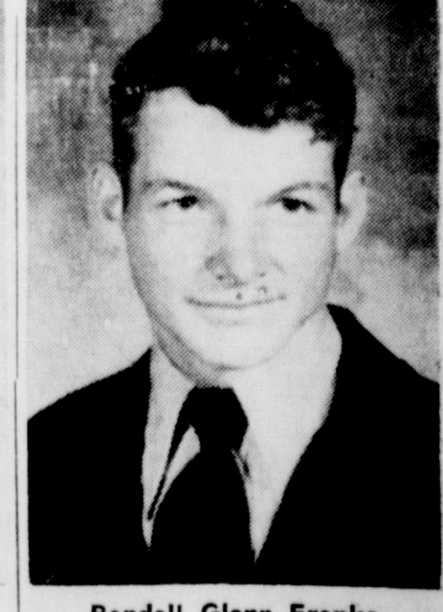

Sharon (Dillard) Lewis

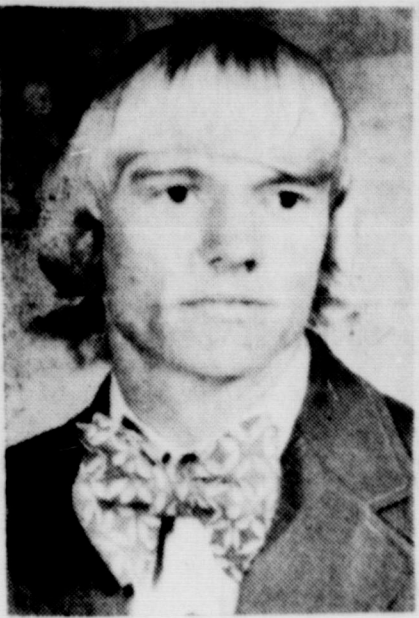

Randall Glenn Franke

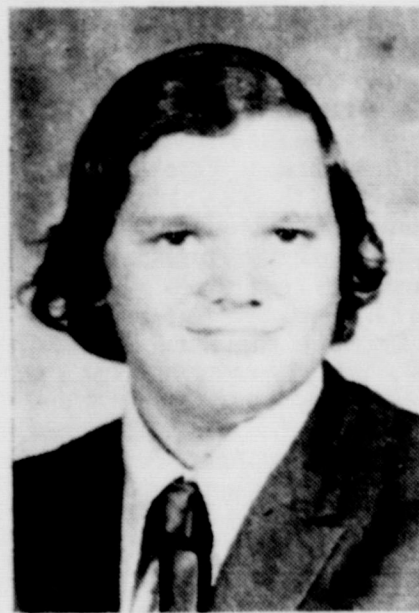

Roy Dean Dillard

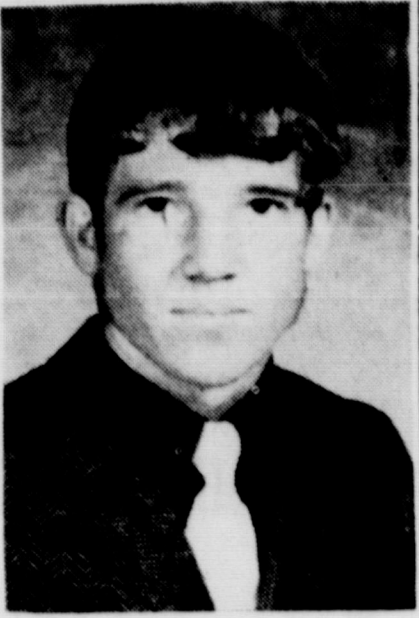

ness in Rising Star for 54 years and continues to be active. They are members of the Church of Christ.

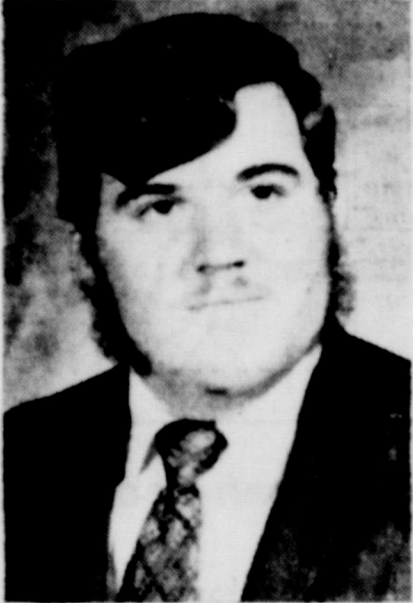

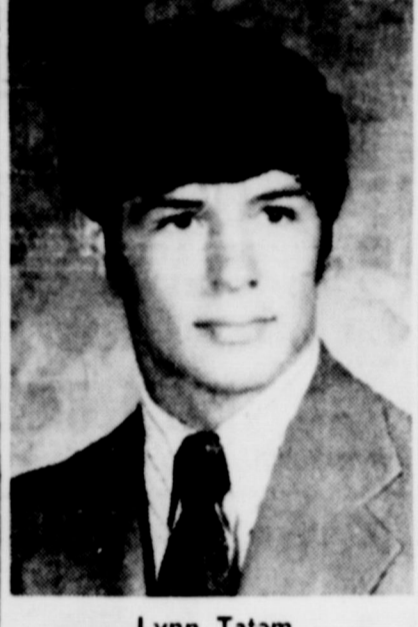
Debbie Ann Lewis

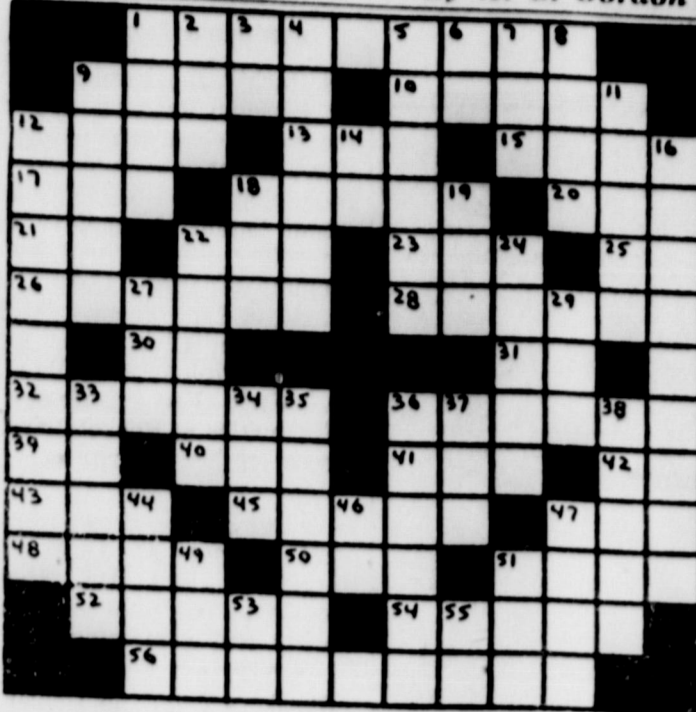

DUAL PRODUCTION SET ON CALLAHAN DISCOVERY

A Callahan County wildcat has been completed as a discovery well five miles east of Baird.

It is Trans-Texas Energy Inc. and Craft Thompson of Dallas No. 2 North Hatchett Ranch. Site is 1,883 feet from the north and 1,883 feet from the west lines of Section 23, D&DA Survey.

Daily potential was 10 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 350 barrels of water. Flow was through a 16-24-inch choke with 800 pounds tubing pressures.

Production is from perforations at 3,854-64 feet, treated with 5,040 gallons of acid. Operator set the 5 1/2-inch casing at 3,910 feet.

The hole was drilled to a total depth of 3,930 feet and plugged back to 3,910 feet.

Operator plans to dually complete injecting salt water in a non-productive zone in the Caddo.

TEXAS TALK

Ordinarily an orange would not be confused with a peanut. Unless a conversation happens to focus on the word, Valencia. Although most often thought of as one of the common varieties of oranges, Valencia means nuts to the peanut farmer. Specifically, it is the least common of the four major types of American peanuts. Filling the top three positions are: Virginia, Spanish and Runner varieties. Most common to our area is the Spanish group which includes such well known hybrids as Dixie Spanish, Spantex, Spanette and Starr. Relatively small even in the world of peanuts, it often takes as many as 1,300 seeds to make up a pound of the Spanish type. Virginia type peanuts, mostly in the Southeastern United States, are generally recognized as producing the largest seeds. With some Virginia varieties such as NC-2 the one pound scale can be tipped with as few as 450 seeds... three times the weight and more than twice the size of Spanish peanuts.

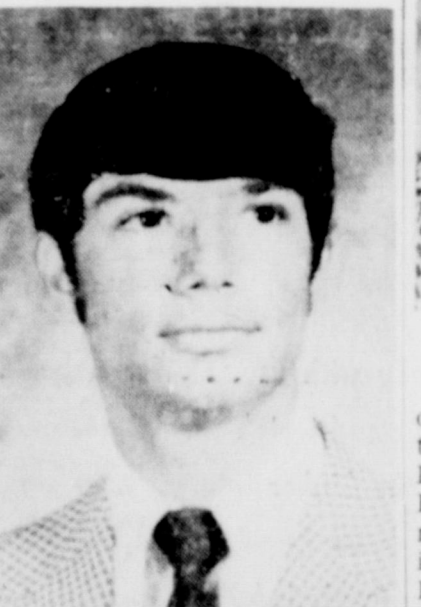

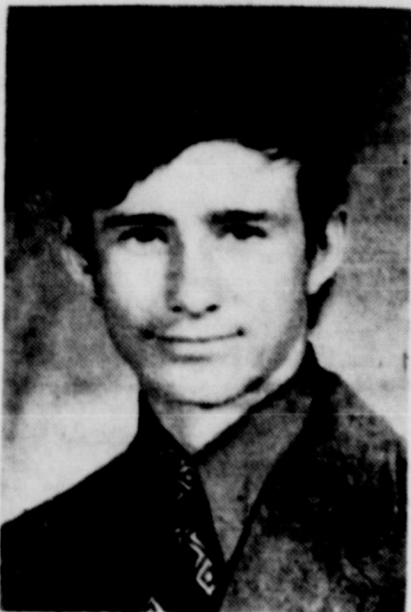
Tim plans to work and attend General Motors Technical School at Garland, Texas, after graduation. He is a member of the First Baptist Church.

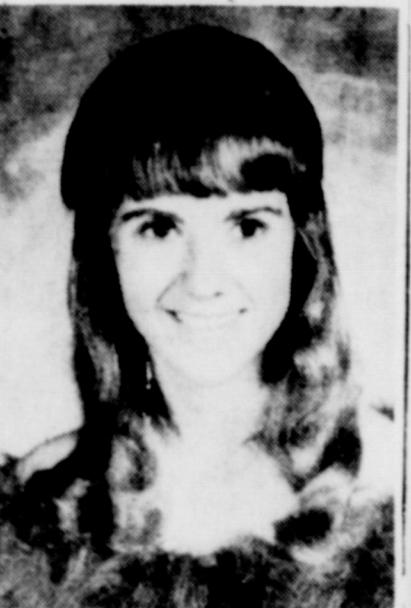

ers during the symposium are Dr. Norman Rasmussen, professor of nuclear engineering at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and director of a recent intensive nuclear reactor safety study issued by the Atomic Energy Commission. Dr. Roger Linnemann, president of the Radiation Management Corp. of Philadelphia, Pa.; and Dr. Mark Kac, professor of mathematics at Rockefeller University of New York.

Also, Dr. Frank Salisbury, professor in the department of plant science at Utah State University, and Dr. Harvey Crombo, professor of entomology and nematology at the University of Florida.

Speakers from the University of Texas on the program include Dr. Linn Draper, director of the Nuclear Reactor Laboratory, and Dr. Sidney Medley, research associate in the Nuclear Fusion Research Center.

Dr. Paul Olum, dean of sciences at the university, is chairman of the steering committee for the symposium.

The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation is made up of ten investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas including West Texas Utilities Company. The foundation was created in 1957 for the advancement of knowledge of energy, particular nuclear energy, through scientific and educational activities. Its research efforts and presently directed toward controlling fusion reactions through programs being carried out at the University of Texas at Austin laboratories.

The ultimate goal is the using of energy from nuclear fusion for the generation of electricity.
