Small grain in the Cross Plains area was beginning to show a full swing last week as rain showers late Sunday slowed operations.

on Tuesday. Selling price had been \$2.90 per bushel until Tuesday. Price on the small grain may vary from hour to hour, it was pointed out.

Most area grain producers seem to believe that yields are better per acre this year than average. One local farmer, experienced in the business, said that he believed that overall yield may be as high as 20 bushels per acre. A few isolated fields may produce as much as 30 bushels per acre one source pointed out. Generally about 15 bushels per acre is considered normal for this area.

Some oats have also been marketed in Cross Plains this year. Top quality grade was bringing \$1.25 per bushel on Tuesday, according to local buyers.

It was thought by area buyers and producers that the grain harvest will continue for two weeks or more. That prediction was based on good harvesting weather prevailing. Inclement weather would extend the harvest, and could cut yields and grades, it was pointed out.

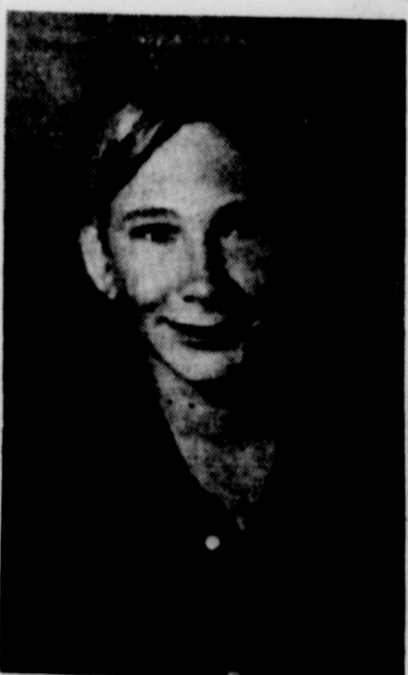
COTTONWOOD POST OFFICE WILL CLOSE ON FRIDAY

Local School Board Hires Head Coach; Teachers

Board of Trustees of Cross Plains Independent School District hired a head coach and other instructors for the coming school year in regular session last Thursday.

Donnie McMillan was named to the post of Head Coach at Cross Plains High School. He served as assistant coach last year under the late Sam McBrierty. McMillan had indicated earlier this year that he would accept a position at Sealy, near the Gulf Coast, but reconsidered when offered the head job in the local athletic department here. He was named to the position on a one-year contract, policy of the board on all coaching and teaching positions.

Four other instructors, two of which will also be involved with local athletics, were also hired by the board in Thursday's session.

Mrs. Rebecca Isbell was hired as a high school English and speech teacher. Frank Rundrell, local superintendent, stated that Mrs. Isbell comes highly recommended. She began teaching in

1973, and comes here from Brazosport. She was debate coach at Brazosport, and reportedly won many honors in debate. She and her family recently purchased the place in the Atwell community formerly owned by D. L. Sessions, it was reported.

The trustees also approved hiring of Mrs. Josephine Rhodes as business teacher. She and her two children will soon be moving here from Old Glory. She has taught business courses, English and math for five years.

Barry Miles has accepted duties with the local school. The Howard Payne University graduate whose home is at Star, will teach English, history and physical education. He will also be active in the athletic program. He was named as "Outstanding Physical Education Student", at Howard Payne last spring.

Mrs. Kay Green has also been hired by the local trustees. She will teach English and physical education in junior high school. She will come here from Southwest High School in San Antonio, and has one year's teaching experience. She will also coach seventh and eighth grade girls basketball and junior high school girls track.

Rundrell noted that the faculty is not yet complete, with possible openings for a special education instructor, Title I teacher and math teacher. He pointed out that available finances may dictate how many other instructors can be hired.

The superintendent pointed out that all teachers in the local system last school year were re-hired by the board some time ago. He noted that the death of Sam McBrierty caused an unexpected opening. Three instructors resigned places. They are Joe Coppinger, Mrs. Dora Smith and Mrs. Jim Newberry. The latter was in special education.

Among those who have been re-hired are Mrs. Lindsey Tyson, Mattie Faye Dixon, Mrs. Leroy Higginbottom, Mrs. Kenneth Sowell, Mrs. Billy Paul Golson, Mrs. Harold Garrett, Mrs. Roy

Stambaugh, Mrs. Jim Fleming, Donnie McMillan, Rolan Jones, Mrs. Warren Spencer, Mack McConal, Carroll Rhodes, Miss Betty Browning, O. B. Edmondson, Mrs. Betty Odom and administrators, Frank Rundrell, superintendent, Arthur Boyle and Scot H. Edington, principals.

It was learned here Monday that a contract has been offered and accepted for position of assistant coach, pending official approval of the board of trustees.

Church Eoff of Marble Falls has accepted the position. He is married and has two children. He has coached six years after taking his degree from Tarleton State University.

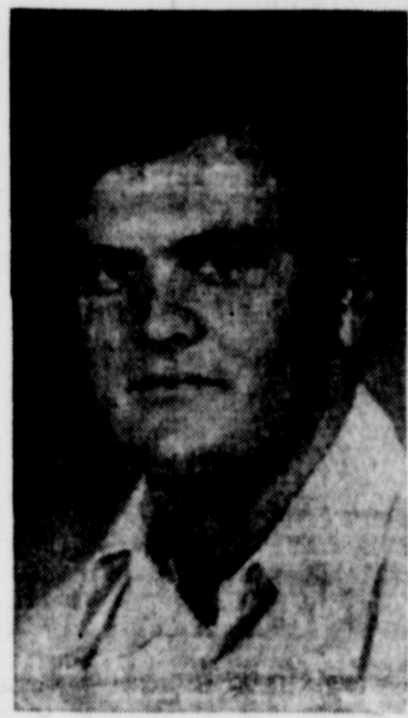
Head Coach McMillan noted that pending approval of Eoff by trustees his coaching staff for the upcoming school year is complete.

McMillan noted that Eoff will assume duties as first assistant in the athletic department. He will also be charged with coaching offensive backfield and defensive secondary in football, be head boys basketball mentor and coach high school girls track.

Miles will be junior varsity football mentor, coach girls high school basketball and assist in the track program.

It was noted that Mack McConal will be head coach in junior high school, and will be assisted in that program by Mrs. Green and the other three coaches, McMillan, Eoff and Miles. It was also pointed out by McMillan that McConal will also assist in the high school football program.

Supt. Rundrell said last week that Cross Plains schools are allowed 21 professional units (instructors) which is not a gain of teachers. He also explained that because the school district is a sparsely settled area, that the state is supposed to provide six more professional units. It was thought that the local system would not hire more teachers than allocated by average daily attendance and additional units promised by the state.

TEXAS TALK

By Glenn Winfrey

Peanuts' party popularity is increasing as never before. This goober gobbling boom is caused primarily by the relatively new method called dry-roasting. Scientists refer to the final product as "partially defatted peanuts". Exactly why it works so well is still something of a mystery, but several facts are known. Central to success of the operation is the fact that the oil from a peanut seed can be extracted under extremely high pressure then the seed can resume its original shape. Basically it works this way: first, deskinning, blanched peanuts are hydraulically pressed to remove up to seventy percent of the oil under a pressure of 2000 pounds per square inch for almost an hour; second, the pressed peanuts are transferred to boiling water for as long as eight minutes; finally, they are dried and roasted (usually with some salt and oil added). Although the process works with all peanuts it is most common with Spanish and Runner types.

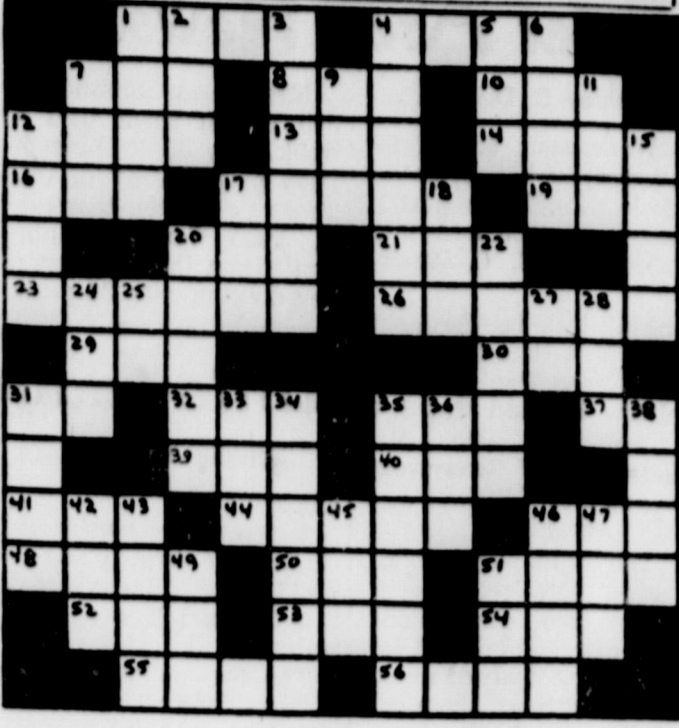

Women Now Head More Families In Callahan

There has been a marked change in the makeup of Callahan County families in the last few years.

The proportion of husband-wife families has dropped, with the result that more households are now headed by women.

That has been the trend, also, in most other sections of the country. A recent Commerce Department study indicates that the number of families headed by women has been rising rapidly, especially since 1970.

At that time there were 5.6 million such families in the United States. The number has increased by more than 1 million since then.

In Callahan County in 1970 there were 171 families that were led by women, the census count showed. That represented 7.3 per cent of the total.

It is estimated that this figure has grown to approximately 8.4 per cent, at the present time, based upon a national sampling survey conducted by the Commerce Department.

Throughout the nation as a whole, the average is 12.4 per cent. It is somewhat lower than that for the white population but considerably higher than among black people.

The rapid change in household composition is attributed to a large degree, to the rising rate of family dissolutions, vit divorce or separation.

Since 1970, the number of women who have become heads of families because of such breakups has increased at the rate of 270,000 a year. Between 1960 and 1970, in contrast, the increase was only a third that fast, 91,000 a year.

The other major situation in which women have had to take charge was created by the death of their husbands.

Whichever it was that led to their present status, these women had thrust upon them the responsibility of running the home, making a living and, if there were children, raising them alone.

Nationally, it is brought out,

1 out of every 7 American children under age of 18 are being raised solely by their mothers. This compares with 1 out of 12 in 1960.

Of the families in Callahan County that are headed by women, the latest official tabulation shows that 68 of them have children under 18 and that 15 of that number have children under 6.
