HOW TO STUDY THE BIBLE . . . Continued

Number two: We must study the Bible with proper regard for its purpose. The Bible relates to the need for human redemption. This is the fundamental thought dealt with in the first three chapters of Genesis: God sets before us the explanation as to why there was a need for the plan of redemption. The Bible teaches that all accountable persons share in this need, Romans 3:22, 23; 1 Jno. 1:8-10. The Bible shows that redemption is through Jesus Christ, Rom. 3:24; Eph. 1:7; Col. 1:14; Gal. 1:4. The Old Testament message points the way to Christ and prepares for Him and for His message. This is the testimony of dozens of passages, such as Lk. 24:13-35; Jno. 5:39, 46; 1 Pet. 1:10-12. The sacred plan for human redemption brings honor and glory to God. This fact is mentioned in Eph. 1:6; Eph. 3:21; Rom. 16:27; Gal. 1:5; Phil. 2:11; Rom. 11:36. Consideration of these fundamental facts makes obvious the purpose of the Bible: THE GLORY OF GOD, AND THE SALVATION OF MAN, THROUGH JESUS CHRIST OUR LORD. This is the basic point in Bible study. This is the divine purpose line which runs from the first verse of Genesis 1 through the last verse of the Revelation.
