Cross Plains Buffaloes will begin District 10-A warfare in Buffalo Stadium Friday night against the highly rated DeLeon Bearcats.

Game time is 30 minutes earlier than for the first four games this season. Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

The Herd has picked a potent team to begin conference play. The Bearcats, defending 10-A champs who finally beat the

Bisons 14-0 last year, are undefeated thus far in the 1975 season. De Leon has blasted its four opponents this season, defeating two Class AA schools, Comanche and Hamilton. The latter school fell to the Bearcats 50-14 last Friday night.

De Leon is rated a solid favorite to again claim the 10-A crown this season. The Bearcats have been rated in the top 10 teams in the state in Class A all season, and were the number two team in one poll last week.

Experience, speed, large size and depth are all possessed by De Leon.

Five returning all-district performers are back at De Leon this year. They are Craig Smith, 175-pound senior quarterback, Terry Nabors, 155 senior flanker, Tommy Cleere, 175 senior end, Ken Taylor, 218 senior guard, and Toby Hare, 224 junior guard.

If that is not enough adding to the strength are second team district performers Marn McKillip, 180 pound senior halfback, and James Hodges, 165 pound senior fullback.

The Bearcats are reported to be a well balanced team, able to score equally as well on the ground or through the air. The Bearcats are reported extremely tough defensively also.

### Free Health Clinic Set At Center Here Oct. 7

A free public health clinic will be offered residents of Cross Plains and surrounding communities here Tuesday, Oct. 7.

The clinic is being sponsored by the Public Health Region 4 division of Texas Department of Health Resources in cooperation with Cross Plains Jaycees and Dr. Carl J. Sohns, city health officer.

It is explained that the Blood Pressure, Diabetic and Tuberculosis Screening Clinic will be held at the Multi-Purpose Service Center from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The center is located in the old American Legion Building on East Eighth Street, the old Pioneer highway.

A spokesman noted that this free of charge service is sponsored under auspices of Public Health Region 4 in identifying potential health problems for those of certain age categories. It was emphasized that all area residents are invited and urged

to take advantage of the service and be screened (tested) for high blood pressure, diabetes and tuberculosis.

It was again stressed that there will be no charge, and educational material will be available at the clinic.

# S. Security Filing Steps Told Again

Many people are not aware of when they should file for social security benefits and what they should bring with them, according to Glyn Hammons, Social Security District Manager in Abilene.

Persons who wish to file for retirement benefits should file their claim three months before the month they want their first check to start. They should also bring with them the following things: (1) their social security card, (2) a record of last year's earnings, and (3) a record of their age or date of birth.

For those who do not have a birth certificate, some records to consider are the old family Bible, a census record, school records, voter's record, marriage record, or a child's birth certificate.

Hammons further stated, "A record of last year's earnings is needed in many cases due to the length of time it takes to get earnings credited to a person's record. A self-employed person should bring a copy of last year's tax return; a wage earner should bring last year's Form W-2. In addition, if the person filing has any unmarried children under age 18, between 18 and 22 attending school, or disabled, he should furnish the children's birth certificates."

Hammons stressed that early filing can save time and assure the individual of a better chance of getting that first check on time.

The Abilene office is located at 142 S. Pioneer and office hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. If you do not live in Abilene, check at your local post office for a schedule of social security visits by a representative of the nearest social security office, he advised.

## Discovery Oiler Is Hit On Scott Land

An Ellenburger discovery has been completed about 10 miles west of Cross Plains.

It is Belmont Oil Co. of Houston No. 1 Jack Scott. Proposed name of the new field is A. C. Scott, West (Ellenburger) Field.

The discovery spots 2,635 feet from the south and 1,320 feet from the west lines of C. Cooper Survey 205.

No. 1 Scott had a daily potential of 288 barrels of 40 gravity oil, with a trace of water. Flow was through a 16-64-inch choke with packer set on the casing and 585 pounds tubing pressure.

It is producing from perforations at 3,904-14 feet, treated with 2,000 gallons of 15 per cent acid. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 4,002 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 4,026 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 837-1.

## Out-Of-Pocket Health Costs Average In County

How much are Callahan County residents paying per year for health care? How does that compare with what others are paying?

Because of inflationary pressures, the cost of medical and dental services, hospital care, prescription drugs and the like have gone up sharply in recent years.

The direct burden of these costs on the individual pocket-book has been carried, to a large extent, by private health insurance and by such government programs as Medicare.

All in all, according to the latest figures, two-thirds of the bills are now being taken care of in that fashion.

Which leaves the one-third that must be footed by the patients themselves. These out-of-pocket costs have zoomed recently.

Details on the cost of medical care in the various sections of the country have just been released by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

In Callahan County's regional area, it appears, out-of-pocket costs in the past fiscal year, excluding premiums paid for health insurance, came to an estimated \$148 per capita.

Elsewhere throughout the United States the average was \$149 per capita.

The figures apply to the population as a whole and includes those who had no expenses and those who had very large ones. Costs were higher in some

parts of the country than in others, were higher for the white population and were higher for those with big incomes.

For the elderly, as would be expected, the health bill was especially high. Their out-of-pocket expenses averaged \$415 per capita, as compared with \$117 for those under age 65.

A breakdown of the \$149 national average shows \$35 of it going to doctors, \$25 to dentists, \$20 to hospital, \$39 for drugs and sundries and \$31 for nursing home care and miscellaneous.

The total amount spent by Callahan County residents in the year, based upon the regional average, was approximately \$1,228,000, it is estimated.

HEW reports that the overall health bill in the United States reached \$104.2 billion, as against \$9.2 billion in 1973.
