BANDITS ESCAPE WHEN FRIONA BANK ROBBED

Victims Forced To Lie Upon Vault Floor While Thugs Get \$965, Missing \$5,000 Which Was Held In Another Vault.

Two unmasked men who forced three employees and a customer into the vault of the State Bank at Friona, 25 miles north of Muleshoe, escaped Monday afternoon with approximately \$965 in cash.

The men parked their car across main street in front of the bank, one remaining in the machine while the other two crossed the street and entered the front door of the bank.

Both bandits drew revolvers and forced McLean, his wife and Miss Orma White, bank employees, and Hugh Lee, a customer, to enter the vault.

The heavy door was swung shut but not locked, and the bandits went into the back door.

It was the third time the bank has been held up since 1927.

"This is a holiday," McLean, quoted the larger one as announcing. "Don't get excited. We're not going to hurt you."

McLean, his wife, Miss Orma White, bank employees, and Hugh Lee, customer, were ordered to lie on the floor. The larger gunman crouched and kicked Lee, and his shorter and lighter-built companion quickly apologized.

Two-thirds Vote Rule Killed, Al Smith and Others Lead Fight Against New Deal A Noisy Convention.

In calling the convention to order, National Chairman James A. Farley said: "The continuance of the New Deal is the issue."

In the "keynote" address, Kentucky's Senator Allen W. Barkley declared: "We are assembled here not merely to defend but to proclaim the New Deal... without apology or retreat."

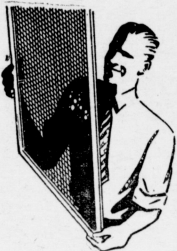
Up to June 12 there were 582,964 units of Chevrolet cars sold, according to K. K. Smith, manager for the Mule Co., local dealers, and by

Absentee voting for the first Democratic primary to be held July 25, begins July 5, closing July 25, according to County Clerk J. B. Burkhead.

Applications for absentee voting must be requested of the county clerk, and when forwarded and properly signed and returned, the ballot is then sent out, marked and returned, being held by the clerk until the day of voting when they are turned over to the judge of the proper voting box and counted along with directly voted ballots.

New York City now claims an estimated population of 7,363,624.

Statisticians claim 21,500,000 American homes are now equipped with radios.

The District of Columbia Supreme court last Friday held the railroad retirement plan as unconstitutional.

Administrator Harry L. Hopkins says he has \$4,000,000,000 of approved WPA projects to start the new program with July 1.

National Industrial Conference board reports 16 per cent or almost one-tenth of the nation's income in 1934 was taken for taxes.

Last year Irish potatoes were plentiful, already it is estimated the crop this year will be not less than 12 per cent short of last year.

The nation's income for this year has been estimated at \$59,000,000,000, which is considerably less than the \$1 billion peak reached in 1929.

With temperatures running abnormally high in North and South Dakota, Montana and Wyoming, crops are reported to be rapidly drying up in the drought scourge sections of those states.

The Alexander Hamilton Institute says the world's annual output of gold jumped to a new high record of 29,777,000 ounces in 1935, with 11.9 per cent of it being produced in the United States.

Clean-up federal payments due farmers from the AAA and other acts declared unconstitutional total \$135,650,864. Payments on cotton, corn-hog and peanuts have already been made and wheat payments will begin August 1.

The Communist party with 725 delegates attending, held their ninth annual political convention at New York City last week, vociferously condemning both Republican and Democratic candidates.

Representative Marion Zischneck vigorously protesting, was last week transferred to a private hospital in Maryland, it being said to forestall an insanity hearing. He has been held under observation for several weeks past.

Dr. Maud Slye, Chicago, the woman who bred 150,000 mice to learn how cancer was inherited, announced last Friday she had developed a control of the disease in animals and that the same system would work in humans. She claims she can prevent any kind of cancer at will.

ROOSEVELT-GARNER, NOMINATED
DECLARATION: KEY SOUNDED
IN FDR ACCEPTANCE SPEECH
(Continued from page one)

mer Governor of Massachusetts, and Daniel F. Cohan, former member of the New York State Supreme Court.

"As men who believe in the principles and traditions of the Democratic party as personified by Thomas Jefferson, Andrew Jackson and Grover Cleveland," these co-signers bitterly assailed the New Deal and called for the "putting aside of Franklin D. Roosevelt and the substitution of some genuine Democrat."

"If you fail," their statement informed the delegates, "patriotic voters of all parties will know unhesitatingly to what standard they must rally in order to preserve the America of the great leaders of the past."

The statement was made public and was mailed to the convention hall.

President Roosevelt accepted renomination Saturday night with a declaration of war against "economic tyranny."

Addressing a giant outdoor mass meeting from a dais raised above the grass of this big amphitheatre, the chief executive touched upon the constitution and hit at "monopoly" and "the economic royalists" who "complain that we seek to overthrow the injurious of America."

Sees Fight For Survival
His words, perhaps sounding a keynote, a 24-hour period unprecedented in American political history.

John Nance Garner, speaking before him, "gladly" accepted his own renomination as vice-president. Saturday afternoon Garner was renamed by acclamation at the closing session of the Democratic national convention as Roosevelt had been in the early morning hours. Never before has a major party named and notified in so short a time.

The president declaring America is fighting "for the survival of democracy and for economic freedom as well, concluded with these words:

"I accept the commission you have tendered me. I join with you. I am enlisted for the duration of the war."

\$889 State Money is
Received By Bailey
Co. School Districts

State per capita tax money was received here last Monday by County Superintendent J. E. Adams, the check totaling \$889.00 and being apportioned among the common school districts as follows:

Longview \$28; Progress \$89; Circle-back \$141; Liberty \$80; West Camp \$90; Goodland \$38; Baileyboro \$70; Stegall \$19; Watson \$60; Fairview \$107; Wilson \$123.

A check totaling \$673, 843 being for Muleshoe and \$250 for Bula independent districts is expected the latter part of this week.

This payment was for \$1 and makes a total of \$16 received by Bailey county schools this year, \$2.50 per capita being yet due. The total per capita payment this year is \$18.50, the largest in the history of the state.

Old Age Pension
Payments Began On
Tuesday, Average \$18

Checks were mailed high Saturday night in the headquarters of the Texas Old Age Pension organization as officials rushed preparations for launching the state last Wednesday on a permanent course of aiding the needy aged.

Approximately 40,000 checks, ranging in size from \$9 to \$30 were mailed Tuesday day direct to persons over 65 years of age. It was the first of a series of monthly payments scheduled to continue indefinitely.

Orville S. Carpenter, state old age pension director estimated that the checks averaged \$18. He added, however, that the organization had been so busy placing a smarmy deserving applicants as possible on the approved list that it had not had time to calculate the average amount.

If \$18 is the average payment, the checks will aggregate around \$820,000. The Federal Social Security board will supply half this amount and the state's half will come from liquor tax revenues.

Not all the old persons entitled to pensions were on the Tuesday mailing list. Carpenter estimated that a total of at least 65,000 applicants would be found eligible when investigations are completed. All payments will be retroactive to July 1.

"Our investigators now are thoroughly familiar with their difficult task and their examinations are proceeding much more rapidly," Carpenter said. "Several thousand additional checks probably will be mailed out

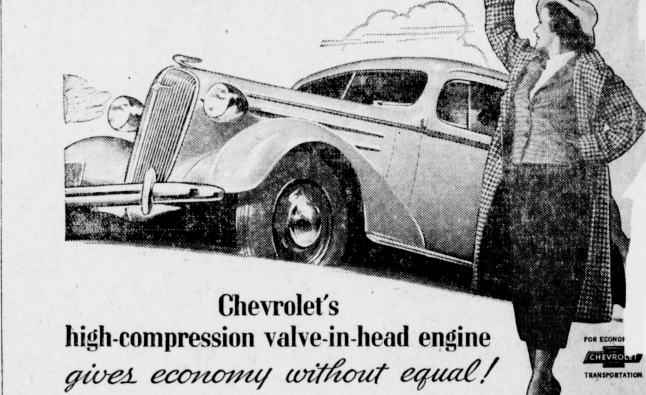
