City Cancels Bid Opening for Waterfield Project

Bids on pipe and development of a new waterfield for town has been canceled by the City of Cross Plains. The city had advertised on the pipe to get from the proposed pipeline to be opened July 15, by the council session.

The bids were sought, but difficulties have developed on paper work on purchase of a 36-acre tract of land. Hinkle had not completed the paper work on closing the transaction yesterday (Tuesday) as agreed to purchase the land located two miles from Cross Plains at a cost of \$15,600. The city has tested the underground water and negotiations with the seller have been ongoing for some time.

Concern about the quality of the water once believed to be acceptable high nitrate, has been resolved by the State Health Department at Austin having re-tested the nitrate content of the water now being pumped and is safe for publication. Scott noted Tuesday difficulties in acquiring rights for the pipeline have caused the city to seek bids on the ditching. "It is the intention," Scott explained, "to advertise for bids on and ditching at a later date."

Cross Plains put up a 60-day option to purchase of the 36-acre Farm Road 880, owned by the E. K. Coppin. That option was up July 16. Another 30 days original contract for

completion of paper work on the purchase. Expiration of that time is today, Wednesday. The \$250 deposit was to be included in the \$15,600 purchase price.

City officials believe that it is economically better for the city to own land on which waterfields are developed than to lease water rights, as has been the policy here.

Mayor Scott pointed out that it was originally hoped that the water from the new field could be brought to the city by late this summer. He said Tuesday that it was doubtful if that goal could be accomplished.

Recession Hurts Callahan Businesses Less Says Report

Although the recession had a strong impact in Callahan County in the past year, as it did everywhere else, its effect on business was less severe than in many other communities.

According to figures just released, consumer spending in local retail stores—for food, clothing, furniture and other commodities—remained at a higher level than had been expected.

Despite the fact that the cost of goods and services rose sharply in the year, more than offsetting the gains in personal income in most families, business activity in the area was relatively good. Home buying and auto sales were exceptions.

The details are contained in a new market study made by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It shows just how the average local family spent its retail dollar in the year. Comparable data is given for other sections of the country.

For Callahan County, it shows, stores selling food and automotive equipment captured a large part of the consumer dollar. Between them, they attracted 49 per cent of all local retail business.

Elsewhere in the United States, they collected 39 per cent of the total and, in the

State of Texas, 42 per cent.

The outlay for food alone, in local supermarkets, butcher shops, bakeries, delicatessens and the like totaled \$4,115,000, compared with the prior year's \$3,572,000.

This was solely for food bought for home consumption. It does not include the amount that was spent in restaurants, lunch rooms and other eating and drinking places.

As for dealers selling automotive equipment and supplies, including cars, motorcycles, boats and trailers, they accounted for \$3,341,000. The previous year's volume was \$3,670,000.

Most other retail lines ended the year in fairly good shape, even though the consuming public was more restrained than usual in its spending.

Sales of general merchandise, in department stores and variety shops, came to \$826,000, as against the prior \$759,000.

Stores selling shoes, hats, gloves and other articles of clothing took in \$233,000. The year before it was \$212,000.

Those specializing in furniture and home furnishings had sales of \$346,000, compared with the previous year's \$301,000.

Higher prices for merchandise in general, due to inflation, accounted for much of the increase in dollar totals.

DILER IS COMPLETED EAST OF CROSS CUT

Quapaw Petroleum Inc. of San Antonio has completed No. 1 T. W. Palmer two miles east of Cross Cut. It spots 3,720 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of J. Padillo Survey 645.

Daily potential was 17 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus six barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 1,737-47 feet, treated with 2,800 gallons of acid. The pay was fractured with 3,000 pounds of sand and 150 barrels of oil. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 2,477 feet. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 2,477 feet and plugged back to 1,737 feet.

County People Aiding Land Heritage Project

County Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr. of Baird and Texas Historical Commission chairman Mrs. John Berry of Clyde are working with the Texas Department of Agriculture in registering Callahan County farmers and ranchers who qualify for honors in the Family Land Heritage Program for 1975.

The program gives recognition to those who have kept land in the family for 100 years or more maintaining continuous agricultural operations. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White explained.

Last year over 500 families qualified for certificates and inclusion in the Family Land Heritage Registry, which contain brief histories of all the farms and ranches, the names of current owners, and pictures of early settlers.

"The Texas Department of Agriculture has received many requests for the Registry—from universities, historians, and government agencies. It provides an interesting record of agriculture in the early days of Texas, as well as anecdotes about members of the families."

"We also included notations on the 100-year-old structures on the property, no matter what condition. This information can be invaluable to researchers," White stated.

"For this reason, we are trying to register all those who qualify, not only to give these people some recognition, but also to have a permanent record of pioneer agricultural producers in Texas," White continued.

Application forms are available from the county judge's office. Once completed, the forms must be certified by the county judge or his designate. They are then mailed to the Texas Department of Agriculture with any pictures of early settlers which can be copied and returned. Deadline is August 15, 1975.
