Agent Says Brush Control Projects Need Evaluations

Many ranchers in Callahan County are in the process of planning some type of brush control program. At the onset of spring, it looked like it might be an ideal year for spraying because of adequate moisture and good tree growth.

Now, however, the picture is not as bright for spraying because of several factors, according to Greg Gergross, County Agent of Baird. First, the Eastern frost severely defoliated much of the young growth. Some plants are only now re-leaving, some two months after the freeze. Hail storms in some areas have beaten many of the young leaves off. In some pastures, there has been an invasion of the mesquite cutworm and other foliage feeders. These night feeding worms usually start on the top leaves of the course barked, older mesquite. In past years, the leaves were mainly eaten and the herbaceous stem were left. Recent observations reveal that even these stems are being eaten especially on the tender, sprouting leaves.

Ranchers planning to use Picloram (Tordon) for pear control should consider the fact that there is an abundance of broomweed and other weeds that may interfere with getting the chemical on the prickly pear.

Each area will need to be evaluated individually to determine feasibility of control this year, Gergross cautioned. As a general rule to follow, a deep dark green leaf color is desirable when starting to spray mesquites. A yellowing tint generally indicates some type of frost or other damage. If mesquite canopy is thick and there is also large amounts of pear to control, one might consider removing the mesquite by aerial spraying of 2, 4, 5-T prickly pear control, the agent offered.

With spraying costs being higher than in the past, evaluation of each pasture or pastures is necessary for the rancher to get his full dollar return from spraying, Gergross explained.

80 Students Win Places On Final Honor Listing

Eighty students at Cross Plains schools earned places on the sixth and final honor roll during the 1974-75 school year, according to a list released this week by school officials.

Scot Edington, high school principal, reported that 28 pupils in the top four grades earned honor status. In the eight elementary grades there were 52 classroom stars, according to Arthur Boyle, principal.

The Senior Class was tops among all 12 grades in number of honor students with 18. Runner-up overall was the first grade where 12 pupils were listed on the honor roll.

The 80 elite scholastics comprise less than 20 per cent of the total student body, less than the general average of honor students. To be eligible for honor rating, a student must earn a general grade average of not less than 90.

Senior queen will receive a \$70 certificate and runner-up \$35 certificate. Junior queen will get \$25 certificate and runner-up \$10 certificate.

The talent find is open to any member of a Farm Bureau family. Entrants must be between ages of 17 and 30, and their talent must not be a profession. Winner will get \$50 certificate, and runner-up a \$25 certificate.

Expenses of the winners of the district senior queen contest and talent victors will be paid at the state FB convention. At the state contest each district senior winner will be presented a gold watch by the Texas Farm Bureau.

Over \$1 Million Flowing Back To Callahan Folk

Some financial aid will soon be on the way for residents of Callahan County.

A total of \$1,012,000 will be flowing in from Washington, a partial offset to the funds they sent in the opposite direction recently in paying their 1974 income taxes.

Essentially, it represents a two-part payout. The bulk of it, approximately \$697,000, will be coming back in the form of refunds to local taxpayers who overpaid on their taxes during the past year because the amount withheld from their paychecks was more than was required.

Most of the other money they will be receiving consists of the rebates on their 1974 taxes that Congress and the Administration approved recently.

Callahan County residents will recover an estimated \$315,000 in such rebates.

In addition, local persons who are recipients of Social Security, people getting railroad pensions and the aged, the blind and the disabled who are on welfare will receive \$50 each.

This bonus will in no way affect the increase in monthly benefits they are scheduled to get later this year under separate legislation.

Nationally, a substantial amount of money is being put back into the hands of consumers with the hope that they will start spending more freely and get the economy moving forward.

The total going to individuals in these direct payments figures out to \$37.8 billion, of which \$28 billion is in refunds, \$8.1 billion in rebates and \$1.7 billion in the \$50 checks.

According to the latest Treasury Department reports, the refunds are running at the rate of \$386 each. This compares with \$361 last year.

As for the rebates, the range is from \$100 to a maximum of \$200. Those who paid less than \$100 in taxes will get all their money back.

The new bill provides, also, for reductions in 1975 taxes in the amount of \$7.8 billion, including a \$30 tax credit for each taxpayer and dependent.

Taxpayers need file no application to receive their rebates, it is noted. They will start going out the early part of May. It is expected that all of them will be issued before the end of June.

Callahan Hospital Said 'Lived' By New Staff

Following is the report written by Sylvia Staff writer of the Reporter-News, which is in the Abilene paper. It concerns the operation of the hospital at Cross Plains being leased by Dr. Gayao. The lease Callahan County commissioners approved recently follows.

The reasons the Callahan Hospital was leased to Dr. Gayao was because he had "no dust and dirt."

Dr. Gayao began practice in Cross Plains May 15, and has had patients come from Callahan County but from Clyde and Baird. Dr. Gayao said the hospital was underutilized before the Callahan commissioners decided the facility.

He was able to hire 90 per cent of the pre-facility staff.

His agreement with the commissioners involved remodeling of the hospital in 1939 to bring it up to modern standards. This involved rebuilding both the operating room and the de-sterilizing room and has been completed.

Dr. Gayao is joining another doctor to join

the staff at the 26-bed hospital. He said if the person gets his license, he will definitely join the staff by July 1.

There are two parts to the hospital—the in-hospital patient care and Dr. Gayao's family practice clinic for out-patients.

He said the idea of family practice is one doctor to treat all members of the family.

Dr. Gayao finds the more personal contact with people more satisfying, and said he didn't "enjoy meeting people casually like the specialists."

He received his training in family practice during a year at the Family Practice Clinic at Texas Tech. He said training programs such as this were not unusual anymore at medical schools.

Dr. Gayao said he had received many offers after completion of his training which had "money guarantees," but he liked the Baird situation because there was no money guarantee and he liked the challenge of running a hospital.

He also likes the fact that patients can be referred to Abilene facilities, only 20 miles away.

He said the response had been good to his efforts to keep the hospital open and that "people have supported me."

Dr. Gayao's wife is also on the staff of approximately 30 people. The Gayaos have a 2½-year-old daughter.

The hospital administrator is Emil Villafranca.

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Funeral Friday For Local Lady's Mother

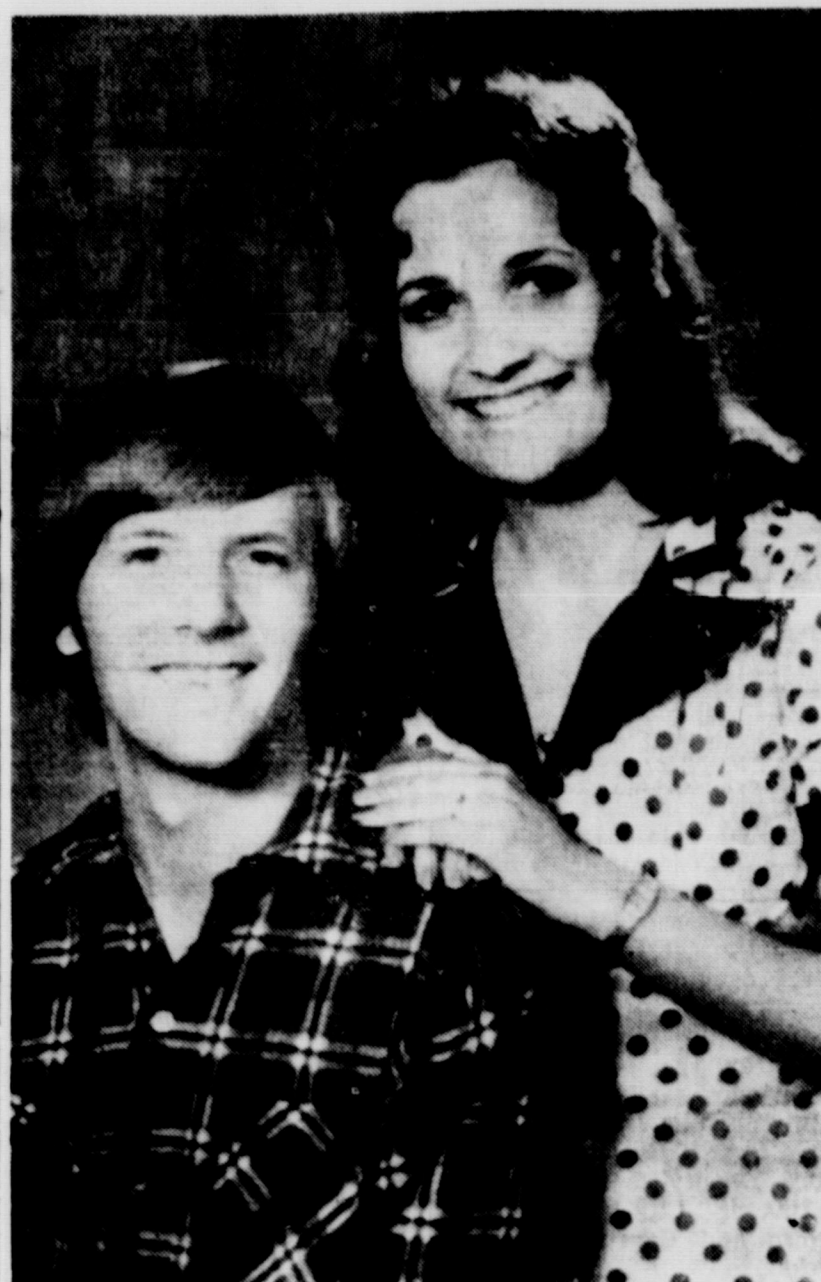

ing is set at 1,027 feet. The hole was drilled to a depth of 1,033 feet and bled back to 1,010 feet.

TEXAS TALK

Crop Camels have heads but no humps. The term "Crop Camel" is used as a reference to any crop that gets along on little water but in this area is generally reserved for sorghum. Primary reason for the development of sorghum as a feed grain was because it provided essentially the same nutritive value as corn but had unique growing properties. Properties such as becoming practically dormant during a drought and then resuming growth as soon as water is available. Most common of the grain sorghum types are the kafirs and milos or a hybrid developed from the two varieties. According to authorities such as J. H. Martin, sorghum originated in east Africa with the kafir variety coming to the United States from South Africa in 1876. Milo followed in the early 1880's. Hybrid developments and farm improvements have moved average yield from under 20 bushels per acre in 1950 to a current average of close to 65 bushels.

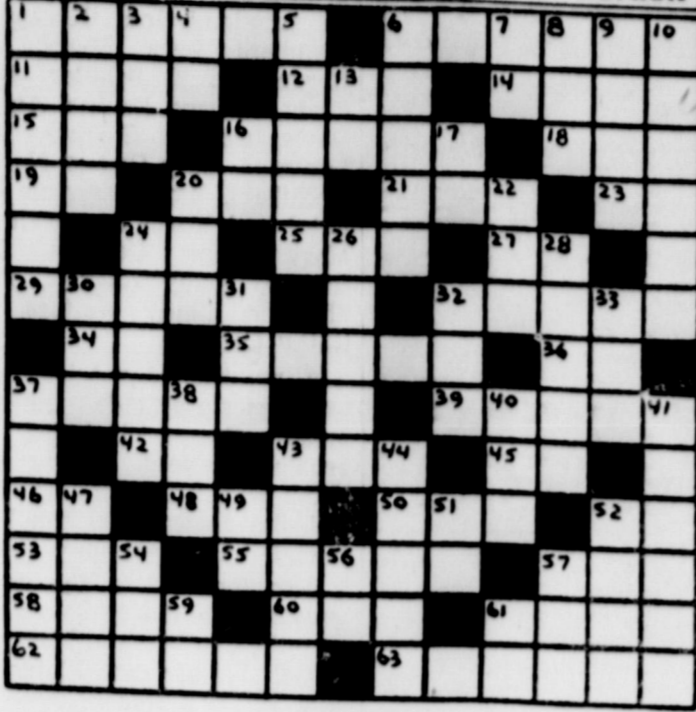

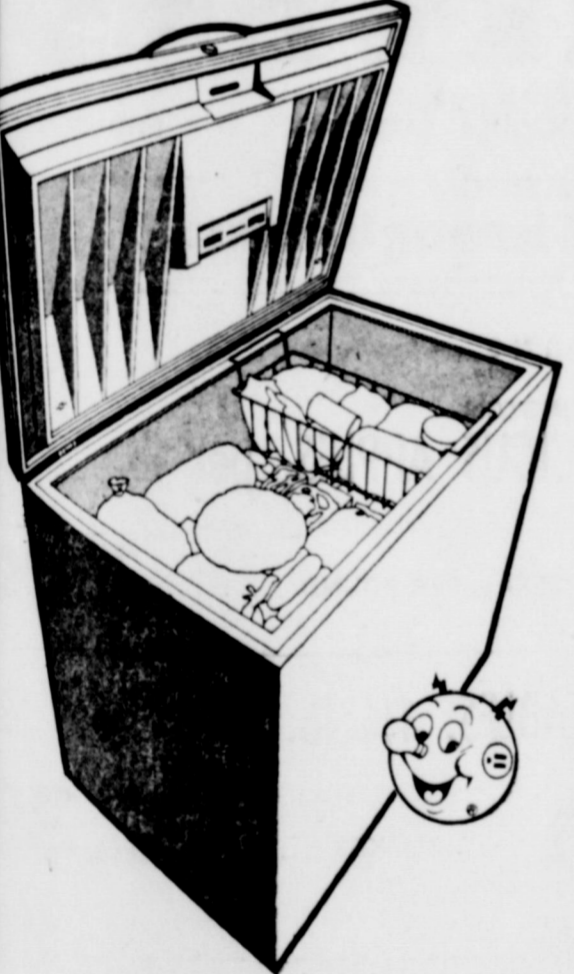
