Home Improvement Costs Increase In Local Sector

How much have Callahan County homeowners been spending recently for alterations, improvements, maintenance and repairs to their property?

According to the latest government reports, much more than usual. Their expenditures in the past year were about 14 per cent larger than in 1973, the preliminary figures indicate.

An estimated \$1,102,000 was spent locally for such refurbishing, it is estimated, based upon a survey of residential properties in the regional area.

For the average housing unit in Callahan County, it amounted to an expenditure of \$338, compared with \$297 previously. Nationally, the average was \$403 per unit.

The regional data was compiled by the Department of Commerce by means of a sampling survey covering all parts of the country.

It shows that the chief outlay, in most cases, was for additions, alterations and other improvements. This came to \$12.6 billion, equivalent to 60 per cent of the overall total.

The remainder, \$8.6 billion, went for maintenance and general upkeep. Painting was the biggest item, by far in this category. Next in order were plumbing, roofing, heating, air conditioning and general repairs.

In Callahan County, the expenditure for improvements ran to approximately \$661,000 and for maintenance and repairs to \$441,000, it is estimated, based upon the general breakdown.

Total outlays in the United States for the upkeep and improvement of residential properties reached a record \$2.1 billion in the year reports the Commerce Department. It compares with \$28.5 billion in 1973.

For more and more families, the goal of acquiring a new home has had to be put aside for the present because of high prices and an unsettled economy.

The result is that many of them, who would normally have been moving into new homes, have decided to stay where they

are and do some remodeling and improving of their present properties.


The \$1,102,000 outlay by Callahan County homeowners is indicative of the trend. Most of this expenditure went to local carpenters and to building supplies dealers.
