## Rowden Area Road Contract Let By State

Contract for completion of Farm to Market Road 3146 in the Rowden area has been let by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

According to a release from Austin, the contract was let in July, and was awarded to Abilene Paving Co., Inc. of Abilene on a low bid of \$146,809.34.

The contract is for grading structures, base and surfacing of the farm road from four miles south of State Highway 36, southward and eastward to Farm Road 2287, a distance of 5.1 miles.

It is expected the project will take 160 working days, and will be under C. M. Kitchell, Jr., of Abilene, department engineer.

Work had not started on the project this week, and it was not known when construction would begin.

## Rain Showers Friday, Saturday Net 1.76

Rain showers which fell in the Cross Plains area gauged 1.76 inches in Cross Plains.

The rains were accompanied by dangerous lightning, especially on Friday, and at least eight head of cattle in this area were believed killed by the electrical bolts.

A light shower, officially a trace, fell here Monday morning.

Again the showers were spotty with widely varying amounts being measured in different places. Burkett got .40, Atwell about 1.50 and nice rains fell in the Rowden sector.

The Cottonwood community got from 2.50 to 3.00 inches of rain, and on Friday a lightning storm and high winds accompanied the rain. Lighter amounts of moisture were reported in the Sabanno, Pioneer and Cross Cut areas.

Total moisture recorded in Cross Plains to noon Tuesday is 14.46 inches.

At press time outlook is bright for crops and pastures in most of this area.

## County Oil, Gas Production Big Aid To Local Economy

The production of crude oil and natural gas in 1974 continued to have a significant impact on the economy of Callahan County, with the estimated value of the county's production, royalty payments, and state severance taxes reaching new highs.

Callahan was one of 197 counties—an increase of four from 1973—which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a year which saw the total value of state production jump from just over \$6.7 billion to almost \$11.4 billion.

The county ranked 140th in the state in the total value of petroleum produced—\$5.4 million of that coming from the sale of 697,622 barrels of crude oil; \$527,000 from the sale of 1.8 million MCF of natural gas.

This study by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, headquartered in Dallas, shows also that the county's petroleum production last year resulted in the payment of \$676,315 to royalty owners.

"These figures, whether considered statewide or individually in almost 80 per cent of Texas' 254 counties, emphasize the importance of a healthy petroleum industry in the nation's number 1 energy state," said Sherman Hunt, a Dallas independent oil man who is president of Texas Mid-Continent.

"In the face of declining production in Texas, it is significant that this increased return

to royalty owners and producers came from crude oil and natural gas which is free from restrictive federal price controls. But there are at this time proposals in Congress which would place all of Texas' petroleum production under federal controls, with predictable disastrous consequences for the industry as well as the whole economy of the state," Hunt said.

The survey also shows that the State of Texas received \$264,172 in production taxes from Callahan County wells, with \$224,634 coming from crude oil output and \$39,538 from natural gas production.

Oil and gas developers and producers spent an estimated \$2.9 million drilling 111 wells in the county last year, with 46.2 per cent of that figure lost in 67 dry holes. The total drilling yielded 41 oil wells and three gas wells. The exploratory effort in the county included the drilling of 30 wildcat wells seeking new oil and gas fields.

According to the Texas Employment Commission, 76 oil and gas industry employees worked in the county in 1974 and shared a payroll totaling \$444,292.

A processing plant also added to the county's petroleum-related economy: The "Oil and Gas Journal" lists one natural gasoline processing plant, with a daily capacity of 1.4 million cubic feet.

## Sanitary Landfill Is Enlarged By City

City of Cross Plains closed a deal last Wednesday with Mrs. Annie Newton Davis of Brownwood whereby the city purchased 4.63 acres of land from Mrs. Davis for expansion of the sanitary landfill (dump ground).

Cost of the land was \$1,852,

at \$400 per acre. The new acquisition joins the old landfill on the east.

Mayor Jack Scott said that the purchase was necessary in an effort to conform to requirements of the Environmental Protection Agency. The mayor ex-

plained that Cross Plains and Callahan County has been placed in the Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area with Jones and Taylor Counties, which adds additional requirements on sanitation. He further explained by virtue of being in the metropolitan area Cross Plains becomes subject to the same regulations as govern Abilene.

"There is no way out of the set-up," the mayor stated, "we have tried to be released from the requirements but cannot."

It was explained that the new purchase is to get the landfill off a rocky ledge, and thereby possibly save the city money in future excavations.

Originally the 10-acre landfill, which is not yet completely covered, was bought from Mrs. Davis and her husband in 1946 at \$100 per acre.

It was also noted that Ode Hamby of this city has retired after serving several years as a custodian of the landfill. He has been replaced by Bud Grissom.

## Local Girl, 15, Disappears From Home On Saturday

A missing persons bulletin has been issued in an effort to locate Cindy Roady, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Roady of Cross Plains.

Miss Roady disappeared from her home here between 2 and 5 a.m. Saturday, and has not been heard from since.

A missing persons bulletin was issued by local and Callahan County peace officers and by Abilene and Brownwood law enforcement officials. No reply had been received at mid-morning Tuesday.

It was not known exactly what clothing she was wearing when she disappeared. Her parents pointed out that some changes of clothing were gone as was a green, multi-floral knit overnight case and a shoulder bag of an oxblood color.

Miss Roady is five-feet, four-inches tall and weighs 140 pounds. Her hair is light brown and she has hazel eyes.

## 8 Head Of Cattle Believed Killed By Lightning Here

At least eight head of cattle in the Cross Plains area were apparently killed by lightning Friday or Saturday during showers which fell over this section of the state.

The cattle were on three different places, with several miles between places.

Three cows were discovered dead on a Henry Meador place north of town by J. W. Fore and others who were helping to look after his cattle while he is ill.

It was noted that due to the extremely muddy condition of pastures, a complete survey could not be made, and possibly others might have suffered the

same fate in the same area. Four head of cattle, two cows and two calves, were found Saturday apparently the victims of lightning at the D. C. Lee place south of town. It was not known when they were killed.

Earl Montgomery also lost one head believed to have been struck by lightning. Montgomery believed his cow was killed on Friday, although he did not find the animal until the week end, due to the rain on Friday and muddy conditions. Near the dead cow on his place north of town, Montgomery found a small mesquite tree shattered, apparently the work of a bolt of lightning.

Some of the items are as follows. See Hec Rogers for good whiskey.

Dr. Cochran has been farming this past week. He looks all right as a clod-buster.

The Brown Hotel at Burkett is prepared to accommodate transients in a hospitable manner and has a feed stable in connection with the holstery.

Emory Hughes is recovering from a wire cut on his leg.

Mr. Newson has completed the new church and turned it over to the committee.

For new life and vigor, get your medicine at J. W. Alexander's Drug Store in Burkett.

Burkett Lodge W.O.W. meets the last Sunday in each month. Fred Rowdy is Camp Commander and J. D. Gains is clerk.

The Baptist Church meets the first Sunday in the month with Elder Richburg as pastor.

Burkett Church of Christ meets the second Lord's Day of each month.

Methodist services are held each third Sunday with Rev. Bates as the pastor.

The Presbyterian Church meets the fourth Sunday in the month with the Rev. John Cooper in charge.

W. G. Ed Henderson, Granville Keller Golson and W. L. Gould went to Baird Sunday to attend court as witnesses in the Carter case.

Principle item in the old newspaper concerns an excursion trip to Galveston made by three Burkett men. Allen Grocery, Burkett; George Johnson, blacksmith at Burkett; Henry Sackett, general merchandise, Burkett; F. D. Hardin, who advertises purebred chickens, and J. R. Brown, who has 800 acres of land for sale.

I would still like to know what happened on that trip to Galveston. I guess I'm nosy, but it was some story.

I looked up "Excursion" in the dictionary and it states,

"pleasure trip, a trip for one's health, a group taking a trip together." Well that didn't help me much. Say is anyone around that knows about that trip, say a kinsman? We surely would like to know about it. I'll keep digging, who knows I might come up with something.

The Dick Koenig family and Tommie and Nicky Harris have just returned from a trip to Colorado and New Mexico. Reports from Jo Jo may say they all had a swell time. ## Bigger Bills Face Students At College

For young men and young women in Callahan County who want to go to college this year, getting enrolled will not be as difficult as in other years. With registrations running below normal at many colleges, there is ample room for them.

The big problem, for the prospective students and their parents, is how to pay for it.

Since last year, tuition costs have gone up considerably. So has the cost of room and board. Colleges have been forced to raise their rates in order to meet the higher cost of fuel, food, labor and materials.

According to a nationwide poll of 2,400 colleges and universities, conducted by the College Entrance Examination Board, students will have bills that are 6 to 8 per cent above last year's.

Those attending four-year private colleges will be paying an average of \$4,391, or \$252 more than before. At four-year public colleges it will average \$2,679, which is \$279 more. Sizeable increases are also noted at two-year colleges, especially public ones.

Based upon the new rate schedules and the number of local residents expected to attend, Callahan County parents will be shouldering a \$884,000 load for the coming academic year.

That will cover tuition, fees, room and board, books, transportation and miscellaneous expenses.

A partial offset to the rise in college costs is the financial aid being made available to students. More scholarships, grants, loans and job programs than ever before are being offered.

Over \$857 million in such aid programs has been awarded for the coming academic year by the U. S. Office of Education, \$40.6 million of it in the State of Texas, reports the Commerce Clearing House. It is estimated that Callahan County's college-bound contingent will number about 250 this year.

The \$884,000 cost that local parents will be bearing is calculated on the assumption that half of the students will be going to public colleges and half to private ones.

Another Federal Agency is moving closer to the farm. This time it's the Environmental Protection Agency. EPA officials are now sifting through the chemical analysis of nearly 35-thousand pesticides to decide which ones will require a government restriction. Those chemicals classed as restricted may be applied only by persons certified. Although the starting date for the certification requirement is more than a year away (October, 1976), many farm operators are all ready checking the requirements for certification. The establishment of two levels of certification will make things easier for most ag producers. To be certified as a private applicator (applying pesticides on your own land) boils down basically to being able to read and follow instructions. Commercial certification will involve passing a written test which will cover chemical formulas, equipment specifications and EPA rules and regulations.

# Conservationist Reveals Mesquite Control Tips

Mesquites have covered 275,000 acres of once highly productive grassland in Callahan County in the last 40 to 50 years, according to A. H. Ringhoffer, range conservationist, with the Soil Conservation Service at Baird.

These mesquite are using water that would otherwise be used to grow grass, he explained. Grass not only provides for an abundant supply for cattle, but also acts as a filter above lakes by holding back silt which would eventually fill the reservoir if the watershed were not protected.

On rangeland where the mesquites are managed and a good grass cover on the land, the excess water drains into lakes at a slow rate. This slower rate of runoff protects the rangeland from loss of topsoil by sheet or gully erosion, the conservationist noted.

Mesquite is one of the heaviest users of moisture of any forage plant. Mesquites require about 250 gallons of water to produce one pound of dry matter, whereas grasses such as sideoats grama require only 50 gallons of water to produce one pound of grass, Ringhoffer stated.

Several methods of managing mesquites have proven to be effective according to Ring-

hoffer. Aerial spraying mesquite with 2, 4, 5-T or picloram from 45 to 90 days after the first leaves appear is one of the most economical methods for large areas of heavy infestation. Aerial spraying has just been completed on about 7,500 acres in Callahan County this spring. Chaining two ways with heavy anchor chain is an effective method for managing large trunk mesquites. The above methods of management lasts from 4 to 7 years, he advised.

Longer lasting controls, although more expensive, can be done by other mechanical methods. Management of 10 to 15 years can be obtained by dozing mesquites out below the bud zone, or part of the stump that re-sprouts, he continued.

Rangeland that is heavily infested with mesquite, and does not have a desirable grass cover may be rootplowed and seeded to a grass mixture, Ringhoffer added. This will speed the re-establishment of a stand of grass. High producing grass will once again give protection to the rangeland, provide nutritious forage for livestock and provide for good clean water for lakes.

Clean water can be used by everyone for home use and for recreation activities such as boating, fishing, and swimming, the Baird man pointed out.
